Firestorm - Worst In Texas History
City Of McLean Encircled By Fire's Rage

On Friday, March 17 at 9:00 a.m. in City Hall the City Council of McLean and Mayor, Bob Martin and Mayor, Bob Martin will sign into effect a the City of Mclean. This will qualify the city to apply for funding for diraster relief due to the fires that have swept through the panhandle.
The fires began on Sunday morning around 11:30 a.m. traveling down and around highway 273 north of Mclean. The fires, fiveled by 40 phus mph winds, quickly approeched the nime mile station, threatening homes in that area.

One home was lost in the blaze at the nine mile station Seven miles north of Mclean, Johrusic and Mary Aan Carpenter lost their home to the blaze.
Highway 373 was shut down from McLean to Lefors with flames, smoke dowa power lines, and cattle making it impassible. The highway was re-opened on Monday afternoon.

At the same time, firefighters were fighting approsching fires five miles north of Alanreed. The homes of the Darsey's, Thompson's, Lewis's, Bruce's, and Stubbs' along with others in the area were saved.

The fires approached Alanreed and destroyed some vacant buildings and land. Near Alanreed, Jim
and Evelyn Shaw and Bob and Colleen Sherrod lost their hor

At 7:10 p.m. Sunday, the city's emergency sirens began to blow for a voluntary evacuation of the town as it wn surround on threc sides fire.

With 1-40 shut down
due to fire and smoke, ree idents of the McLean Care Center were loaded into buses from the school and were taken to Sbamrock for safety. M.ny other residents of MLean also stayed at metels in Shamrock and on into Otlahoma.

Firefighters from McLean, Kress. Sbamrock, Groom, Anıarillo, Canyon, Tulia and Lefors fought fire batles from Sunday morning until Monday nip be. Fires sprung up agu in Tuesday afternoon.

Two McLean firemen were injured while fighting fire. Toby Huchison injured a knee and Butch Warner rectived minor bums to his face and arm. He was later taken to the Sh umrock Hospital for bne athing problems and ch lls and was later tre isported to Amarillo.

Volunteers from evcrywhere showed up to heip. The Red Cross and the Salvation Army both brcught supplies and food to the firelighters at the Mc Lean Fire Station.

According io The Te cas Forest Service, over 350,000 acres have beu ned in Gray County.

Mayor Bob Martin told the McLean News that seven structures were lost to he fires. The loss of livestock to the area is uni nown at this time, but is expected to reach the hundreds possibly hundreds possibly
the usands around the theusands around the Mclean area.

In the panhandle, 11 per ple have lost their lives due to the fires.

## Tough Decisions Lie Ahead For Panhandle Ranchers

The grass is gone destroyed by fire. Hay is short. Soil moisture is almost non-existent. Some ough decisions lie ahead for ranchers caught in the wake of the recent fast moving wildfires. a Texa Cooperative - Extension specialist said.
Something that is important, after they ge through the emotional part of this, is looking at the long-term," said Dr . Ted McCollum. Extension livestock specialist. "The cold. hard fact is if we don't get any significant rain in the next several months, those rangelands that burned up aren't going to be able to
arty iny cattle until next tail.
Ranchers need to realiz that tecause of the drought in ot ier parts of the state. hay supplies are very short. McCollum said. Hay . if any found, will have to come from some other part of the state with transportation costs and logistics added.
Ranchers opting to cont nue feeding their animals have several options. he said.
Low quality hay can be supplemented with concentrated nutrients to bala ice out what the cattle need. McCollum said, but the tiggest issue is trying to find the bulk feed the cattle need.

Te other option may be
traditional thinking of feeding hay and feed a more concentrated diet, he said. Fewer pounds of feed would be required. but the cattle would have to be fed in a trough or on the ground. Cotton burrs are another option with some supplement, he noted. The other option to feeding is selling the cattle, he said. "This might not be the best time to be selling," McCollum said. "But they need to weigh the alternatives of selling now versus the feeding costs. Look at de-stocking partially or fully. The net loss or net gain of selling out now and buying back
later may be relatively the same as trying to figure out how to feed those cows for several months. The problem is soil moisture, he said. The recovery of those areas is going to be slow. "If we get any rainfall in the next month or so, the recovery may be better than people think it is," McCollum said. "The key factor: can we get

But regardless of whether the rain comes, the carrying capacity is going to be a lot lower than normal. Where stocking rates average one cow per 25 acres, even with rain. ranchers would face stocking at less than half of that, or one cow per 50 or more acres. The range needs to be at 2 to 3 inches of growthon perennial gasses.
o) il may be June before grazing would he available, even with rain McCollum said. Without rain, animals can't be put on the pasture until next fall. Buying hay or finding pasture now is a temporary top-gap managemen meastre, he said. Without rain, all a produce is doing is delaying some decisions.

