Caution With Fires During Burn Ban

Due to the drought condiditions in the area, many grass fires have captured the land in Gray county and the state. The McLean Volunteer Fire Department has responded to several grass fires in the area and surrounding towns, not only battling fires but in most cases extreme high winds as well.

The Eastern Panhandle

Red Cross is urging residents to take precautions against wildfires.

They recommend that you meet with your family to decide what to do and where to go if wildfires threaten your area.

Create a 30 to 100 foot safety zone around your home. Within this area, take steps to reduce potential exposure to flames and radiant heat. Clear all flammable vegetation, including leaves, dead limbs and twigs. Remove leaves and rubbish from under structures. Ask the power company to clear branches from power lines. Mow grass regularly.

The Gray County Commissioners Court has voted that there be a burn ban in Gray County. Follow local burning regulations. When wildfires threaten your area, call local officials. If your advised to evacuate, do so immediately.

You can cope with disaster by preparing in advance. Meet with your family to create a disaster plan. Practice what you have discussed.







One Day Course To Be Held On Crop Insurance Marketing

A M A R I L L O Producers wanting to learn how to evaluate crop insurance alternatives are invited to attend a one-day short course. Incorporating Crop Insurance into the Marketing Plan will be held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Jan. 24 at the Texas A&M University System Agricultural Research and Extension Center here.

"If you've ever wondered about the pros and cons of the various crop insurance products or what is the best level of insurance, you need to attend this course," said Dr. Steve Amosson, Texas Cooperative Extension economist.

"The instructor, Dr. Art Barnaby, is one of the leading authorities on crop insurance products," Amosson said. "He was one of the developers of crop revenue coverage insurance." Barnaby is a professor of agricultural economics at Kansas State University in Manhattan, Kan. He will cover hail,

multi-peril and crop revenue coverage, as well as other insurance currently or soon to be available.






