Most businesses will be closed for the day. All federal and state offices will also be closed including the Post Office and the Bailey County courthouse.

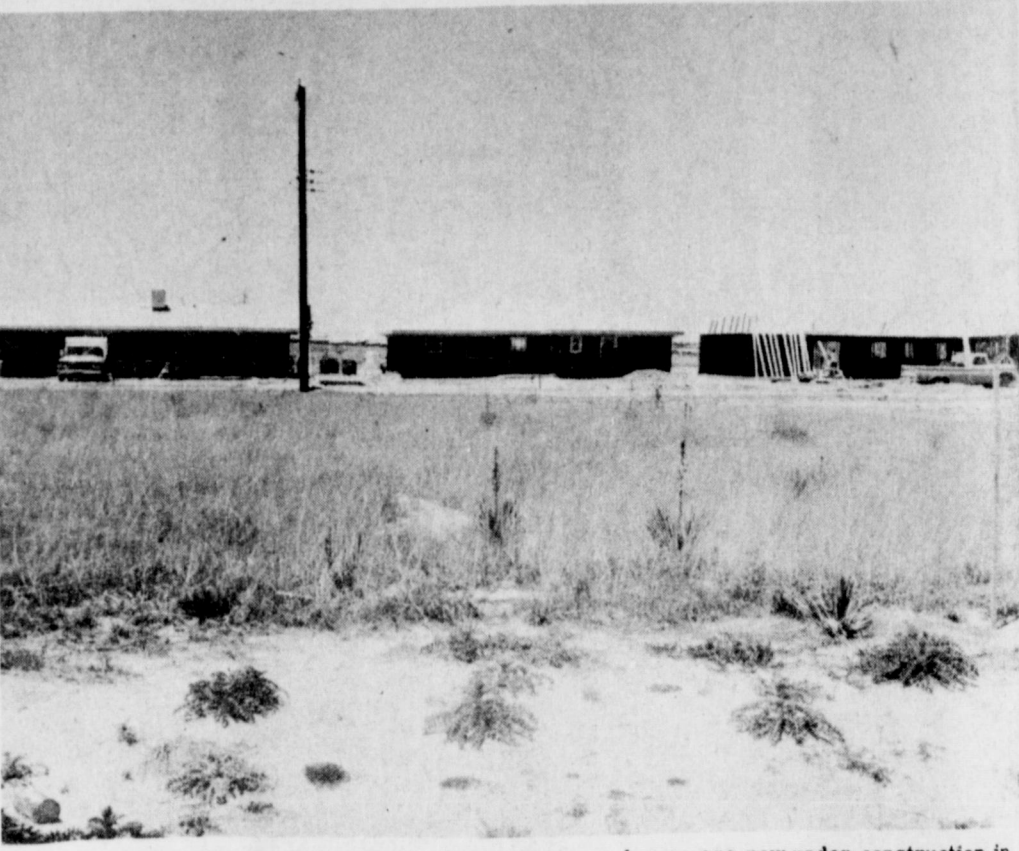
### Local Jaycee Promotion Gets Underway

## Hog Cholera Still Plagues State, Area

Hog cholera is still on the loose in Texas, and unless farmers and others use certain precautions, the situation could get much worse, says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The most recent case of hog cholera has come up in Nueces County. That county was placed under a state quarantine on May 6. Moore County in the Panhandle was also quarantined recently when an infected herd was found. Five other counties in the state remain under state quarantine. They are all in South Texas and include Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Webb and Willacy. Three counties recently re-

leased from quarantine were Fayette, Gonzales and Lavaca. "There is one major point regarding the hog cholera quarantine that relates particularly to those buying hogs," points out the Texas A&M University veterinarian. "This is that any hogs bought in a quarantined area are confined to the buyer's premise for a period of 30 days. The animals cannot be resold or moved for that 30-day period unless they are shipped directly to slaughter."