## Schaffer Hoine Destroyed By Prairie Fire



The Sunday fires that swept the are a by high winds were too much for local firefighters os the home of Monte and Sandy Schaffer was burned to the grownd. They not only lost their home, but lost much of their farm equipment and semi-truck The Schaffer home is located approx mately 10 miles east of Groom.

An "ill" wind blew across the great staked plains. With it came destruction. People of the panhandile were forced to flee from their homes in several communities after prairic fires fucied by nearly 60 mile per hour winds threatened everything in its path.

Groom Firefighters and other volunteers were first called to action around 11:30 a.m on Sunday. Smoke from the blazing prairie fire soon created enough smoke to cause visibility problems along Interstate 40. It was not long before there was
a 10 car accident that took the 1 ves of at least 4 people and injured at least 6 move. Life Star was called out to help evacuate the iajured. In one attempted landing, the helico ter had to make several attempts to line up in the high winds land safely. Most of the critica ly injured were sent to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo for treatment. Groom EMS set uy a triage center in the Ciroom Community Center for a while to deal with the injured.

Along with nearly a million acres of prairie
and CRP grasslands, at east 25 structures were burned to the ground. At press - time, the News had confirmed that the Monte Schaffer home and the permit office at Lake McClellan all were completely destroyed. Howardwick Fire Department had a fire truck overturn. On board was a former Groom man, Joey Garcia. He was severely injured and is currently in Northwest Texas Hospital Two exas Hospital. Two ther firefighters were severely injured in the accident.

Interstate 40 was
completely shut down for a good portion of the day. Traffic was backed up at Trafic was backed up at ne time from the mile 123 marker to the 113 exit, about 10 miles. Traffic was rerouted to 287 from Amarillo to Childress. At one time here were over 700 700 vehicles backed up at Clarendon. Highway 287 closed for a while near Hedley.

Firefighters and equipment were bought in from all over the Texas panhandie as well as Oklahema and New

An estimate 700,000 acres burned in 14 diflicrent grass fire takiag out as many as 25 structures and causir seven fatalities. But the untoid number is the amorunt of livestock injured and dead in the wake of the fire. As maxay as 25,000 cattle a e estimased to have been on the burned rangeland, said Dr. Steve Amosson, Texis Cooperative Extensic a economist. Included in the damage is the loss of pasture, which was at minimum already due 10 the drought, and the burned fences that can cost as much as $\$ 10,000$ per mile to replace.

Find them, get them adequate nutrition and then consult your veterinarian," said Dr. Robert Sprowls, assistant agoncy director of the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory Sprowis.
"If they can be moved to unourned ground, it is best," Sprowls said. "Get them to fresh water and then rotate their feeding area to prevent the buildup of pathogens."

The most important thing is to get livestock is to high-quality forage with a protein and mineral supplement and good water, Sprowis said. If the water, Sprowis sai. livestock don't get adequate nutrition and water immediately, their health can deteriorate rapidly. The fires came at a very inopportune time

for ranchers who are beginning the calving season, said Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension livestock specialist. Not only will there be damage to the animals, but the dry soil profile doesn't promise any recovery of those rangelands anytime soon unless significant rain falls. "We probably had a lot of calves that were laying out susceptible to the fire, as fast as it was moving across there," McCollum said. "They had no place to go. Also there will be a lot of mothers with potentially scorched udders. The calves that survived woa't be able to suckled the mothers who have sore udders."
Analyzing injuries to cattie following a wildfire is important to minimize losses, said Dr. Floron
"Buddy" Faries of Texas A\&M University in College Station, Extension program leader for veterinary medicine.
"It might look like they've made it and there was no visible physical damage," Faries said However, it's important o have them looked at by veterinarian as soon as possible because there could be secondary problems that lead to infections and further problems."
Health disorders, such as burned eyes, feet, udders, sheaths and testicles, as well as smoke inhalation with lung Iflamation and edema re the most commo are the most common problems, he said.
"One of the problems we've run into in the past is with the feet," said Ron

Gill Extension livestock specialist in Stephenville. "It may take 10 days to two weeks for the damage to start showing. The cattle will start sloughing he hoof wall and become crippled." Extension and veterinarians are working on determining major ymptoms to look for and hat actions look for and lameness begins to appear, he said.
"To assure the welfare of the affected animals, veterinarians need to be consulted," Faries said. If, in the event the animal is not going to be is is not going to be ble to be treated decisions concerning sending them to market need to be made immediately, before secondary complications develop." Faries advised having an animal evacuation and rescue
plan in place and implementing it ahead of a wildfire. The plans should include ways of moving livestock out of the fire danger zone and preventing any damages. This may include hauling the livestock out in trailers, or opening gates or cutting fences and releasing the livestock, allowing them to move to a safer place, including plowed ground or wheat pasture, he said. A fire danger zone is where the livestock risk inhaling smoke, he said, and will change according to the wind direction. Smoke can move for miles, and cattle that are not near the flames or heat could suffer some damage, Faries said. Contact with burning grass, weeds and brush causes immediate buras, he said.
