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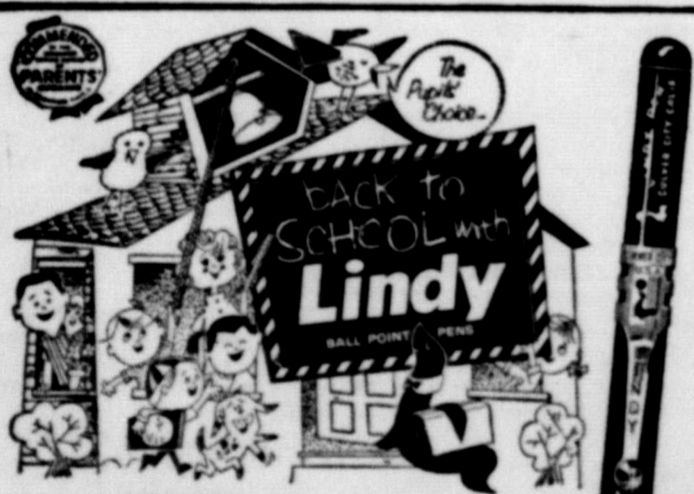

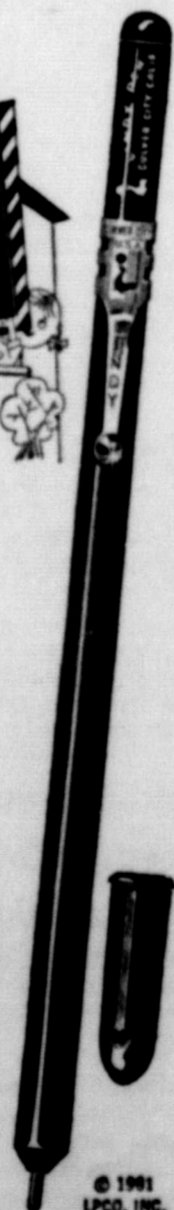

It will take a lot of fishing skill and patience to coax him from his lair and get him to strike a lure or natural bait. We will need all our fishing knowledge and maybe a little luck to land him. Non-fishermen wonder why neither rain nor dark of night will keep us from our rendezvous with "destiny". "Silly," some say, or "You're nuts," if they want to make their point stronger. A pox on them, we say.

They don't know that an "Old Fighter" is waiting for each of us. They don't dream about catching him. They miss the anticipation and they miss all the fun. All considered, we fishermen are a pretty lucky group, you know, and "Old Fighter" is happily ours along to seek.

Texas Retail Trade Statistics Shown In New Bureau Report

Automobile and truck sales, plus fuel, oil and accessories to them running took more than 28 per cent of Texas' retail sales in 1963. The state's retail clothing sales in 1963, less than 36 per cent was for men's and boys' apparel. More than one-fourth of retail business in Texas in 1963 was accounted for by food—groceries for home consumption and for meals and snacks eaten out. These are among statistics which appear in a new report on the 1963 Census of Business (Retail Trade) issued by the U. S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census.

This report, one of 10 covering the divisions of the United States and the nation as a whole, is "Retail Trade, Merchandise Line Sales, West South Central States." It is for sale by the Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., or by any U. S. Department of Commerce field office. The price of the report is \$2.75 and the entire set is \$24.60.

Farmers Should For Federal Gas Tax Refunds

It's time for farmers and ranchers to file their claim for refund on federal tax on gasoline used for farming or ranching purposes, says Donley County Agent Ronald Coch.

This claim will be allowed only if filed on or before Sept. 30, 1965. The period covered by this claim is from July 1, 1964, through June 30, 1965.

Any farmer or rancher needing form 2240, which is used in filing for the tax refund, can obtain them by contacting the county agent's office.

COLD WAR GI'S BILL PASSED

Now that the Cold War GI Bill has passed the United States Senate by more than a four to one vote, I have had many requests from all over Texas asking for more details about this bill and how it will affect the lives of the five million forgotten veterans of the Cold War—250,000 of them in Texas.

First, who is eligible for the bill? Any veteran with an honorable discharge who has served more than 180 days on active duty between Jan. 31, 1955 (the end of the Korean GI Bill) and July 1, 1967 (the end of the present draft) will be eligible for these benefits.

Second, what are the benefits under this bill? For each day of service a veteran will receive 1 1/2 days of educational assistance, with a maximum of 36 months of assistance to any veteran. This is long enough for four years of college, with nine months of schooling each year.

This assistance will be in the form of a monthly cash allowance paid to the veteran, but he must pay all of his tuition, books, living expenses, and other costs from this money. A single veteran with no dependents will receive \$110 a month; a veteran who has one dependent will receive \$135 a month; and a veteran in school with two or more dependents will receive \$160 a month.

