

Special Train Slated Nov. 28

Christmas Seal Design Symbol Of Fresh Hope

A lamplighter, symbolizing the emergence of fresh hope after the darkness of the war years, is featured on the 1946 Christmas Seal, which has been received at headquarters of the Howard County Tuberculosis Association.

The 40th annual Christmas Seal sale, to raise funds for control of tuberculosis, will be conducted throughout the nation from Nov. 25 until Christmas. Of the money raised, 95 percent will be used within the state for local and statewide campaigns against tuberculosis. The remaining five percent will be forwarded to the National Tuberculosis Association to support services performed on a national level to further tuberculosis control.

Christmas seals were first sold in this country in 1907 when Miss Emily P. Bissell of Wilmington, Del., adopting an idea from Den-

mark, promoted a seal sale for the benefit of patients in a small tuberculosis hospital near Wilmington. That first seal sale was so successful that the following year it was conducted on a national scale to raise funds for tuberculosis control and has been nationwide since then.

WAA Certifying Officer Is Due

Two big "site sales" in which veterans are to have the first five buying days to exercise their priorities are being prepared, the War Assets Administration has announced, and Big Spring veterans will have a chance to obtain certification as purchasers Thursday.

James Shamburger, field representative of the WAA, will be in the local, veterans administration office in the Petroleum building from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Veterans in the area who obtain proper certification from Shamburger will be in a position to avail themselves of purchasing rights at the two big sales and any others which may be arranged in the future.

One sale will open at the Fort Worth QM Depot on Nov. 25 and the other begins at Camp Bowie on Dec. 2.

Peyton's Book Wins Texas Letters Award

DALLAS, Nov. 16. (AP)—Newer laboratory procedures and increasing knowledge of RH antibodies point the way toward protection of blood transfusion recipients from harmful reaction, scientists at the International Hematology and RH conference here were told today.

The speaker was Dr. Louis K. Diamond, assistant professor of pediatrics at Harvard Medical school. Dr. Diamond warned that, while knowledge of RH antibodies is greater now, so also is the danger of sensitization because blood transfusion is used more regularly.

Randolph Field Plane Crashes, Three Dead

WICHITA, Kas., Nov. 16. (AP)—An Army Air Forces A-26 attack bomber from Randolph Field, San Antonio, crashed in an open field near Benton, Kas., last night, killing all three members of the crew.

Two of the bodies were strapped to their seats in the plane while the third was some distance from the wreckage, which was scattered over a large area. The tops of trees had been sheared off by the plane.

The crash apparently occurred when the two-engine craft was attempting to make an instrument landing at the Wichita airport.

Week's Business Trend Upward In Local Deals

Building permits made an unexpected upward turn during the past week when a total of 16 was issued by the city. The cost of construction also was up to \$20,810, about twice the previous week's figure. However, the number of permits had little bearing on the total estimated cost, since four new residential permits accounted for \$14,500. Others for smaller amounts were issued for repairs and moving. By Saturday the November total had reached \$36,405, while the year's total stood at \$1,101,326.

Value of property covered on 1946 warranty deeds, filed at the county clerk's office, reached the three million dollar mark this week, when 13 instruments added \$51,590 to the previous total. The 1946 total to date is \$2,936,848. New automobile deliveries overshadowed last week's record, with 21 passenger cars and seven trucks registered at the county tax assessor-collector's office.

Livestock receipts showed a gain for the week, and the market continued steady. Local sales concerns handled approximately 2,500 head of cattle and calves. Most butcher animals moving to market reportedly were of higher quality than many recent shipments. At the first of the week, previous estimates on county cotton ginning totals for 1946 crops were revised, and latest forecasts indicate that more than 8,000 bales will be handled by Howard county gins. Staple of the late harvested bales has improved considerably in several areas.

