Traditionally, Memorial Day kicks off the season of summer vacation driving and rising gas prices. However, this year gas prices got a jump on breaking records.

According to experts right now extra miles can be squeezed out of every fill-up if drivers follow a few simple rules. 1) Smooth out your

driving style by avoiding "jack rabbit" starts and

waste gas. Slow down and 2) maintain a constant speed.

sharp breaking.

If road conditions permit, use the cruise control. 3) Air conditioners can account for a 10-15%

impact on mileage. 4) Accelerate a little as you approach a hill, rather than hitting the gas and switching gears once on the incline

5) Lighten the car's load by removing all unnecessary items from the trunk. Every 200 pounds of weight reduces gas efficiency by one mile per gallon.

6) If you have to carry a lot of baggage, avoid using a roof-top container. They will increase the air drag. If you drive a pick up, the open bed will have the same impact, so put a cover on it.

7) Keep your tires inflated to the level recommended by the manufacturer. 8) Pan your trip routes



Charles Howard Roan, a Marine who threw himself on a grenade during a

furious firefight with the Japanese on the island of Peleliu on Sept. 18, 1944. Roan received the Medal of Honor posthumously for his heroics.

"Both of these men exemplify the military tradition of service and sacrifice," Patterson said. "Mike Ussery's lifetime of service to Texas veterans has left a mark that will S last forever. Pfc. Charles i Roan 's sacrifice for his P brothers-in-arms should not be forgotten. It is only appropriate that this home share their names and honor them both as Texas B herce t."

Mike Ussery was born on Aug. 19, 1929, and was raised in a home dedicated to serving veterans. Both his parents, Walter and Rosamond Ussery, were lifelong employees of the Veterans Administration. Rosamond Ussery was one of the first occupational thera jists.

thera ists. Usery enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1951 in St. Louin, Missouri and graduated from Officer Cand date School in Fort Riley, Kansas in 1952. He was discharged as a captain in 1953 and continued his service in the active reserve through 1954.

1954. Usery made his living as a real estate broker and manu gement consultant, and lad a 35-year career with Linen Supply and Industrial Supply. His

service to his community included leadership positions with numerous veterans groups, non-profit organizations and the Republican Party.

Republican Party. In 2001, Gov. Rick Perry appointed Ussery to the Texas Veterans Land Board, where he served until his death in 2005. As a member of the Veterans Land Board, Ussery was dedicated to bringing a State Veterans Home to Amarillo.

Amarillo. Pfc. Charles Howard Roan was born in Claude on Aug. 16, 1923. He enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps at the Amarillo Post Office in December 1942 and joined the 1st Marine Division in the South Pacific. Roan made landings in New Guinea and at Cape Gloucester on New Britain Island, and was killed in action on Sept. 18, 1944 after six days of fighting on Peleliu. Pace diad Cape

days of fighting on Peleliu. Roan died fighting when his squad was partially cut off from its company on an exposed nidge while aggressively attacking entrenched Japanese. A grenade injured Roan during a furious exchange with Japanese forces in a cave to the rear of the squad as the five men sought protection in a small depression in the rocky terrain. When another grenade landed nearby, Roan flung himself upon it, absorbing the full impact of the blast with his body and saving the lives of four men, according to his Medal of Honor citation.

President Harry Truman presented Roan's Medal of Honor to his family in July 1945.

Local veterans groups, community organizations and interested individuals were encouraged to submit names for consideration as the home''s namesake. Roan and Ussery were selected from the names submitted. Each of the existing six Texas State Veterans Homes was named through the same process.

Construction on the A marillo home commenced in August 2005 and continues on schedule. The home is

Revie w by the Appraisal review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for at ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the Carson County Appraisal District at 102 S Main, PO Box 970, Panhandle, TX, 79068, or by calling 806-537-3460

of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it

Note: You should not try to contact ARB members outside

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taker

DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE APR

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information

Special deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February The ARB decides whether a required notice was 1) mailed to you. *************

Soil and Water conservation districts provide a practical and democratic organization through which land owners are taking the initiative to properly use and protect our natural resources.



State law requires county appraisal districts to notify property owners about changes in their property's value. Around May 15, the Carson County Appraisal District will mail property owners letters wing their 2006 proposed appraised value.

Donita Davis, chief appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the letter of appraised value is not a tax bill.

Davis emphasized the importance of this letter and the key information that it contains. "If an informal agreement cannot be made with the appraisal district, the property owner has the right to appeal to the Carson County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership, and other areas," she said. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest and a protest form.

What should a property owner carefully review? "Look at the proposed value for 2006," Davis said. "The letter states the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current The letter also includes current year information on exemptions granted on the property. It provides last year's value, also.

Letters to property owners will also include "estimated" taxes. These taxes are based on the new taxable value and the taxing unit's tax rate from the prior year. Final tax amounts may vary from the 'estimated" amounts.

Davis asks property owners to check the legal description and mailing address to be sure there are no mistakes. "If the letter has an old address, please let the appraisal district know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time, and tax bills do not go out until October," Davis added.

A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address, and is also liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill that is not paid on time.
