

New Gas Used By Americans Hurried War's End Ha Says

The Americans manufactured a gas that would render useless the gas masks of the Germans, and this gas was a big factor in ending the war. Dr. T. D. Frizz ll of Quanab, who was recently in the medical department of the Army, declared several days ago when interviewed by a correspondent. Frizzell said that the gas killed every German in the section where it was tried out. He said that scouts going ahead reported 1,308 Germans dead and only 120 showed signs of wounds from bullets and shrapnel. The scouts reported every German neighborhood.

They have me "studying" grenades at present but I understand that after three days of this I will get three days of gas defense. (I am here for a week only.) You doubtless already know that a grenade is a cute little thing hardly as big as a base ball, but which, when certain things or combination of things happen, comes apart quite sud denly, and is at the same time rather boisterous about it, often greatly disturbing whatever happens to be near it, and flinging things about quite promiscuously. If, when a grenade goes off, there is any mud handy, there comes a shower a second or two after the explosion. We have been throwing different types of grenades into a muddy field from behind a stone fence, and I have been rath er timid about taking off my overcoat and looking at the back of it, for I might have to take a stick and scrape the mud off.

Early Hatched Chickens

Poultry raisers place great dependence upon the early hatched chicken on account of its greater vitality, making a more vigorous growth, escaping the ravages of disease and insects, developing into maturity, and pullets from this hatch becoming profitable layers in the early winter season following. As a rule it is also true that eggs produced in the early part of the season will show a higher percentage of fertility than those produced later in the sea son. Care should be taken now to begin saving eggs for the first setting of the incubator. Select even shaped medium sized eggs, and keep them in a cool place. Better results will be secured if these eggs are turned carefully every day, Do not keep them over ten days or two weeks before putting them in the incubator.

Before setting up the incuba tor give it a thorough cleaning inside and out. Remove all the trays and scrub them with ho soapsuds. After they have dried brush the entire inside of the incubator and all the trays with wood alcohol. Clean out all the lamp flues to see that there are no cobwebs or carbon deposits; also, that those snaces have not been used for mice nests in the wintertime. (lean the oil chambers of the lamps with hosoapsuds and remove the oi wick from the burner and boi the burner in a soda solution fo-15 or 20 minutes. Run the incubator 48 hours to get the thermostat properly adjusted. After running the incubator fivdays, test the eggs and remove those that are infertile. Nov. is a good time also to clean the brooder. Give it a thorough coating with some good disinfectant, fix a clean, dry place for the young chicks when they are hatched, and, if possible, keep them removed from the main flock until they are half
