WHAT A JEWELRY FIRM DID

They Invested Some of Their Spare Money in Canadian Lands.

S. Joseph & Sons, of Des Moines, Iowa, are looked upon as being shrewd, careful business men. Having some spare money on hand, and looking for a suitable investment, they decided to purchase Canadian lands, and farm it.

With the assistance of the Canadian Government Agent, at Des Moines, Iowa, they made selection near Champion, Alberta. They put 240 acres of land in wheat, and in writing to Mr. Hewitt, the Canadian Government Agent at Des Moines, one of the members of the firm says:

"I have much pleasure in advising you that on our farm five miles east of Champion, in the Province of Alberta, Canada, this year (1916 we harvested and threshed 10,600 bushels of wheat from 240 acres, this being an average of 44 bushels and 10 pounds to the acre. 



WINTER HEATING IS DIFFICULT PROBLEM

Exact Temperature Required to Save Blossom Buds in Cold Weather Not Known.

Because of the difficulties in heating peach orchards in winter, horticulturists at the Ohio experiment station advise growers to avoid such operations by planting hardy varieties. and selecting favorable planting sites. The exact temperature required to save the blossom buds in extreme cold winter weather is not known, as varicties differ in hardiness and the same variety may show some variation in resistance to cold from year to year.

Without this knowledge orchardists in some cases may waste fuel, while at other times buds may be frozen because the fires do not keep the temperature high enough. Watching thermometers and keeping fires in zero weather is trying work. Spring orchard heating, however, has long been considered successful.

On suitable locations peach crops may be secured annually if hardy varicties are planted, these specialists say. Winter heating is therefore unnecessary in such cases.

KEEPING OF SHEEP IS GOOD PRACTICE

Advocated as Most Profitable by Arizona Station-Keep the Rams Separate.

The keeping of a few sheep on the farm is a practice advocated as most profitable by the animal husbandry department of the Arizona agricultural experiment station. W. S. Cunningham of the department says that it has been found that on the average about twenty ewes and their lambs can be maintained and fattened on the ditches and waste feed of each 40 acres of land. Each ewe should produce a fleece worth \$1.50, and her lamb at weaning time should be worth 88. Since the fencing is paid for by the saving of expense in ditch cleaning and the sheep are fed on otherwise worthless feed, they should show a splendid profit.

Mr. Cunningham also says that it is believed that Johnson grass may be eradicated from fields by pasturing with sheep, and the station is now carrying on experiments along this

The rams should be kept separate from the ewes except during the breedng season.







Prepare an ordinary omelet from the yolks of four eggs beaten with a little salt, pepper and four tablespoonfuls of water, and when very light fold in the stiffly whipped egg whites. Turn into an omelet pan in which has been melted one tablespoonful of butter and cook very slowly until well risen. Then spread with the kidney mixture, sprinkle with chopped parsley, and turn over, after loosening the sides, into a neat half circle. Tip the pan gently, so that the interior of the omelet may cook through, and serve inverted on a hot platter.

Pan Dowdy.

Pare and quarter enough sour, juicy apples to nearly fill an earthen baking dish, add to the apples half a cupful of hot water and nearly a cupful of molasses. For crust use one quart of flour, one teaspoonfut soda, two teaspoonfuls cream of tartar, one teaspoonful salt, half a cupful creamed butter, one pint rich, sweet milk. Mix soda, cream of tartar and salt well into dry flour, work the creamed butter into the prepared flour till fine and yellow. Add milk to this mixture and mold to a delicate dough. Roll it out an inch thick and fit closely over the apples. Bake in a moderate When done, while warm, break the crust into pieces and mix through the apples; serve with cream or milk.

Something Nice for Supper.

Here is a nice supper dish I made from the remnants of a roast of beef: Chop or cut fine all the lean beef and mince an onion fine. Put into a baking dish and cover with the leftover gravy. Cook in hot oven about threequarters of an hour. Have hot mashed potatoes ready, remove dish from oven and spread mashed potatoes over top. Well season and return to oven to brown. I served this dish one night last week with hot biscuits, apple sauce, doughnuts, pickles and tea and I must say they did full justice to it. Try it some day.-Exchange.



New York's Police Dogs Help in the War on Crime

NEW YORK,-New York's police dogs are having a large part in cleaning up crime in the Flatbush section of Brooklyn, and in making it a place where women may walk the streets safely late at night without fear of annoy-

ance. The vigilance and activity of the dogs have done much to rid this cozy settlement of detached houses of tramps, idlers, and criminals. The dogs have also done much in Riverdale, where several were dispatched after a series of burglaries.

The police department is devoting considerable time to the serious training of these dogs with a view to finding out to what extent they may be used in certain lines of police work.

There are 12 full-grown Belgian and German shepherd dogs in the department, and to these may be added a litter of nine German shepherd pupples which arrived at the kennels recently. A dog is assigned to each patrolman. Every night the police go out to patrol with the animals. The dogs wear large leather muzzles so that they may not blte anyone, for they are powerful enough to tear a man limb from limb.

While the policeman patrols the street in front of houses he sends the dog to the rear of the dwellings to search through field, hedge and brush for marauder or thief. On encountering a thief the dog's barking attracts the



Many There Are Living Who Could Have Directed Mark Twain in His Search for Material.

The adventures of "Sam" Clemenand his comrades would fill several books of the size of "Tom Sawyes." Many of them are of course forgotten now, but those still remembered show that Mark Twain had plenty of real material, writes Albert Bigelow Paine in St. Nicholas. It was not easy to get money in those days, and the boys were often without it. Once "Huck" Blankenship had the skin of a coon he had captured, and offered to sell it to raise capital. At Selm's store on Wild Cat corner the coonskin would bring ten cents. But this was not enough. The boys thought of a plan to make it bring more. SISAL IN PHILIPPINES.

This country promises to become more or less independent of tropical America in obtaining a supply of sisal fiber, if efforts that are now being made to develop the production of that commodity in the Philippines bear fruit. According to J: F Boomer, a Manila correspondent of the department of commerce, the Produce, Chickens project is backed by exporters of the fiber. It has been found that the sisal plant does very well in the islands and that the fiber produced there is of excellent quality. Already considerable plantings have been made, especially in the island of Masbate. Federal agricultural officials in the Philippines, Mr. Boomer says, are lending their support to the movement.
