

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



Two diversion terraces were staked for Monroe Seitz Sr. on his farm east of Laketon. These diversions will help to protect cropland and prevent further gullying on ranchland. Monroe plans to seed some undesirable cropland back to grass. Seitz is carrying out a completed conservation plan on this farm.

George Dillman reported that his terraces worked real well during the recent heavy rains. George is doing a good conservation job on his farm. A farm pond was staked for George Ingrum on a place he operates northeast of Pampa.

Seeding of undesirable cropland back to grass can be very profitable. At the Woodward Experiment Station on a 6-year average native rangeland, well managed produced 40 pounds of beef per acre. Cropland seeded back to native grasses produced 87 pounds of beef per acre. Seeded native grasses out-produced native rangeand by 47 pounds of beef per acre. 80 per cent cost-share assistance is available for establishing cropland to grass. Up to 80 per cent cost-share assistance is also available for establishing desirable grasses on abandoned cropland and

rangeland in poor condition. Fertilizing is a very important part of a conservation cropping system under irrigation. bushels of grain sorghum removes 100 pounds of nitrogen, 50 pounds of phosphate and 30 pounds of wheat removes 50 pounds of nitrogen, 35 pounds of phosphate and 25 pounds of potash. Three tons of wheat straw contains 40 pounds of nitrogen, 15 pounds of phosphate and 70 pounds of potash.

Formerly this work, as well as cutting the "grass" for cannaries was dens by hand by local labor supplemented by foreign workers, largely due to the fact that the supply of domestic labor willing to do this hard, hot work is limited.

In addition, when ready, as-paragus has to be cut prompt-ly or the fields go to ruin. This year, due to denial of labor by Secretary Wirtz, asparagus fields were pleased up.

all of it will be harvested by this newly developed cutter.

However, this will remove to a great degree the annual treat of fresh asparagus on the American table, because the mass nust be geared to harvesting all "grass" for the canneries.

Thus, practically no labor will be required. Thus, two birds have been killed by one stone. No jobs, and little fresh asparagus.

Work has also been speeded up on the development of a mechanical tomato picker. This is dependent upon the experiment station of the University of California completing fact, much of it is shipped to world markets.

There are two outlets. One is the harvesting and sale of fresh asparagus, while the bulk is canned. Because it cannot be subjected to processes involved in canning, fresh as-
