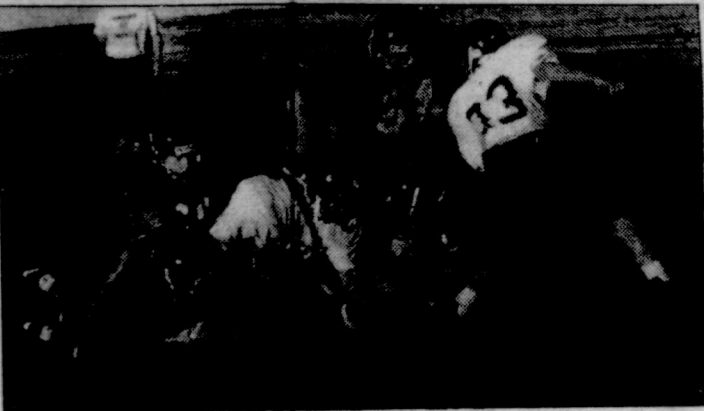

## Shamrock's Corner Drug Closes Doors

The Corner Drug Store, in Shamrock, a community gathering place for several decades, has heard the last of "tales to be told" after the recent big move.

Jim Wakefield, owner and pharmacist doing business in the building on the corner of Main and Second Streets, had an offer he could not turn down. That offer means marketable improvements and greater business opportunities for him and his family.

He came to the decision that he must desert the old, friendly, beloved Corner Drug to relocate in the Neighbors business building near Interstate 40. The Corner Drug, as it has been known and loved in

Shamrock for over 74 years, locked its door Saturday, July 17, 1999.

In 1978, Jim, his wife, Cheryl, and their son, Matt moved to Shamrock from Memphis, when he opted to have his own place for a pharmaceutical business and to sell other marketable shelf drugs and gift items. He had worked with Bill Lockhart of Memphis' Lockhart Pharmacy and Drug Company for three years. Their daughter, Lindsay, was born in Shamrock in 1982.

He had cut a deal with Mr. Cecil Park to buy Shamrock's old Corner Drug Store, that Park had operated from 1973 until Jim's ownership took it over on July 11, 1978.

## Tigers Fight Valiant Battle Against Groom's Team

The McLean Tigers lost in a competitive battle against the Groom Tigers Friday night with a score of 30-44. This puts the McLean Tigers at 4-1 for the season.

The first quarter saw no score for either team. The second quarter however, saw #30 Aaron Rice run for 80 yards on a kick off return for McLean's first score of the night. Then Rice ran for 25 yards and another touchdown for McLean. Frankie Sparling, #11 kicked both extra points

bringing the score to 16-6. Then Groom added to the board two more times and brought the score to 16-20.

The third quarter brought a 20 yard interception run by Brian Fuller, #37, and an extra point kicked by Sparling for a score of 24-20. Then Groom added to their score, again taking the lead, 24-28.

McLean would add to the score only once more with a 32 yard pass from #44 Chris Hauck to #9, Brett Montgomery. Groom added to the

board two more times for a final of 30-44.

In rushing the McLean Tigers had 27 carries for 290 yards and one touchdown versus Groom's 44 carries and 292 yards for five touchdowns. In passing, McLean had 8 completions in 17 attempts for 142 yards and one touchdown versus Groom's three completions in 14 attempts and 84 yards.



Q. What will happen when Jesus returns?

A. Many events will occur. Every eye will see Him (Revelation 1:7). The wicked will be separated from the righteous (Matthew 25:31-46). The righteous will be rewarded and the wicked punished (2 Thessalonians 1:6-10). The dead in Christ will be raised and the righteous on earth will be caught up in the clouds with them to meet the Lord in the air (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18).