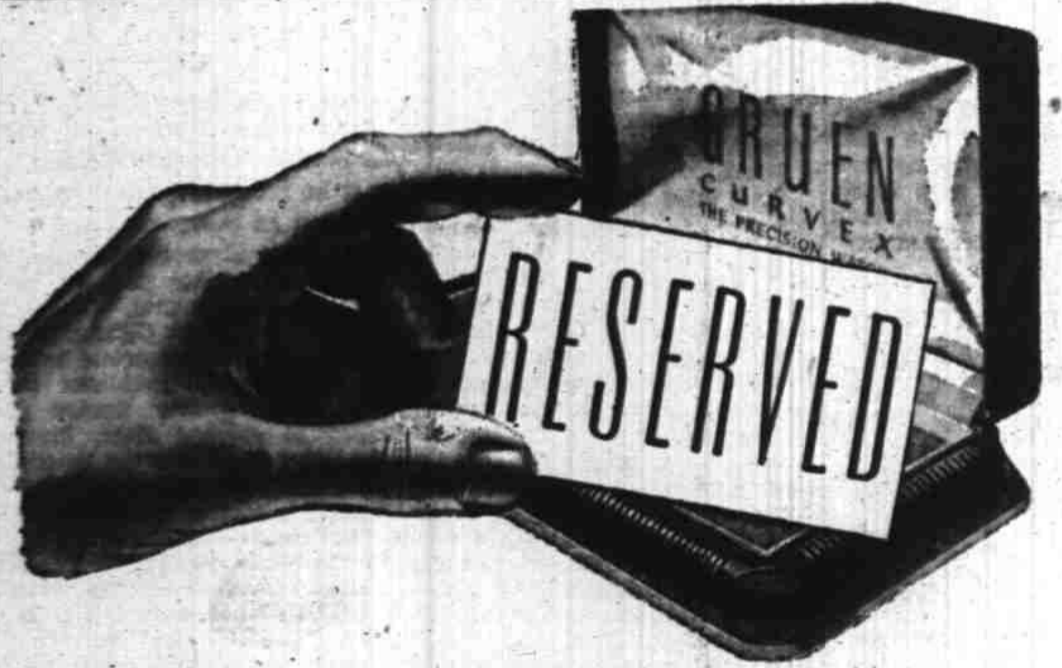

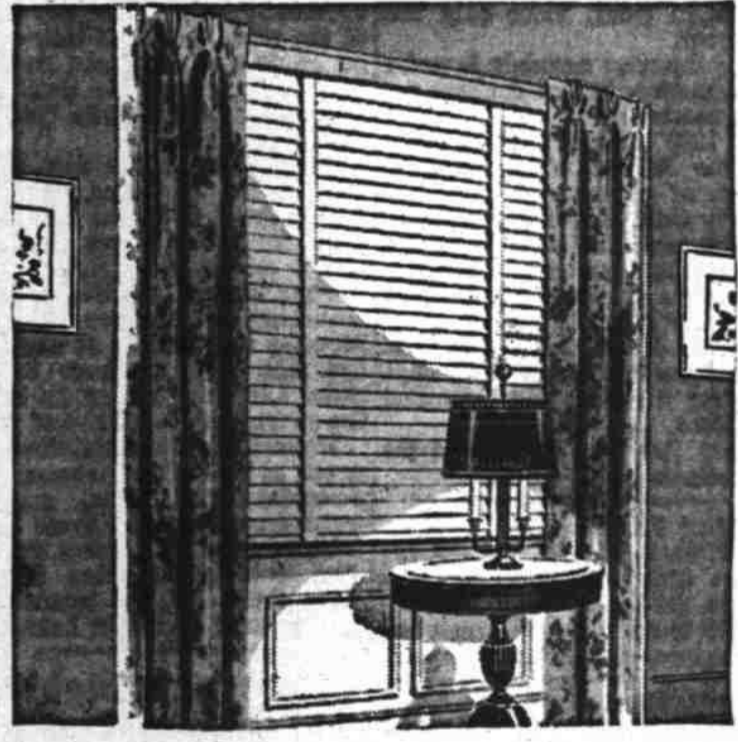

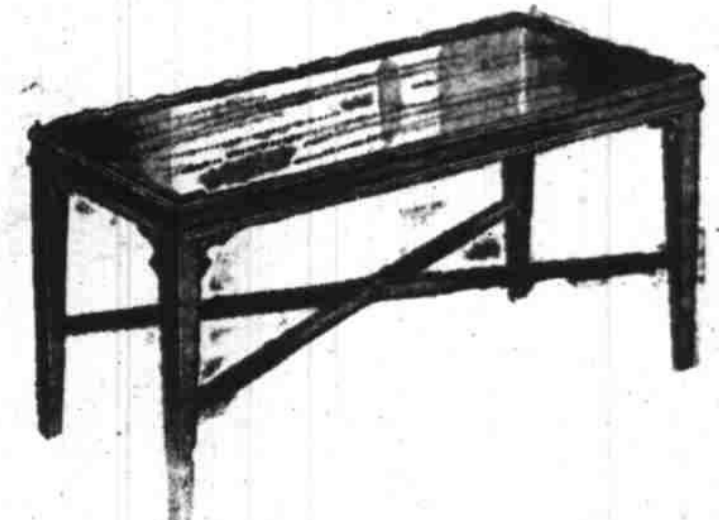

DOG WHELPS PUPS, BUT THEY ARE NOT OF HER BREEDING

ORANGE, Conn. Nov. 16. (AP)—A veterinarian who announced last spring that he had succeeded in transplanting ovaries from an older to a younger dog now reports the result of his experiment—the birth of two half Cocker Spaniel, half English Setter-pups to a pure bred Dalmatian.

The two-year-old Dalmatian, "Imogene," which whelped the pups here yesterday is no more related to them, said Dr. Leon F. Whitney, "than an incubator is related to the chick it hatches from a hen's egg."

"Imogene" was mated with an English Setter after Dr. Whitney, in what he described as a simple operation, had removed her ovaries and replaced them with ovaries taken from a Cocker Spaniel too old for breeding.

When he first described the experiment in a magazine article last May, Dr. Whitney said that the old dog's ovaries, instead of becoming played out after the transplanting "became rejuvenated

and started developing many eggs like those of the young dog in which they were transplanted."

He added yesterday that the result of his experiment bolstered his previously expressed belief that the way might be opened "to similar transplants in other species of animals, and possibly human beings."

MAN WHO BANNED USE OF 'BAT' ON TEXAS PRISONERS SUCCUMBS

HOUSTON, Nov. 16. (AP)—Dr. Sidney M. Lister, 70, who as chairman of the Texas Prison Board was instrumental in eliminating use of the leather whip in the state's prisons, died after a long illness at a hospital here today.

Dr. Lister died at Memorial Hospital where he had been chief of staff until his death.

As a member of the prison board

from 1931 to 1941, two years of which he served as chairman, the pioneering physician headed a vigorous campaign to ban the "bat," a leather whip, from prison discipline.

Dr. Lister was also president of Harris County Medical Society and twice head of the staff at Jefferson Davis Hospital, which he helped to found.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Hugh Potter of Houston, and Mrs. Alvis E. Armstrong of Cleveland, O.; a granddaughter; three sisters, Mrs. W. A. Gowen, Mrs. Kate Williams, and Mrs. A. C. Carlisle, all of Waco; and two brothers, Dr. John R. Lister of Houston and W. S. Lister of Dallas.

