

#### Why We Boost

We are always glad of an opportunity to publish prosperity news to the world concerning the McLean country, and not long ago we printed an item concerning the grape crop on the vineyard belonging to F. M. Littleton in the southeast part of the city. Since publishing that notice the remainder of Mr. Littleton's crop has been harvested and it develops that from his one acre of vines, planted three years ago, he has marketed 1500 pounds of grapes, for which he received ten cents per pound, making a total value of grapes are as fine as ever grew in California, or any other place, all the bunches being well filled and of a delictous flavor.

These vines were set out three years ago at a combined cost, for labor, fencing, etc., of \$42. Last year the crop was sufficient to pay for this outlay, conequently this crop is practically lear profit, and it occurs to us that crops of this kind would soon pay for the land they are occupying. Mr. Littleton is very enthusiastic over the big rield and says that the local narket is strong and he could nave sold many times what he aised without leaving town with hem, and at the same price.

A few acres in this profitable rop would soon grow to a big noney maker and the work of tending them is practically noth ng compared with that expend ed on corn and other crops that will not yield more than \$15 to 525 an acre, gross. Suppose you ake ten acres out of your corn erop and plant it to grapes.

## Uncle Sam Knows

-that the greatest strain comes on a shoe right where the tip joins the upper. He knows that a cut-off vamp shoe (pieced at the toe) simply can't stand the strain of hard wear and much walking. That pretty soon the threads pop, the tip pulls away from the upper and all the wearer has is a shoe in two pieces. For when men build a bridge they make it strongest at the place where the greatest strain is going to come. If they made it weakest there to save a little money you could not understand it. Yet most of the shoes made are cut-off vamp shoes (pieced at the toe) the kind that is weakest at the point of greatest strain. In a full vamp shoe the vamp leather continues on down under the tip to the toe where it is sewed into the sole. The strain then comes on a solid leather instead of on two rows of thread and a bit of glue.
