> Some of the points which the department advises the youthful hog grower to bear in mind are the following:

1. The feeding and care are as important as the breeding in producing a good hog. Plenty of feed and good care may make a good hog out of a runt, but lack of it will always make a runt out of a good pig.

2. To make pork cheaply a permanent pasture and forage crops must be used.

8. Young pigs must have a

dry bed and plenty of sunshine. 4. Begin feeding the pig as soon as he will cat, and keep

him growing until he is mature. 5. Always keep plenty of clean fresh water where the hogs may drink at any time.

6. Quarantine all newly purchased animals for three weeks.

7. Never keep a female for a brood sow, no matter how well bred she may be, if she will not produce more than four strong pigs at a litter.

8. The more milk a sow will give the faster her pigs will

In the pamphlet are some very important "dont's" which carrying infection to your hogs. should aid the young farmer in preventing the dangerous disease of hog cholera. Here are the suggestions:

Do not have hog lots next to highways, railroads, or streams. If your neighbor's hogs have cholera do not allow anyone from his farm to visit your farm, and especially your hog lot or pens, and keep away from your hogs have cholera or not.

Do not keep pigeons or allow them to alight on your premises. Keep away crows and buz-





SEEDS FREE TO DRY FARMER

Millet, Grimm Alfalfa and Field Peas to be Distributed by Senators and Representatives.

Farmers who are interested in experiments in the dry farming area of western states soon are to be given an opportunity of getting some seed free of charge, through an appropriation of congress for the purpose. Each senator and representative of the dryfarming states will be allowed 250 packages of millet, 200 packages of Grimm alfalfa, and 40 packages of field peas, which he can distribute among the farmers of his state. The only restrictions in the giving of the seed are that a farmer get his request in early and agree to plant and take care of the seed according to printed directions on each package, which will have enough seed to plant an acre. The varieties which are to be given away are not adapted to irrigated areas nor to sections having much rainfall. Only one package of each kind will be sent to an applicant, and he must make a report to the government of the result of his experiment.







Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary apprtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way wilifully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinence in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.