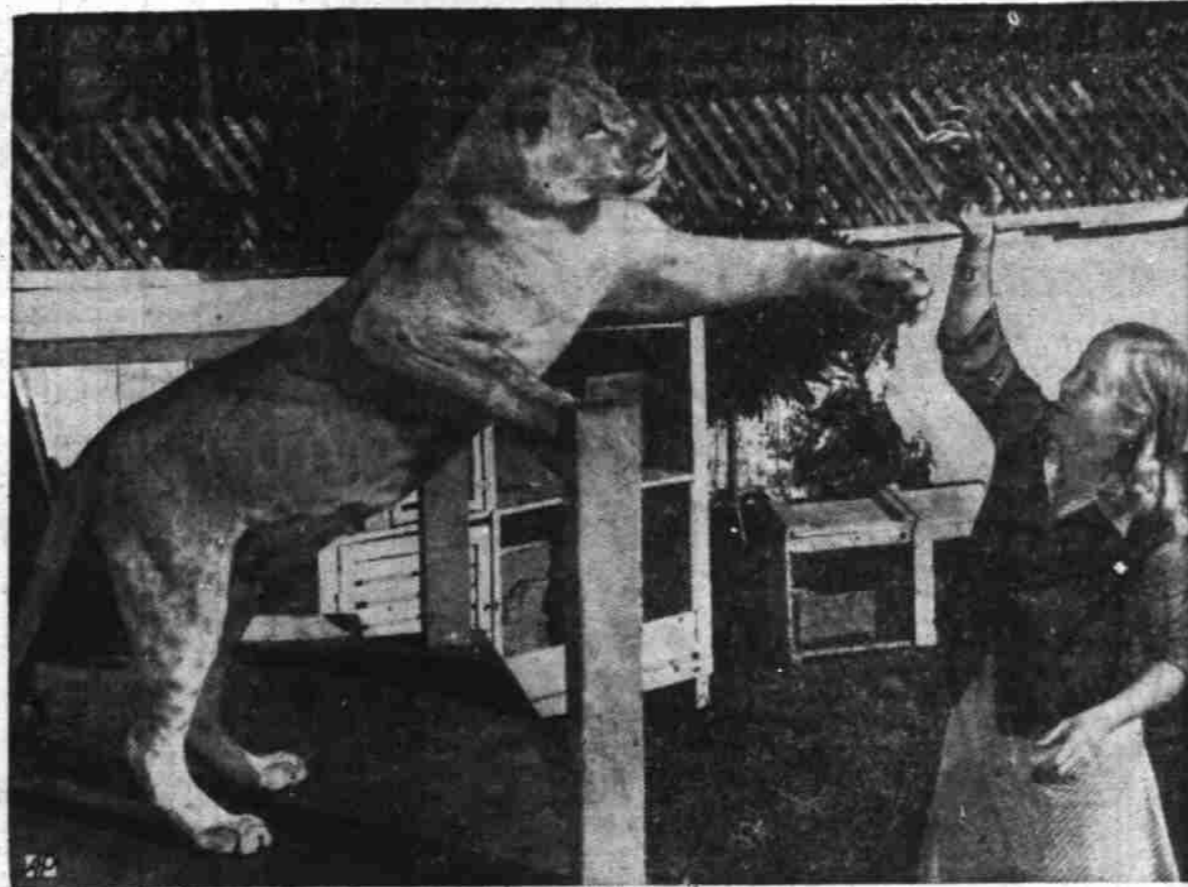

Attlee To Ask House For Vote Of Confidence

LONDON, Nov. 16. (AP)—Prime Minister Attlee, assuming the role of a fighting leader, is prepared to ask the House of Commons Monday for his first vote of confidence to crush decisively a revolt in the Labor Party against his foreign policy.

An authoritative government informant declared today that it was "quite probable" that Attlee would take this action to "show how small" is the vote of rebel Labor Party members whose criticism of Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin has precipitated a minor crisis in government.

Whether Attlee will go to the extreme depends upon the lengths to which the rebels themselves carry Monday's discussion of foreign policy brought about by their proposed amendment to the "King's Address," which constituted Attlee's official declaration of policy for the 1946-47 parliamentary session.

Bevin's policies won an endorsement from his conservative predecessor, Anthony Eden, who said in a speech at Newcastle-on-Tyne today that Bevin is "pursuing the right course" in seeking to build up the authority of the United Nations and strengthen "the rule of law" between nations.

World's Welfare Our Aim, Truman Tells Middies

ANNAPOLIS, Nov. 16. (AP)—President Truman, greeted by a midshipment assembled in their mess hall, told the United States Naval Academy students today that the United States "must be run for the welfare of the world—not selfishly."

"It must be run for the peace of the world," he asserted, adding in his extemporaneous speech that the men at the Naval Academy were "being educated to keep the peace of the world. You must keep the peace of the world. If you don't keep the peace of the world, there will be no peace."

The president arrived here at 9:30 a.m. aboard the presidential yacht, USS Williamsburg, after an overnight trip from Washington to inspect the academy and attend the Navy-Penn State game.

Presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said Mr. Truman would fly tomorrow to Key West, Fla., for a week's rest.

Chemical Plant At Houston Is Closed By Strike

HOUSTON, Nov. 16. (AP)—The huge Freeport plant of the Dow Chemical Company was closing today by a strike of the International Union of Operating Engineers (AFL).

Nearly 6,000 workers, both employees of the company and construction workers building an addition to the plant, were expected to be idled.

Sheriff L. R. Johnson of Brazoria County said he drove to Freeport with one of his deputies today and found no disturbance.

A union spokesman said that the 800 engineers employed by Dow were helping close down the plant's units in an orderly fashion.

Specific cause of the strike was not revealed.

It had been reported that negotiations were underway until late yesterday for renewal of a contract with the engineers. Wages and a union ship were said to be the questions under discussion.

