"The U.S. has the safest and most secure estate tax will be repealed in 2010.
By 2006, the top income tax rate will be reduced from 39.6 percent to 35 percent; the 36 percent rate to 33 percent; the 31 percent rate to 28 percent; and the 28 percent to 25 percent. The 15 percent rate, paid by 75 percent of taxpayers, will not change.
A new 10 percent bracket was created on the first $\$ 6,000$ of taxable income for singles, $\$ 10,000$ for heads of households and $\$ 12,000$ for married couples.
All provisions of the tax bill will expire in 2010 and will have to be reinstated by Congress. This is due primarily to the fact that the bill was placed on a fast-track process, allowing limited debates.
"That means our fight is not over," Dudley said. "TSCRA must work diligently to retain these tax relief benefits.
Meaningful tax reform for working farm and ranch families was welcomed by Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association said President John E. Dudley. Congress passed
legislation that will allow legislation that will allow farm and ranch families to realize $\$ 272$ billion in tax relief over a period of 10 years-including a phased-out repeal of the death tax.
"TSCRA has worked very hard through effective communication to Congress and the general public on tax relief," said Dudley. "We applaud President Bush and those representatives and senators who supported this legislation that repeals the death tax and provides other meaningful tax relief to Texas cattle producers."

The tax relief package will also lower the income tax bracket, reduce the marriage penalty, provide education savings incentives and allow ranchers to keep money for reinvesting in the business.

Dudley explained that an operation worth $\$ 1.8$ million would generate an estimated \$50,000 net annual income. This ranch would face a death tax liability of roughly $\$ 450,000$-equivalent to nine years of the operation's annual income. The new tax bill gradually raises the estate tax exemption and lowers the rates. The exemption, which is currently on the first $\$ 675,000$ of assets, will increase to $\$ 1$ million in 2002 and up to $\$ 3.5$ million in 2009.
