




Two Groom Youth Named Candidates For Scholarship

Comptroller Issues Report

Texas State Comptroller Carole Koeton Strayhorn, has issued the State Sales and Use Tax Analysis Report for the first Quarter of 2005. The

Amarillo MSA (Metropolitan Statistical includes Randall, Potter, Carson and Armstrong Counties. The first part of the report is done by counties.

In Armstrong County 45 outlets (all industries) reported in the first quarter of 2005 compared to 41 in the same time frame in 2004. However, gross sales were down by -9.7%, \$1,813,347 compared to \$2,007,246. In the Retail

Trade division, a gain of 1.4% was seen with and increase of 23 businesses in 2005 from 16 in 2004. Gross sales for the first quarter of 2005 were \$1,220,635. In 2004, \$1,204,252 was reported.

In Carson County, 125 outlets reported in 2005 compared to 124 in 2004.

A gain of 8.8 % was seen from\$10,463,729 in gross sales in 2004 to \$11,386,509 gross in 2005. In the Retail Trade Market only 47 businesses reported only 47 businesses reported in 2005 compared to 59 in 2004. A 3.7% increase was seen with 2005 gross sales totaling \$6,062,783. 2004 gross sales were \$5,844,633.

Gray County had a whooping 44% increase with 644 outlets reporting in all industries in 2005 gross sales of \$209,904,788

compared to 603 outlets reporting gross sales of \$145,637,161 in 2004. The Retail Trade followed the same trend with 275 businesses reporting in 2005 compared to 277 in 2004. Gross receipts tallied \$141,809,674 in 2005 compared to \$89,375,972 in 2004, a 58% increase.

According to the Amarillo MSA the largest increase in the Retail Market Area was a 44.1% increase in the Building

Material market Consumers bought 7.4% less food than in 2004. Agriculture was up 2.1%.

Manufacturing was the biggest gainer with a 25.7% increase. Wholesale trade was down 33.9%. Financial Services was a gain of 9.8%. Other services dropped 22.6%