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## State Farm Bureau President Issues Statement On Unions

Texas Farm Bureau President U.T. (Red) Woodson said recently that efforts by leaders of the United Farm Workers National Union to intimidate Farm Bureau will not be successful.

The state farm leader revealed that UFW Union demonstrators appeared recently at several county Farm Bureau offices in an apparent effort at harassment.

Woodson said that three leaders of the UFW Union recently called at the offices of the American Farm Bureau Federation in Park Ridge, Ill., a suburb of Chicago, to protest Farm Bureau's Legislative activities in the farm labor field.

"The Union leaders of AFBF President William F. Kuhfuss that unless Farm Bureau withdrew its efforts by May 8 to get federal and state farm labor legislation enacted, the UFW national boycott apparatus would be mobilized in a massive 'informational' campaign against Farm Bureau in 40 cities," Woodson said.

Kuhfuss responded by saying that Farm Bureau would intensify its efforts "to get fair and constructive farm labor legislation that would protect the constitutional rights of workers to organize freely and farmers to be protected against the ravages of coercive boycotts that force them to sign over the

Armstrong emphasizes that the purpose of the quarantine is to limit the movement of hogs. Then, if sick animals are detected, animal health officials can be notified and the animals can be properly disposed of. "This is the only way Texas will be able to move toward 'hog cholera free' status," he contends.

### Navy Initiates New Program

The Navy Recruiting Station, Clovis, has announced a new school reservation program to be known as Recruit Allocation Control System, (RACS). Qualified men enlisting in this program are guaranteed school seat reservations in the occupational specialty school guarantee program for specific school seats. Reservations for specific school seats will be handled at the RACS control center in the Bureau of Naval Personnel. This enables the Navy to be more responsive to the individual desires of qualified men entering the naval service. At the present time the Navy offers 16 fields of training which includes 67 job

sists primarily of interviews with farm workers who were forced into the union when growers capitulated because of the secondary boycott and signed with the union.

"This film must be getting under the skin of the union organizers," Woodson said. "We believe this is one reason for the effort to intimidate us. It is significant that the workers interviewed, who have a lot to lose by appearing in the film, say that Chavez could not win a secret ballot election."

# A History Of Bailey County

## Pioneer Families

### Mr. and Mrs. Luther S. Barron

Mr. and Mrs. Luther S. Barron came to Bailey County from Dimmitt in 1919 by car. They bought interest in the Bailey County Abstract Company.

The Barrons first lived seven miles out in the country. Later they bought a two-room house in Muleshoe.

L.S. Barron was president of the school board in 1926 and organized Muleshoe's first football team. The team competed with other teams that had been organized in this area.

In Muleshoe at that time there was M.P. Smith's mercantile store, the post office, a barber shop, the Gupton Hotel, a one-room school, and the Blackwater Valley State Bank.

Mrs. Barron recalls that about 1920 everyone in Muleshoe got together and built a church in the east part of town. The church served everyone regardless of their denomination.

Residents of Muleshoe used oil lamps and stoves in those days. They pumped their water by hand. The L.S. Barrons kept cows, chickens and a pig even though they lived within the city limits.

They kept their milk in a cooler which used damp cloths to keep the milk cool enough so it wouldn't spoil. Using this kind of cooler, the milk would stay fresh for two or three days.

Mrs. Barron said that for entertainment, the young people in Muleshoe used to have skating parties. Now that doesn't sound so unusual except that at these skating parties no one had skates. Everyone would gather at one of the tanks that had frozen and "skate" around in their shoes.

Sandhill picnic parties were also quite popular as social events. But you could never count on going back to the same sandhill. The wind kept moving them around.

Just as today, residents of Muleshoe always held a big celebration on the Fourth of July. Everyone participated.

This is one of a series of historical biographies of Bailey County pioneer families who arrived here prior to 1930.

