West Nile Virus Hits McLean

Horses vaccinated for West Nile Virus should receive a booster after six months according to the Texas Animal Health Association. They suggest if your hoses are traveling to an area where the winter stays warm enough to sustain mosquitoes through the winter you should have your horses vaccination booster as soon as possible.

If your horses stay in this area you should have your horses vaccinated before spring and the weather warms up.

McLean had several cases of West Nile Virus. Local Veterinarian David Woods said he saw 15 cases and four horses died from the virus.

a skunk on the North side of Pampa within the city limits and left it in a yard.


Mr. Simmons was cremated under the supervision of Bailey-Ware Funeral Home.

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

Study Shows Groom Likely Site For Dairy

A small crowd gathered last week to hear what Mark Cummings of the Dairy Strategies, LLC had to say as they reported their findings to the Groom Economic Development Corporation. The GEDC had commissioned the group to do a feasibility study of area suitability of a dairy.

According to Mr.
Cummings, the news was very good for Groom,
Texas

"We have found two especially good sites in the Groom area," he said. "In general the area is perfect for a darry operation." He stated that the Groom

He stated that the Groom area has an excellent climate for livestock, abundant supplies of quality groundwater, high quality forage production capability and expertise, highly suitable land with deep soils to locate, build and operate dairy facilities, a history of success through commitment to the community, and the vision to expand opportunities through responsible development of a dairy.

The type of dairy Mr.

The type of dairy Mr. Cummings proposed is a 2,800 cow operation when it is in full production. He estimates that it would cost about \$6.1 million to develop and construct. It would employ about 35 people who would have an estimated annual salary of \$22,500 per year. He expects that the average annual revenues for the first 10 years would average \$5.3 million.

The facility would most likely begin with about 700 cows and double in size in it's fourth year of operation, increasing to the target of 2,800 head by the seventh year.

The economic impact would be a real boom to the local economy bringing new jobs, new residents, new salaries and new students into the community. The additional revenue in taxable sales, agriculture related businesses and increased commerce would be a tremendous shot in the arm to local businesses and taxing enmitties.

Two type of dairy operations were discussed, free stall barn type and open lot type. The free stall barn type is the most

desirable, according to Cummings.

Two specific sites mentioned by Mr. Cummings were especially good for a dairy operation. That is the Rutherford Property east of the Lark Elevators and the Kotara Property, north of the Lark Elevator.

Both properties have good qualities that dairymen look for, according to Cummings.

"Both have good paved roads and easy access to Interstate 40. They have good access to water, three-phase electricity, and accessible to natural gas. Both sites have the correct kind of soil that would be needed

According to Mr. Cummings, the next step would be to secure permits for either properties. This would need to be done by the land owners or a group of investors. During the permitting process, public hearings would be held to determine how well accepted a dairy operation would be in the Groom

The Groom Economic Development Corporation was encouraged by the information presented by Mr. Cummings

Mr. Cummings.

"We have fulfilled our goal to find out if this area would be suitable for a dairy," stated member Kim Ritter, "It will now be up to land owners and investors to keep the ball rolling."