Some have concluded from the visions of Revelation that Jesus will set up a kingdom on earth followed by a period of tribulation and then He will return a third time. The clear passages of Scripture do not allow for such speculation. The kingdom of Christ already exists and will be delivered up to the Father at the Second Coming, 1 Corinthians 15:20-28. In this passage, note especially, "...those who are Christ's at His coming, then comes the end..." 1 Corinthians 15:23,24. The Second Coming of Christ denotes the end of earthly things, not a new kingdom. The Apostle Peter clearly states that in the "day of the Lord," "the earth and its works will be burned up," 1 Peter 3:8-13. This happens when Jesus comes again, not at a "third" coming.

The writer of Hebrews says that we are in the "last days." The Greek word means "the last of all." After these days, there will be no more. When Jesus returns again, earthly time is ended and eternity continues.

The fundamental teaching as given by the prophets, Jesus and His Apostles, is to be prepared for His coming again. Jesus said, "Be on the alert then, for you do not know the day nor the hour," Matthew 25:13.

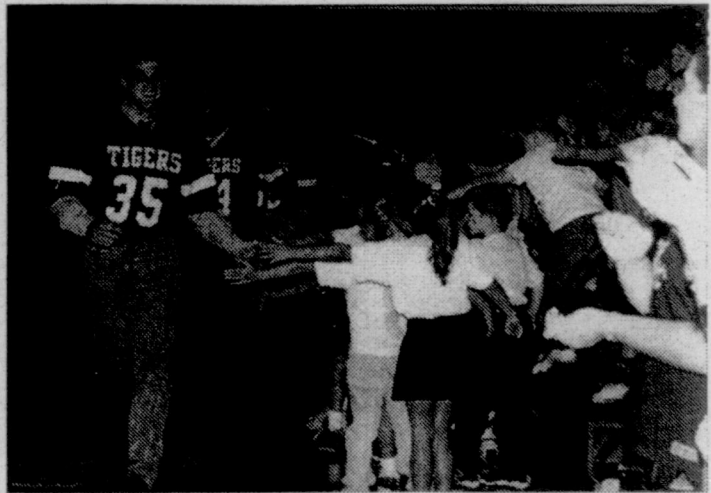

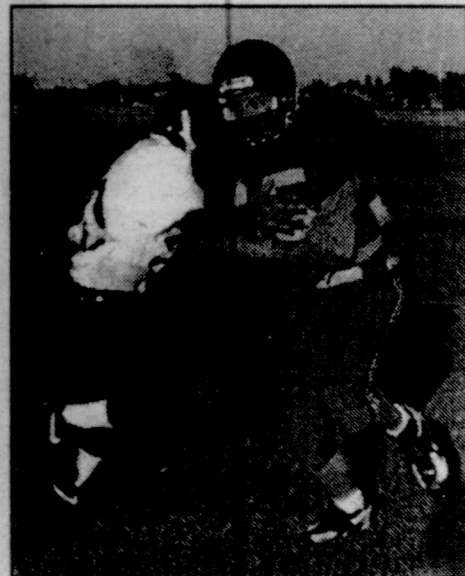

coach is borderline abusive, because they yell and scream, however I have seen coaches who quietly vented just as much devastation to a young player as the "screamer."

This is not the case at Groom. Coaches Reid and Rainer treat the boys with respect and encouragement. I don't mean that they never get on to them, because they do. But they do it in a way that does not destroy the child's self confidence or humiliate them in the process.

I think this is obvious in the way our boys respond to instructions they give them. I think the boys try harder because of this. I think we have a better team because of this.

When all the chanting and cheering is over, what we want for our children is that they have learned good sportsmanship and teamwork. If they can win in the process...that should be the gravy. Sometimes we all forget this.

I don't think our coaches do, however. I'm very thankful for that. Because it has not always been that way in Groom.

### If You Ask Me... And Nobody Did!

I am so proud of the way our coaches work together and set a good example for our children. Walking the sidelines at a game, you get a very

good feel for how the boys and the coaches interact with each other. You can't help but overhear when team members are getting instruction or correction on various points.
