SEASONABLE DISHES.

Variety is the aim of most cooks, to-



gether with economy and palatability; we have three very important points to consider. The following dishes may

prove suggestive: Flaked Fish and Vegetable Hash .---Take equal parts of old boiled potatoes, beets, carrots and

turnips finely chopped. Season to taste with paprika, celery salt and a quarter of a cupful of cream, season with a teaspoonful of worcestershire sauce and turn into a heated frying pan which has been greased with a tablespoonful of bacon fat. Stir the hash rapidly until well heated, roll and et brown, turn on to a hot platter as

Eggs Scrambled With Dried Beef .over six slices of dried beef with soiling water, let stand ten minutes, and drain; if not too salty this is not necessary; shred in small pieces, Beat two eggs slightly, add three tablespoonfuls of milk, and the beef. Malt two tablespoonfuls of butter in a saucepan, add the egg mixture and stir until of a creamy consistency.

Baked Rice With Cheese .- Put a upful of rice into a quart of boiling water with 11/2 tenspoonfuls of salt, sok for an hour or until soft. Melt three tablespoonfuls of butter, add three of flour, and when smooth add two cupfuls of hot milk; cook until smooth and thick, then add one cupful of finely cut cheese and mix lightly with the rice. Put into a buttered bakng dish and cover with buttered rumbs. Brown and serve piping hot.


Pear Salad .- Place balves of canned pears on head lettuce served with the following: Two tablespoonfuls of olive oil, one teaspoonful of vinegar, salt, pepper and a bit of French mustard to aste. Roquefort cheese may be added, a tablespoonful or two mixed with the dressing, and the pears may be cut in strips and served on crisp watercress.

Mix all together and cook two minutes, then moisten with a cupful of chicken stock. When boiling add the meat of half a fowl torn in shreds and let symmer for ten minutes, add three tablespoonfuls of cream and season with salt and pep- er?" per. Serve with fresh boiled rice.



Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution, providing for and rela-ting to the creation of Conservation

Senate Joint Resolution No. 12. oposuig to amend Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto at the end thereof another section to be known as Section co declaring the conservation and preservation of all the natural re-sources of the State of Texas are public rights and duties; providing the creation of conservation districts, declaring such districts bodies politic and corporate, defining the au thority of such districts, and conferring upon the Legislature authority to pass laws with reference thereto; delaring that the Legislature shall have authority generally to legislate for the purpose of conserving the natural resources of the State; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection od said proposed constitutional amendment; making certain provisions for said election and the ballots thereof and the methods thereof ; directing the issuance of the proclamation therefor, prescribing certain duties of the Governor of the State and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article 16 of the

Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto at the end Section 59, and which shall read as fol-

Section soa. The conservation and sources of this State, including the con trol, storing, preservation and distribu-tion of its storm and flood waters, the waters of its rivers and streams, for irrigation, power and all other useful purposes, the reclamation and irrigation of its arid, semi-arid and other lands needing irrigation, the reclamation and drainage of its over-flowed lands, and other lands needing drainage, the con-servation and development of its fore te, water and hydro-electric power, the navigation of its inland and coastal waters, and the preservation and conserva-tion of all such natural resources of the State are each and all hereby declared ublic rights and duties; and the Legis ature shall pass all such laws as may be appropriate thereto.

(b) There may be created within the State of Texas, or the State may be hvided into, such number of conservaon and reclamation districts as may be determined to be essential to the ac-complishment of the purposes of this mendment to the constitution, which stricts shall be governmental agen ies and bodies politic and corporate with such powers of government and with the authority to exercise such rights, privileges and functions concerning the subject matter of this amend-

ment as may be conferred by law.

(c) The begislature shall authorize all such indebtedness as may be necessary to provide all improvements and the maintenance thereof requisite to the achievement for the purpose of this amendment, and all such indebtedness may be evidenced by bonds of such conservation and reclamation districts, to be servation and reclamation districts, to be be prescribed by law and shall also authorize the levy and collection within distributed, as may be necessary for the payment of the interest and the ereation of a sinking fund for the payment of such bonds; and also for the maintenance of such districts and im provements, and such indebtedness shall a lien upon the property assessed for islature shall not authorize the issuance of any bonds or provide for any indebtness against any reclamation district uning voters of such district and the prop-

osition adopted.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held for such purpose on the Third Tuesday in August, A. D. 1017, the same being the 21st day of August, A. D. 1017: At said election the vote shall be by official ballot which shall have printed or written thereon the words "For the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their gov-ernment and regulation," and also the words "Against the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State stitutional amendment shall erase the words "Against the amendment to Artiele 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their givernment regulation," and those opposing it shall erase the words "For the amendment to Article 16 of the constitution of the State of Texas providing for conservation districts, the creation of such districts and their gov-ernment and regulation," which said era-sures shall be made by making a mark with pencil or pen through said words. All ballots cast as above provided shall be counted as cast for or against this proposed amendment, and if a majority of the votes shall be for the amendment it shall be declared adopted; if a majority of the votes cast shall be against the amendment said amendment shall be lost. All the provisions of the general election laws as amended and in force at the time said election is held shall govern in all respects as to the qualifications of electors, the method of holding such election and in all other respects as far as such election laws can be made
