Victory Loan Total To Be \$4,000,000,000

Washington, April 13.—Terms of the Victory Liberty Loan were announced today by Secretary Glass. They are:

Amount \$4,000,000,000, over subscriptions to be rejected. Interest 4 3/4 per cent for partially tax exempt notes, convertible into 3 3/4 per cent notes wholly exempt.

The notes of both series will be dated and bear interest from May 20, 1919, and will mature May 20, 1923. Interest will be payable on Dec. 15, 1919, and thereafter semi-annually on June 15 and Dec 15, and at maturity. All or any of the notes may be redeemed before maturity at the option of the United States on June 15 or Dec. 15, 1920, at par and accrued interest.

We believe that the people of America will subscribe in the same spirit of patriotism which they have shown in the past, to the end that the notes may be as widely distributed as possible, and that our banking institutions may be left free to supply the credit necessary for the purpose of industry and commerce and the full employment of labor. Let the world see that the patriots of America, out of their boundless resources, and with the same enthusiasm and devotion to country with which they prosecuted the war to a victorious conclusion, are determined to finish the job.

I will pay a twenty-five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of any party guilty of tying down any telephone wire or in any other manner tampering with the lines. The state law on the subject is as follows:
Penal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary appurtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.

M. C. A. women workers.

The show was held at Fort St. Meigs, where the 601st. Engineers were stationed and where, too, there is a large candidates' school. It wasn't a real, live baby show, a show of real live babies—for that, obviously, would be impossible, but it was the next thing to it—an exhibition of photographs.

Of course, every soldier daddy carries the picture of the sweetest kiddie in all the world next to his heart, and there are many bachelor soldiers who find the inspiration and encouragement in the photographs of little brothers or sisters or nephews or neices.

Pictures were arranged by classes, according to age and sex. Class A for boys under one year; Class B for girls under one year; Class C for boys between one and five; Class D for girls between one and five; Class E for boys between five and ten; Class F for girls between five and ten.
