The 75th Tri-State Fair in Amarillo opened last weekend and several Groom area residents have already come home with honors.

Cody Britten had a fabulous day at the fair. He earned two Best in Class winners and a Champion A.O.B. with his Chiannina heifers. Cody is a senior F.F.A. member at Groom High School. He is the son of Mr. Lynn Britten.

Groom FFA also was well represented in the ag mechanics competition. Last year's classes built a BBQ cooker for this competition. It is designed to look like an old fashioned 6-shooter. It placed 3rd in the competition.

Jessica McMahan will be showing her steers later in the week.

Jerry, Kelly and Calvin Schaffer, of Schaffer Farms, in the Groom-Pampa area, earned top honors in the Agronomy competition at the fair.

Jerry Schaffer earned the title of Premier breeder in Agronomy, earning top prizes in ear corn, seed corn, white grain sorghum, red grain

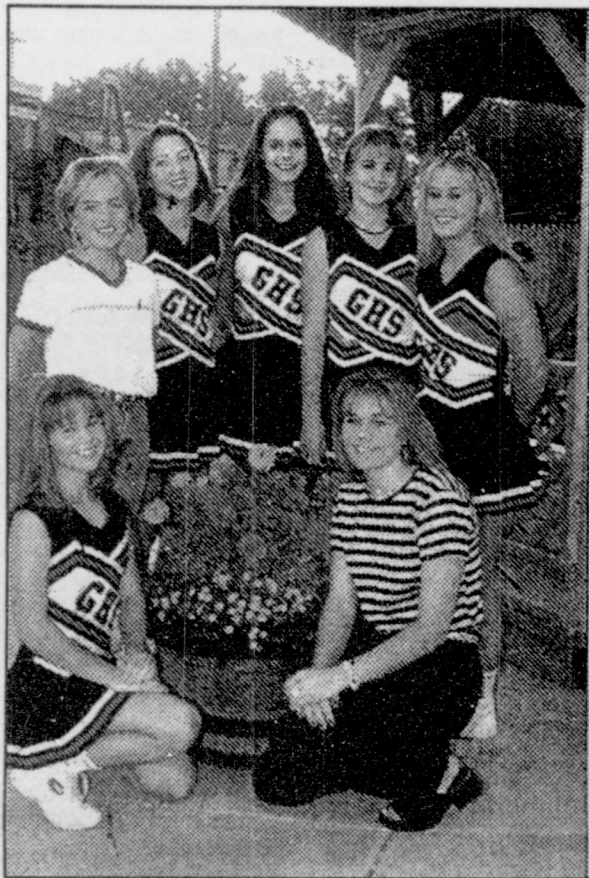
sorghum, soybeans and wheat.

In the Garden and Vegetable show Schaffer Farms earned 2nd place in Jalapeno peppers; 2nd place in Serrano peppers; 1st place chili peppers; 1st place banana yellow peppers; 5th place habanero peppers; 3rd place cherry peppers; 4th place in snap beans; 4th place in small tomatoes; 3rd place in Roma tomatoes; 3rd place in gourds; 5th place in mini-pumpkins; 1st place in eggplant; 4th place in summer squash; 3rd place in other summer squash; 1st and 3rd place in sweet pumpkins, 2nd place in medium field pumpkins; and 3rd place in other melons. The Schaffers placed 4th in the Garden Basket competition.

Tim Case and his mom, Karen Case, also competed in the Garden & Vegetable show and did very well.

Tim placed 4th in Jalapeno peppers, 4th in banana yellow peppers, 3rd in ornamental peppers; 3rd in mini pumpkins; and 4th in Big

Brumley Releases First Album



Rick Brumley recently released "The Horseman's Prayer", a collection of western songs.

Rick Brumley, a 1975 Groom High School graduate and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Brumley, recently released his first music album. "The Horseman's Prayer", named for just one of his original songs on the release, is available on compact disk or cassette tape.

Rick performs cowboy poetry, sings ballads and other county and western music. Some of his most recent performances include the National Cowboy Symposium held in Lubbock, which was held September 11-13, a performance for the Camp Alphonse Kids near Amarillo and The Nara Visa Cowboy Gathering in Logan, New Mexico.

He is scheduled to perform at the WRCA World Championship Ranch Rodeo November 12-14 and the American

Quarter Horse Association 50th Breeders Appreciation Dinner on Oct. 12.

Three of the songs on the recording are of Rick's own creation. "The Horseman's Prayer" was inspired by friends, Keith Calhoun and Craig Cameron, both who he credits for "being dear friends and good horsemen."

"Ridin' Free" was co-written by his wife, Regina.

"A cowboy friend of mine named Davis Ross gave me the idea for this song after listening to his story in the cook house of the Pitchfork Ranch one night. His story is probably true of many a good puncher," he stated.

"My Hands on the Reins" is the third original song.