### Services Held For Former Area Resident

Funeral services were held Friday at 3:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Muleshoe for James Phipps, 46. Phipps died at 3 p.m. Wednesday in an automobile accident near Benjamin. He apparently lost control of his car when it hit a soft spot on a country road three and a half miles south of Benjamin. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

He was a resident of Arlington, having moved there two years ago from Muleshoe. He was born at Circleback, Texas. Phipps, a farmer, was a veteran of World War II, and a member of the First Baptist Church of Muleshoe. He married Melba Dearing, November 23, 1946 at Muleshoe.

He is survived by his wife, Melba; one son, James Ray of Arlington; a daughter, Mrs. Keith Bratcher of Dallas; his mother, Mrs. Opal Luster of Modesto, Calif.; his father, Jerry Phipps of Muleshoe; two sisters, Mrs. Eva Alsop of Dallas and Mrs. Maxine Sessions of Plainview; and one grandchild.

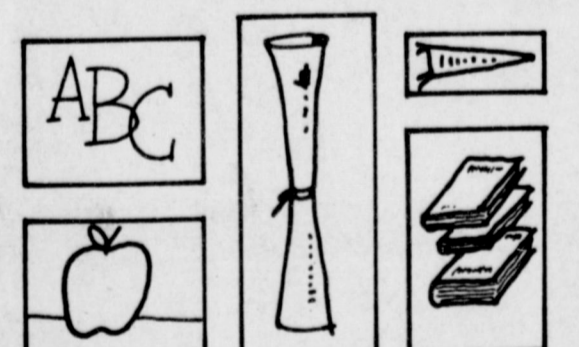

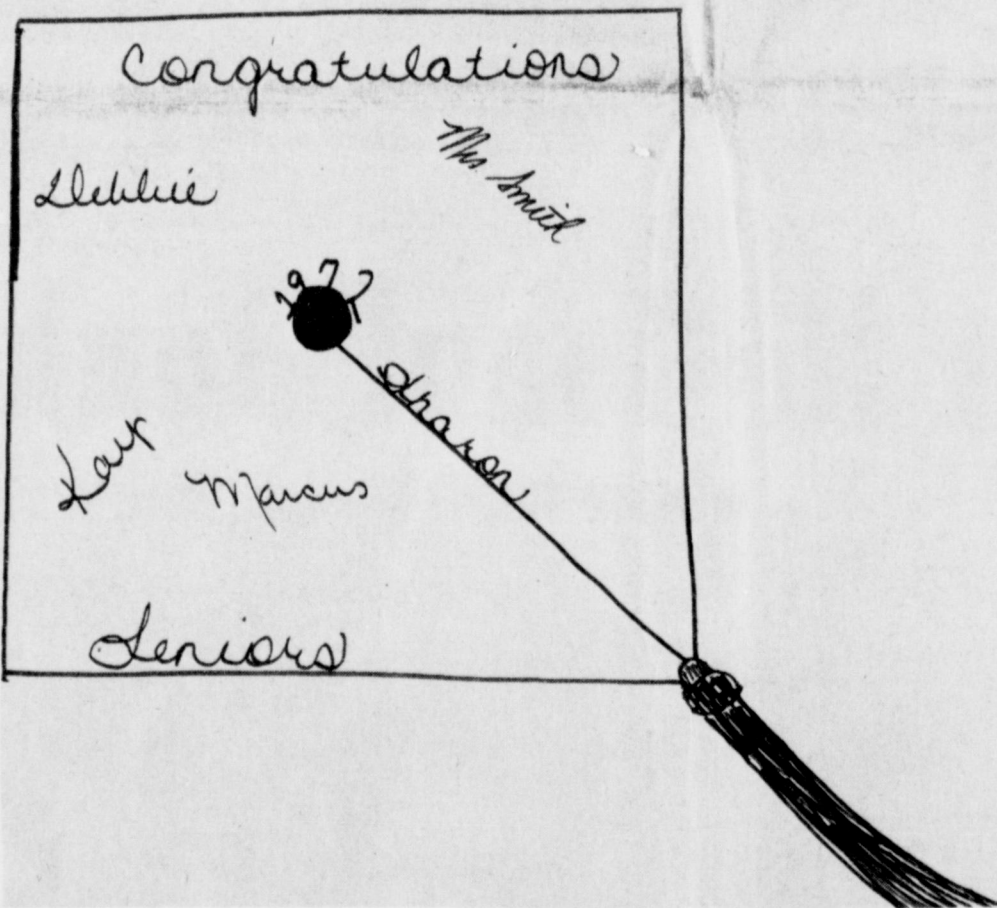

### Comment On Sports FOOTBALL

Washington, D. C.--Tom Siler, in the Sporting News reports that coaches and responsible school officials who allow their football players to wear the conventional seven-crest football shoe are causing unnecessary injuries among players. Siler cites a three-year Temple University study by two experts which led Dr. Joseph Torg, an orthopedic surgeon (one of them), to warn that the seven-crest shoe caused unnecessary knee injuries. The acceptable shoe is

one much like a soccer shoe, with more but smaller cleats. The longer metal cleats of the conventional football shoe often anchor the foot too rigidly and thereby causes the twisting and injury of knees--according to Torg and trainer Ted Quendenfeld of Temple.

If this is true--and tests over the three year investigation period revealed that far more boys suffered knee injuries using the seven-crest shoes--every coach and school official should employ the new, safer shoe this fall.

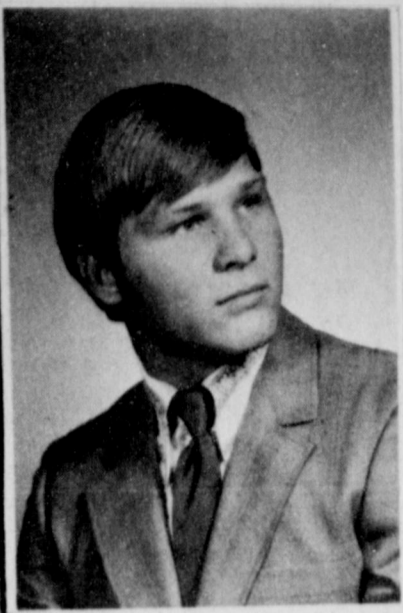