You can see by these limited amounts that this is no bonus bill or boondoggle bill. These small amounts of money will not pay all of the costs of education, and a veteran will have to work or get a loan to stay in school. But this money would be a big help to these five million veterans who are trying to go to school after they serve their military duty.

These Cold War veterans will also be eligible for loans, similar to those under the World War II and Korean GI Bills, for the purchasing of homes or farms, including farm lands, livestock and equipment needed to start farming operations.

A veteran can use his educational allowance to finish high school, to go to college, or to take on-the-job training on a farm, in a business, or in a factory. By taking courses of training and education, we will equip these men to take their rightful places in our society.

The Cold War GI Bill will give these men encouragement, yet they will still have to work hard to get ahead. It is a good program for our veterans and for our nation.

CATTLE FEEDING

Jess Coleman is the proud owner of a new International feed mixer grinder. The mixing tank holds 105 bushels of ground grain or hay.

These small rather inexpensive mills are capable of mixing the feed requirements for up to 400 and 500 head of cattle. They are becoming more popular all over the country. Many people have them up on the high plans.

Jess and Max hope to feed around 150 to 200 head at a time. Most cattle are fed from 120 to 130 days a year. This would mean that a farmer or rancher would be capable of feeding out from 1200 to 1800 head a year. We look for an increase of smaller feed lots.

COTTON

Although the cotton crop is late, it does show a great deal of promise at this time. An old rule of thumb is that a bloom on Sept. 1 will make a mature boll of cotton with an average frost date. I've seen several fields that have from one-half to three-quarters potential. I am told that O. R. Blankenship has some cotton that could make a bale and one-half. I thought Blankenship was a cow man, not a cotton farmer. I've got to get by and see his cotton.

Earl Tarbet has some cotton that has a bale per acre potential. It is a pretty thin stand in places.

According to Henry Lowrance, remodeling of the gin will be completed some time before harvest. Henry is making a bid for the business of some of the larger producers in the Pampa vicinity. We have a few that have from 50 to 100 acre cotton allotments.

FARM PROGRAM

Many people are asking what we will have in a farm program. Legislation has now passed the House and is pending in the Senate. Here are only a few of the features that are now in the House-passed legislation:

The feed grain program has had some minor changes, but is basically the same. All programs, wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice will be for four years.

Fifty cents had been added to the 75c certificate now being paid farmers in the wheat program. Millers have paid for the 75c certificate on a certain portion of normal yield in the past. The new 50 cent portion will be taken from the public treasury.

A five year soil bank program was also tied to the bill. I don't have the details.

Keep in mind this has not passed the Senate. After it does pass, there will be a conference committee to work out changes between both branches of Congress.

The cotton sections of the bill seem to be the most controversial. Price support levels, cotton allotment, purchase or lease provisions are provided in the House-passed version.

