
PRPC's coloring book illed Andy The called Ambulance a 911 and Hero," was based on an actual 9-1-1 telephone telephone call made in Hemphill County, received a Gold Addy Award by the Amarillo Advertising Federation. Addy Awards are given annually to regional entities that exhibit communications excellence

The Gold Addy was ine Gold Addy was given to the Amarillo advertising and marketing firm of Johansson & Associates who designed, wrote, and produced the piece. "We entered the piece. "We entered the coloring book in the Public Service - Direct Marketing Specialty category," said April Johansson, principal of the firm. "There were a large number of entries in this category, including calendars and four-color booklets." Pieces were judged on

Pieces were judged on such criteria as overall design, creative concept, copywriting, ecution in print media. According to her firm and exe

Johansson, her firm worked to create a piece that people would not that people would not only look at, but hold on to and go over with their child. "I believe its usability and its exciting and informative message, coupled with the book's unique graphic design, worked together to

coupled with the book's unique graphic design, worked together to capture the top award." The actual 9-1-1 phone call that is depicted in the coloring book took place in Canadian. A woman who was about to drive her children to school walked in front of school walked in front of her running car to get something from the house. The auto slipped into gear and pinned her between the car and the porch. The mother's six-year-old daughter got into the car, moved it back far enough so her mother



could remove her leg, turned the ignition off, and then call 9-1-1. inside to ran

call 9-1-1. According to dispatcher Carol Ann Wilson who took the call, she was able to dispatch police and emergency units to the scene within ten minutes because of the timeliness of the call, as well as the maturity and calmness of the child. "She may have saved her mother's life," said mother's Wilson.

Wilson. As background for the book, Johansson was given a transcript of the original 9-1-1- emergency call made by the young girl. From that tape, Johansson's team was able to recreate the story in eight pages of simple dialogue and cle drawings, along with clever captivating four-color front and back cover of four-color Andy the Ambulance. The book was produced as an educational aid to help children learn the skills of using 9-1-1 of using 9-1-1 services. "We have

received very positive responses from the adults who have had an opportunity to review this coloring book with young children, said Pamela Nielsen, book Director of the PRPC's 9-1-1 Network.