ly do not need a massive Washington-administered program that will cost anywhere from 55 to 75 billion in its very first year of operation.

As an alternative, I am sponsoring the legislation commonly known as Medicare. This plan would not destroy our present system; it would build upon it. This plan would replace the existing Medicare program with a comprehensive health insurance policy, free of deductible and co-insurance, to Americans without any federal income tax liability. For the rest of our population--those not qualified for Medicare assistance now--the government would provide an income tax credit on a sliding scale based upon the individual's or the family's income tax liability.

Now this legislation, I believe, would encourage, through the use of voluntary incentives, the enrollment of all Americans in a private health insurance program of their own choice; and it would provide those currently being served through Medicare with a means of obtaining quality health care through a much simplified procedure. Possibly

the most important thing is it would allow our medical system to remain primarily in the private sector, free of the abuse and discretionary power that has become a trademark of large centralized federal government

## CONGRESSMAN Bob Price U.S. House of Representatives 18th Congressional District

Every since the bill proposing to increase the minimum wage was introduced in Congress last year, I have received many letters, telegrams and phone calls from Texans expressing their opposition to any increase in the minimum wage.

I am opposed to an increase in the minimum wage and will vote against it when it comes up for a vote this week in the House of Representatives. I am opposed to it, because it would result in higher prices and fewer employment opportunities--at a time when lower prices and more employment opportunities are what we need.

This bill called for an increase from \$1.60 to \$2.00 per hour in the minimum wage. It was approved by the House De-

cratic Caucus. And it was approved with amendments by the Education and Labor Committee, which is controlled by the majority party.