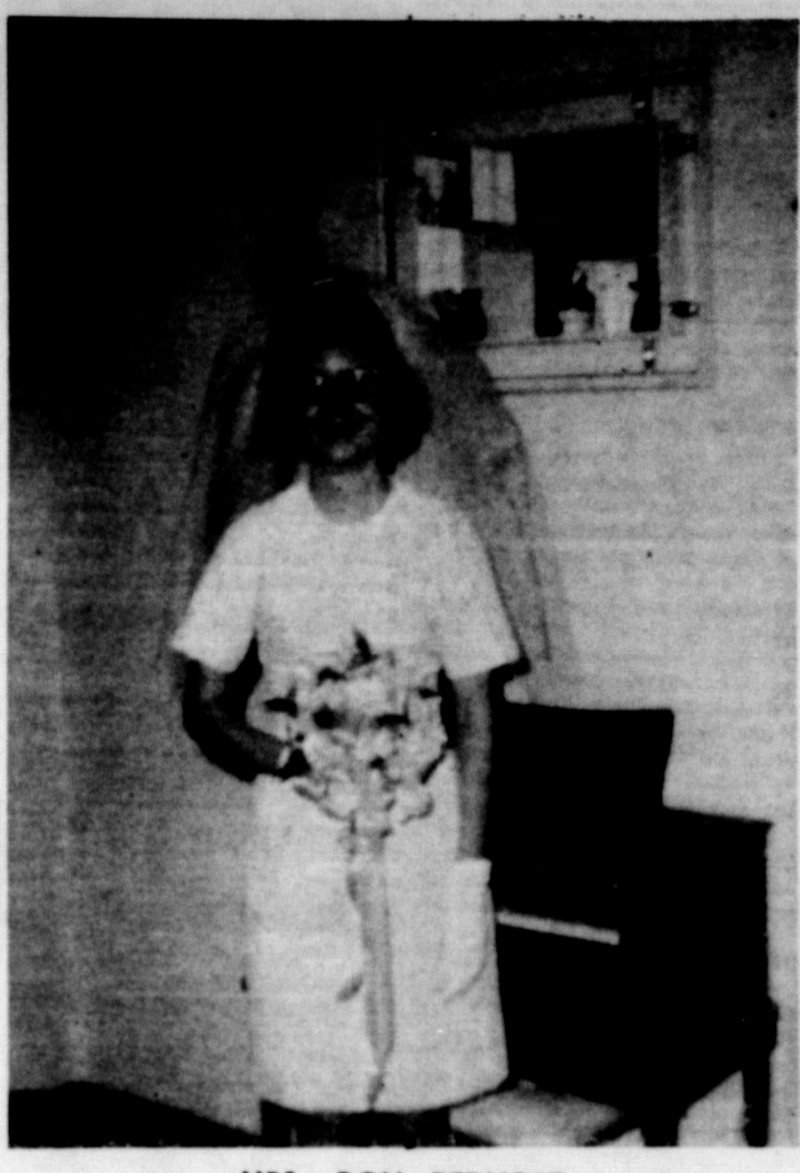

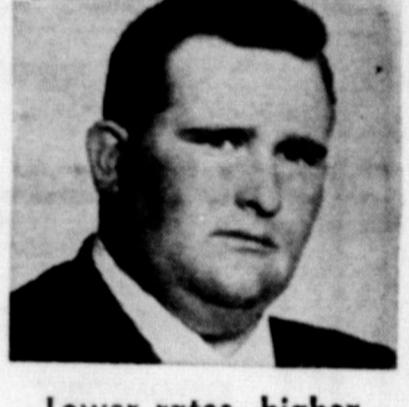

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Peace Corps to Test On September 11

An opportunity for McLean area residents to offer their abilities to the Peace Corps will come at 9 A. M., Saturday, September 11, at the Post Office in Pampa.

The opportunity is the Peace Corps Placements Test which is not passed or failed and you can't study for it. It measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language. If, for example, test scores indicate limited language acquiring ability, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking area. The test is used by the Peace Corps only as a tool in the matching of volunteers and jobs. The Peace Corps application is the most important indicator of suitability for Peace Corps service. It must be filled out and brought to the exam unless previously submitted.

Applicants should plan on about one and a half hours at the testing centers unless they wish to take the Spanish or French language achievement test, which requires an additional hour.

Hunting Season On Teal Opens Sept. 4

The special hunting season on teal which opens in Texas, Wyoming, and Colorado on September 4 is an experiment in species management, according to the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

The bluewinged teal is one of the most abundant of North American ducks, with a breeding population of about four million. Since migrating blue-wings head southward in the fall, ahead of the usual opening day for duck hunting, hunters do not have the opportunity to harvest many of them.

But blue-winged teal are also known to suffer a high rate of natural mortality. One answer being sought in this experimental season is whether these teal can sustain additional hunting without detrimental effects to their population levels. It is hoped that additional hunter harvest will merely substitute for part of the natural mortality.

A second goal, involving the hunter himself, is to determine whether hunters can accurately identify and shoot teal without ill effects to other duck species. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife officials emphasize that the hunter, himself, is on trial here, and the possibility of future special seasons will depend in large part upon the ability of the hunter to select legal teal and pass up shots at other ducks.

A number of different hunter surveys will be used to evaluate the experimental season's results. These include hundreds of observations of the hunter in the field by state and federal law enforcement officers and biologists, examination of thousands of duck wings submitted by cooperating hunters, and a mail questionnaire directed to holders of the special teal hunting permits.

Additional facts will be obtained by recoveries of leg bands from thousands of waterfowl banded in recent years, as well as from the annual breeding ground population survey studies which measure the effects of the season upon population levels.

Combined information from these sources will determine whether similar seasons will be allowed in future years.

No "mistake" ducks will be allowed, the Bureau warned. Teal hunters are cautioned, "Give waterfowl a fair deal—shoot only the teal."

Only the three species — blue-

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Charley West plans to do some land leveling on the Duncan Bros. farm north of Pampa. He has leveled approximately 25 acres and established it to alfalfa in the past two years. This land will be bordered to control the flow of irrigation water.

Drew Word is carrying out a sound conservation program on his farm north of Amarillo. He developed a 2,300 gallon per minute irrigation well last year. This well will be used to irrigate 160 acres of alfalfa and improved grasses. Drew has already established 40 acres of bermuda grass and 40 acres of alfalfa. Drew said, "This 630 acre farm would run only 35 grown cows before development of irrigation. With irrigation, improved pasture and alfalfa, I can run 200 cow units the year around."
