McLean City Council **Approves Planning Group**

Tho City Council. of McLean met in regular Thursday, session February 1 1, 1999 in the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and opened with invocation by Sam Haynes at 7:00 p.m. with the following members present: Bob Martin, Sam Havnes, Ford Smith Jr., Jim McDonald, Gordon Sheplor and Charles McClendon . Others present: Fred Smith, Toni Bohler, Allen Mixon, Donnie and Mary Pam Skipper, Ann Pierce. Minutes of the January meetings were approved. All motions were unanimously approved unless otherwise stated.

Jarrett Atkinson from PRPC explained to the council the objectives of the Panhandle Water Planning Group, which is to design a 50 year water development plan for a 21 city region in this area and that the City of McLean's contribution to this plan was \$100.00. The council agreed to the contribution.

Pam Skipper explained to the council her concerns

about the tiger that has been in town on several occasions and that is kent in a cage in the back of a pickup. The pickup is usually parked in close proximity to her residence. She informed the council that she had talked to several people concerning this matter, including he county, parks & wildlife and Warren Chisum's office. The council agreed that her concerns were justified and assured her that they would talk to the county and other agencies to see ir they could somehow prevent the tiger from coming

into the city limits. The council agreed to the following resolution calling an election: "BE IT RESOLVED, that an election for full terms for Mayor and two (2) aldermen be called for the first Saturday in May, being May 1, 1999, with balloting at the Lovett Memorial Library in Mc-Lean, Texas, from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

and shall close March 17, 1999 at 5:00 p.m. Early voting shall commence on April 14, 1999 and end April 27, 1999, said early voting to be in the office of the City Secretary at the City Hall in McLean Texas and , shall be supervised by the City Secretion The council appointed

Bill Graham the city's election judge.

From The Carson County Appraisal District. Homeowners can reduce their property tax bills in 1999 by taking advantage of homestead exemptions. Application forms are available at the Carson County Appraisal District. Chief Appraiser Donita Davis informs homeowners that Texas law allows them to file a one-time application for homestead exemptions. These exemptions reduce the appraised value of the home. "You do not have to pay a fee to file for a homestead exemption," and Davis. Property owners who have never received the general homestead exemption on their homes in which they were living on January 1, 1999, and those who became disabled during 1999, must apply this year to receive exemptions for 1999. Homeowners for the deadlines in the appraisal district where the home is located. Momestead exemption. New state law provides that they may apply as soon as they turn 65, own the home, and live in the home as their principal residence to receive the over-65 homestead exemptions. must file signed, completed applications at the appraisal office by April 30. A homeowner's principal residence and yard are considered the residence homestead. It can include up to 20 acres of land and improvements (buildings), such as a swimming pool, greenhouse or other structure, as long as the owner uses them for residential purposes. Davis said that a property must meet four tests set by law to qualify for the residence homestead exemption. The person or persons claiming the exemption must own the property on January 1 (homeowners 65 or older need not own the property on January 1 for the over-65 homestead exemptions only); the property must be designed or adapted for human residence; the owner must use the property as a residence; and the property must be the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the exemption. A mobile home, even on leased land, can qualify for the exemption if it meets four tests. "A property owner can still qualify for the homestead exemption if part of the residence is rented out or used for other purposes, such as a home business," Davis said. "The home will not lose its exemption if the owner moves away temporarily, so long as he or she intends to return and doesn't claim another homestead exemption elsewhere." Texas law provides several types of exemptions for homeowners. For school tax purposes, all homeowners may receive a \$15,000 general homestead exemption and homeowners disabled or 65 or older receive an additional \$10,000 exemption.

receive a \$15,000 general homestead exemption and homeowners disabled or 65 or older receive an additional \$10,000 exemption. The school tax exemption for those homeowners 65 or older provides a special property tax "ceiling" for school taxes. While the market value of an elderly person's home may fluctuate with the market, the school taxes cannot increase above the tax amount in the first year the person qualified for that homestead for the over-65 exemption. The ceiling can increase, however, if the owner adds an improvement, other than normal maintenance or repair. When that happens, the new improvement is taxed at its current market value and the current tax rates. The new taxes are added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling. Senior citizens may transfer their tax ceilings to a new home. The homeowner transfers the percentage of school tax ceiling in or the last year the homeowner for the over-65 tax ceiling, to the new toome. The new tax ceiling is calculated to have the over-65 homeowner pay the same percentage of tax paid so the former home. For example, if an over-65 homeowner currently has a school tax ceiling of \$100, but would pay \$400 without the tax ceiling, the percentage of \$12,000. The homeowner may request a certificate from the appraisal district where the former home was located that gives information about the tax ceiling. The homeowner gives this information to the appraisal district where the new home is located. If an elderly homeowner dics, the surviving spouse may apply to keep the school tax ceiling if the surviving spouse was at least 55 years of age when the older spouse died. The over-65 homestead exemption will terminate when the home no longer qualifies during a tax year, either when the home owner moves or dies and has no surviving spouse. Taxes will be prorated based on the number of days that celapsed after the home no longer qualified for the exemption.

A 50 percent penalty is added to delinquent home taxes if homeowners fail to notify the appraisal district and receive nestead exemptions to which they are not entitled. Other types of taxing units - counties, cities, and special district - may offer different homestead exemptions. Inities must offer a \$3,000 general homestead exemption on the portion of the county tax levied for farm-to-market roads Col

or flood control. Any taxing unit's governing body may grant an additional optional exemption on the homesteads of disabled or

value the taxing unit adopts, the dollar amount of exemption for any home must equal at least \$5,000. Taxing units in Carson County that grant the percentage homestead exemption are Panhandle I.S.D. and White Deer I.S.D.

Veteran's Exemptions

"Veteran s Excemptions "Veteran s Excemptions exemption form at the Carson County Appraisal District office," Chief Appraiser Donita Davis said. A veteran's percentage of service-connected cability determines the size of the exemption. The exemption ranges from a \$5,000 to \$12,000 deduction from the veteral's property value. Davis explained who is eligible for the application: * a disabled veteran;

a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried;
a surviving minor child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

* a surviving spouse of a person killed while on active duty, whether the spouse has remarried or not at application time; and * a surviving minor child of a person killed while on active duty, if the child is both under 18 and unmarried. "Any eligible person who has not received this exemption must apply by April 30th," Davis said. "But, if you received the exemption in 1998, you do not have to reapply in 1999." An applicant may claim the exemption on only one piece of property, such as a home or any other property the applicant must be a Texas resident to qualify. 