An example of the many letters I have received opposing an increase in the minimum wage is this one from a small businessman in our district:

"Dear Bob:  
"I'm writing you about the efforts now being made in Congress to raise the minimum wage to \$2.00. When this is considered against the background of wage-price controls and the battle to slow inflation, it is absolutely bewildering! Here the wage board is trying to hold wage increases to 5.5% and at the same time our Government may legislate a 25% increase!"

"To legislate an increase of

this size can only add pressure for higher prices and cause additional unemployment as businesses try to cut back and control their expenses. It will work a special hardship on teenagers. Many businesses won't hire them now because they don't feel they can afford to pay them \$1.60 much less \$2.00 per hour. It works a hardship on small businesses such as ours also. We have two secretaries with several years experience that make a salary based on about \$2.50 per hour. If we have to hire green employee maybe just out of school and pay her \$2.00, then we will have to raise our other employees accordingly. "We are flatly against any increase in the minimum wage at this time. If there must be one, then let Congress set a good example and limit it to 5.5% increase. Please vote against H.R. 7130, and if our only choice left is H.R. 14104, then please support the Anderson amendment to raise to \$1.80 this year and \$2.00 next year."

This letter makes good sense, and I hope my colleagues in the Congress will heed the advice of small businessmen like this Texan.

Americans are quite naturally concerned about the rise in costs of adequate health care. I know that the Congress and the Administration share that concern.

The rising cost of health care is attributable partly to inflation in our economy but several additional factors, including the costs of new medical technology, are also contributing to health care costs.

The government is concerned about these costs, not only because the problem affects all the people, but also because the government itself is purchasing some 36 per cent of the total output of the health care system in this nation. The government is engaged in the operation of more than a hundred neighborhood health centers, is providing health services to migrant workers in Texas and elsewhere, and is funding other programs including Medicare.

The government certainly should be playing an important role in efforts to improve the quality of this nation's health care system. I have tried to

ing nature of our society which differs significantly from the Northern European countries which are sometimes said to have a more efficient and less costly health care system.

No country as expansive and having a population growing as fast as the United States can hope to meet without difficulty all of the problems of health care delivery. There is no question but that the technical end of delivering health care services needs refinement and improvement. And, we must strive to make health care costs less of a burden on our lower and middle income citizens.

But it would be totally irresponsible for the Congress to enact legislation that would completely nationalize our health care system. Such is the goal of the so-called Health Security Act which is before the Congress. It envisions a total replacement of our private health insurance system with completely government-financed health insurance. More than 90 per cent of Americans do have private health insurance coverage. It may not always be adequate but the majority of policies meet at least the average needs for health care services. Now what is required is not federal health insurance, but government initiated incentives to bring down health care costs and to improve the quality of health care. We certainly

Despite what frequently heard from some of my colleagues in the Congress, the United States has possibly the very best health care delivery system in the world. While statistics can be assembled which appear to the contrary, my position is based on the facts taken in context with the complicated and changing nature of our society.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex.--Texans displayed at May 6 primaries a strong enough desire for new state governmental leadership to assure a change in top offices and a major legislative Reform candidates Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde and State Rep. Frances (Sissy) Farenthold of Corpus Christi charged into the Democratic gubernatorial runoff. Mrs. Farenthold scored a stunning upset over Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes. Gov. Preston Smith finished a distant third. Republican gubernatorial runoff candidates are State Sen. Henry Grover and Albert B. Fay, both of Houston.

Houston newspaper executive Bill Hobby lead State Sen. Wayne Connally of Floresville in the lieutenant governor's race and both already are campaigning hard for the June 3 runoff.

John Hill of Houston squeaked through without a runoff over Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin and Bill Pate of El Paso.

From there on, the statewide incumbents managed to stay on top. One, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, led widely but was forced into a runoff with a former employe Jim Wallace of Austin.

Former U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough has a runoff with Barefoot Sanders for the Democratic nomination to face GOP Sen. John G. Tower.