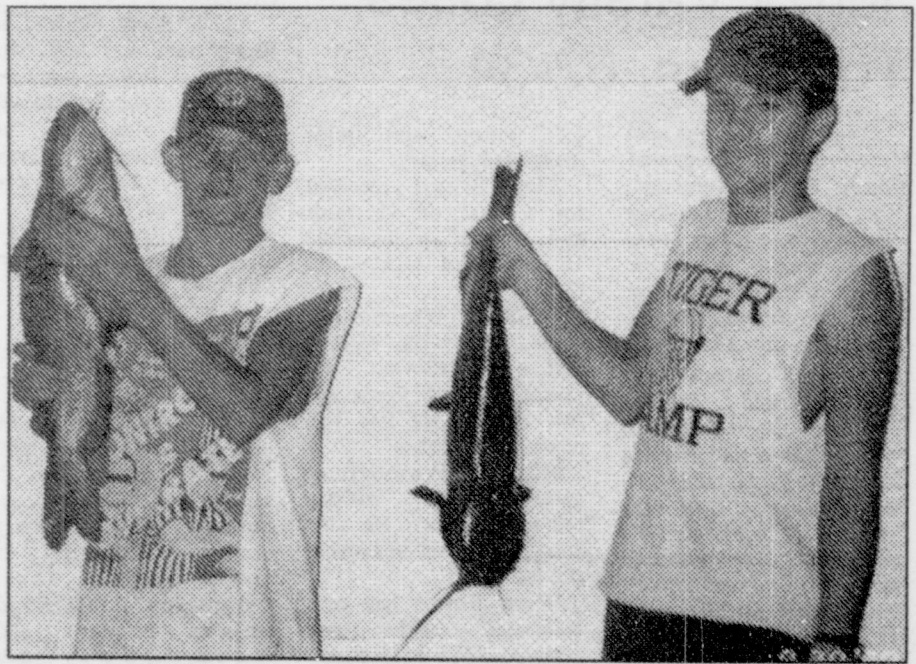

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
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Junior Varsity Loses To Lefors, 62-34

The team will run again in Wheeler on October 2.

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

Groom Tigers Beat New Home, 56-6

The Groom Tigers faced off with New Home last week in what proved to be one of their best games winning 56-6.

"We played the most solid offensive game of the season," stated Coach Larry Reid. "We ran more plays than in past games, throwing the ball more and also working

on our running game." New Home drew first blood early in the first quarter, scoring a touchdown on a 60 yard run.

"I think we may have been a little over confident until that point," stated Reid. "We began to handle the ball better beginning the second quarter."

"Alberto Vega has really improved this year. His speed has given us an edge. With his help we can keep our running backs fresh and acquire that additional spark we need," continued Reid.

Alberto Vega netted 125 yards on 11 carries for 4 touchdowns. He also received 1 pass for 31 yards and accumulated

27 yards on one kick-off return, and had three unassisted tackles.

Dean Fields carried the ball eight times for 81 yards and a touchdown. Dean intercepted a pass for a 60 yard gain for Groom. He also added six unassisted tackles.

Wade Ritter carried the ball 8 times for 53 yards and one touchdown. He also scored a T.D. on a 52 yard pass from Josh Evenson in the third quarter. Wade had one kick-off return for 10 yards. He earned two unassisted tackles.

Daniel Treadwell ran the ball six times for 42 yards. He threw for an extra 10 yards for Groom. He also completed four unassisted tackles.

Dusty Crump rushed for one yard and had four unassisted tackles.

Josh Evenson's quarterback leadership has a lot to do with the Tigers success this year. He connected on 6 of 7 passes for 139 yards and two T.D.'s. Josh had two punt returns for 31 yards and three unassisted tackles.

Evan Crowell caught three passes for 42 yards. He also had one punt return for three yards and had 7 unassisted tackles.

Chris Ollinger had an awesome night on the defensive line, accomplishing three quarterback sacks and a whopping eleven unassisted tackles. He also earned one fumble recovery.

Jamie Shuck continued to rack up the point after goals for Groom, kicking three earning 6 points for the Tigers. He collected 5 unassisted tackles.

Wyatt Weinheimer received two passes for 24 yards and one touchdown. He ran the ball in one a P.A.T. twice for two extra points. He had four unassisted tackles.

Groom ended the game with 18 first downs, 300 yards rushing, and 149 yards passing. The Tigers will play Cotton Center on Friday.

"Cotton Center will be a different kind of ball game than we have seen before. They have a 6'3" quarterback who throws the ball well. We will have to have our passing defensive skills honed. We will definitely be tested in areas that we have not been tested yet," commented Coach Reid.

The game begins Friday at 7:30 pm in Cotton Center.