There will be at least 14 new faces in the Texas State Senate, and all observers concede the body will be more conservative than the present Senate. Six senate seats will be decided by runoffs. Republicans will oppose Democrats in 12 general election races. One Republican Senator is unopposed.

In the House, a total of 64 incumbents did not seek re-election or were defeated. (Actually, 14 were defeated.) Sixteen more incumbents were forced into House runoffs, including Speaker Rayford Price of Palestine. More than 65 incumbent representatives were renominated. Republicans were nominated in 76 of the 150 districts.

The U. S. Department of

Agriculture has allocated 25,700 acres in the Lower Rio Grande Valley for sugar cane harvest.

The allotment includes counties of Hidalgo, Cameron, Willacy and Starr. Allocation is the first in almost 50 years for Texas and according to U. S. Sen. John Tower, is expected to return a cash crop worth more than \$50 million to Texas growers.

Cotton, citrus and vegetables already are produced in the area, but Tower said growers need an additional crop with a stable economic base. Mainland sugar cane production in the U. S. has been concentrated in Louisiana and Florida. The allocation goes to the Rio Grande Valley Sugar Growers Inc., a cooperative which already has 2,500 acres in cane which will be used for seed in the scheduled September 1973 processing.

MISSION SEEKS BUSINESS--A 10-member Texas trade mission team in Moscow and Bucharest may return with more than \$60 million in business of oil drilling and petrochemical manufacturers.

Texas Industrial Commission said the mission which began last month offers an opportunity for Texas to take the first step toward capturing a portion of a virtually-untapped \$22 billion market in Eastern Europe.

The tour, organized by the petrochemical industry, is the first of its kind behind the iron curtain. It is designed to promote sales of oilfield equipment, refinery and chemical production equipment and instrumentation, controls and services of these operations.

STAMP PROGRAM PLANNED--The State Department of Public Welfare has been called on by the governor to develop a pilot food stamp program in preparation for a statewide plan. A state-funded program will be proposed in the special session of the Legislature next month. Federal courts have ordered all counties to have either a food stamp or a food commodity program for the needy. The stamp program is expected

to generate \$285 million in economic activity.

COURTS SPEAK--The American Party once more was unsuccessful in trying to have the new law providing state financing for primary elections declared unconstitutional by the State Supreme Court.

The High Court, in another case, held the owner of a factory in Hemphill was not liable for damages in an accident caused by an independent contractor hauling logs to the plant.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld a Hays County district court decision on preventing a contractor from bringing a second suit over the same paving

contract transaction against the Holiday Inns.

APPOINTMENTS -- W. E. (Buck) Tinsley of Austin has been re-appointed to a new six-year term on the Texas Water Development Board of which he has been chairman for the last year.

Governor Smith appointed Jefferson Kerney Brim Jr. of Sulphur Springs eighth district judge.

Smith picked W. L. Kindle of Houston, Mrs. Ida L. Kenney of San Antonio, Mrs. Printis E. Ellis of Paris and Dr. John T. King of Austin for membership on the Governor's Committee on Aging.

"BILLION DOLLAR" BOUNDARY VICTORY WON--Attorney General Martin hailed a favorable decision for Texas in a boundary dispute with Louisiana as "a billion dollar victory" for the state and the cities of Orange and Port Arthur.

A special master appointed by the U. S. Supreme Court decided Texas is entitled to the western half of Sabine River, Sabine Lake and Sabine Pass. Louisiana's claim to the entire stream was denied. Martin filed the suit in 1969. Louisiana will have an opportunity to file an objection to the master's decision in the court.

GRAND JURY PROBE BEGINS--Travis County grand jury this week began an investigation of hiring practices of two state legislators.

The panel subpoenaed daughters of Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford and Rep. John Allen of Longview and several other witnesses. Ratliff and Allen hired each other's children over a period of years.

House and Senate payroll clerks have been instructed to bring their records on certain employees of Ratliff and Allen. Ratliff resigned April 26 after widespread newspaper coverage of the hiring practices.