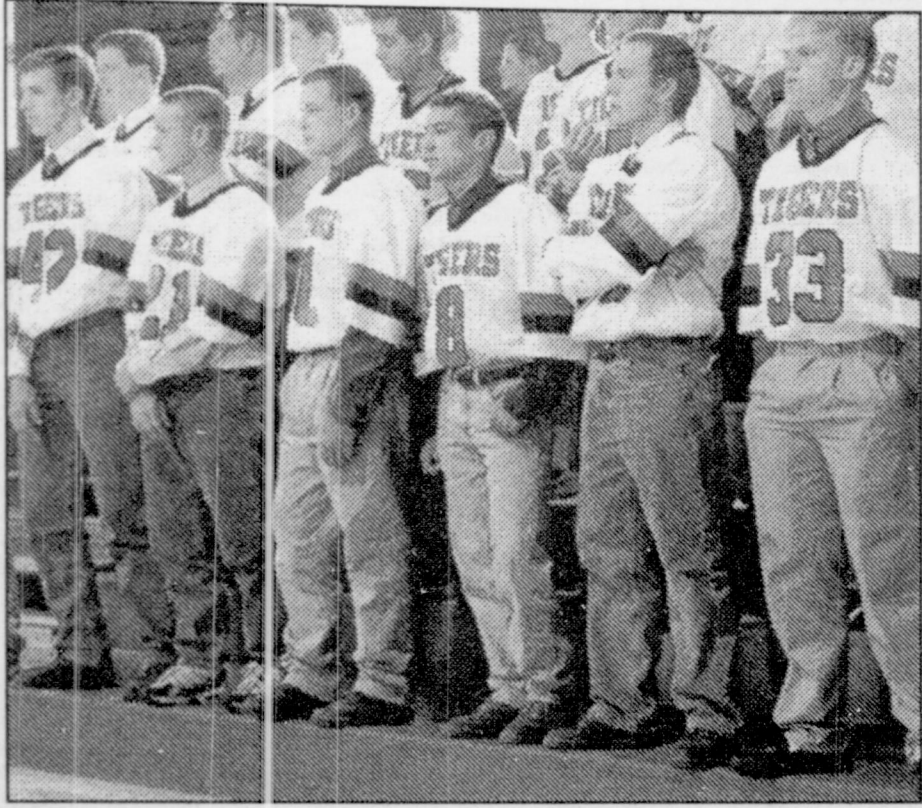

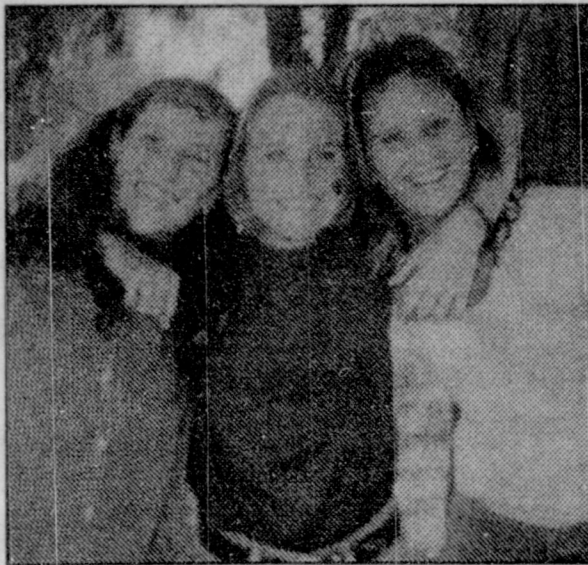

Cubs Show Silverton Who's The Boss

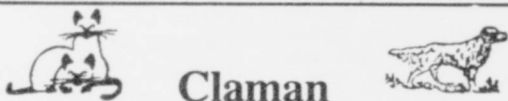
The McLean Cubs showed Silverton who was boss on Thursday when they came home with a victory of 32-20.

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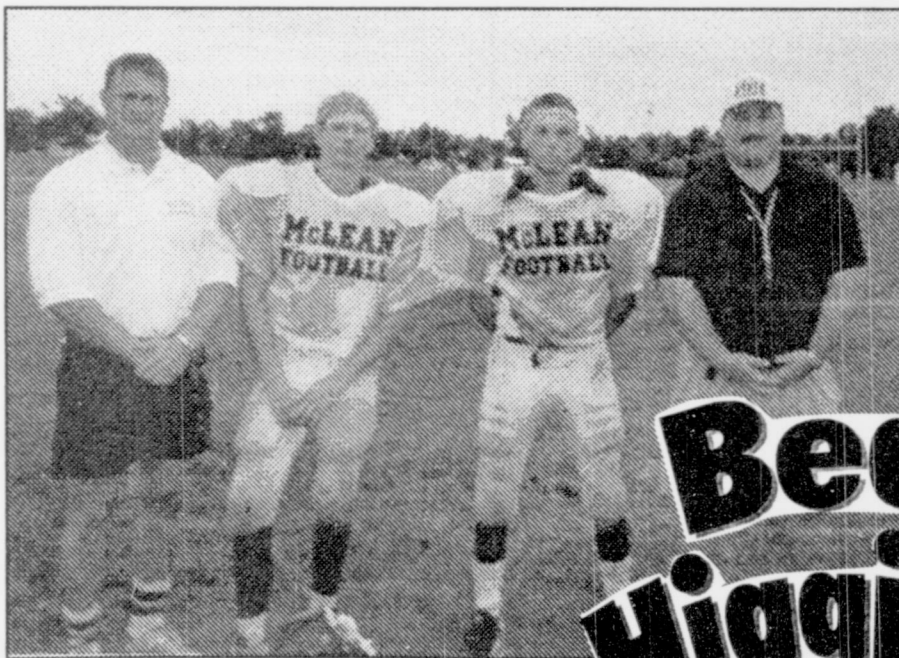