TAKE TURKEYS: MAMA BIRD COSTS CONSIDERABLY MORE THAN OLD TOM

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16. (AP)—The female of the species is more costly than the male when it comes to Thanksgiving turkeys this year.

Not just a little more costly, either. Markets ideas pointed to around 65 cents a pound for sleek young hens, while it looked like about 50 cents a pound for young toms.

Veteran poultry dealers were a little puzzled about the spread, which was the widest they could remember, some said. They credit

ed the housewife for selecting hens over toms, said she was fixing the prices by what she was willing to pay, and pointed out that with the big supply of turkeys, those that were least wanted would have to take a cut in price.

Then there was the little matter of dressing. Dressed hens brought about 15 cents a pound more than dressed toms. But in wholesale markets, live turkeys had a spread of only 12 cents.

Paying prices here for live birds ranged from 27 to 28 cents for live toms, while hens brought 39-40 cents. Dressed, the toms went to retailers at 37-40 cents a pound, hens 53-54 cents.

Plane Crash Fatal To Trio

DURANT, Oklahoma, Nov. 16. (AP)—Two teen-age girls and an airplane pilot—all from Fort Smith, Ark.—were killed last night in the crash of their 5-passenger plane near Bennington, Okla., 30 miles east of here.

They were Hugh Skinner, pilot; Caroline F. Sivley, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Guy D. Sivley, and Sallie Ward, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Ward, III.

The girls were students at the Hockaday School for Girls in Dallas.

Farmers in the crash vicinity said rain was falling at the time and the plane, flying low, apparently was attempting to land in a peanut field. It hit trees at the edge of the field.

Colder Weather Is Due In Panhandle

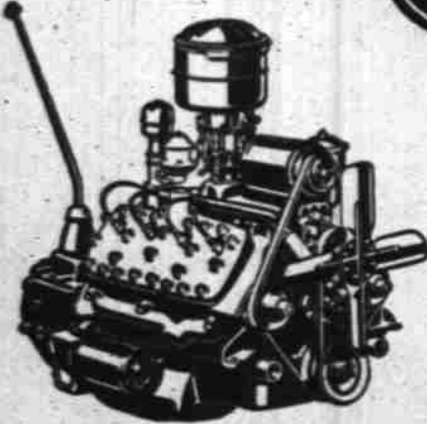

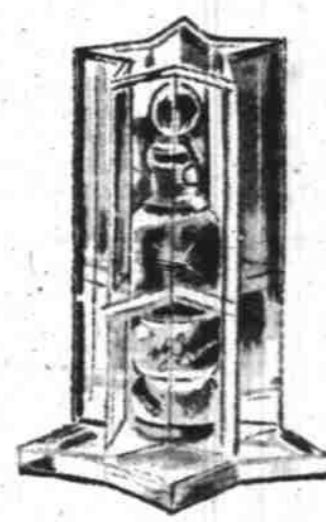

NEW YORK, Nov. 16. (AP)—Although stocks generally were on the losing side during the past week, the market today displayed selective recovery signs and losses were restricted despite the threat of a nationwide coal strike.

While scattered soft spots persisted at the close of the brief proceedings, fractional variations either way ruled when the closing gong sounded. The ticker tape frequently was at a standstill and transfers of \$20,000 shares were the smallest since the 290,000 of Oct. 25 which was a low since Sept. 16, 1944. 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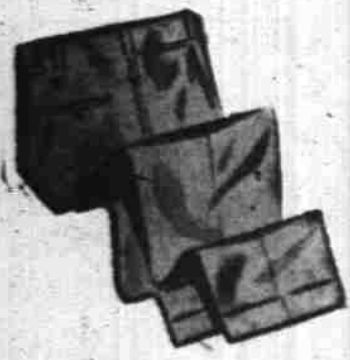

Taxpayers Cover 67 Per Cent Of Current City, School Roll

Big Spring tax payers liquidated at least 67 percent of the 1946 assessments before midnight Friday at a discount of three percent, C. E. Johnson, city tax assessor-collector, reported Saturday. The three percent discount expired at midnight Friday, and payments now will be eligible for deductions of only two percent. During the first 15 days of November, payments totalling assessments to \$105,762.54, which represents approximately 67 percent of the city roll. The figure may be increased slightly, since the three percent discounts will be allowed on payments by mail if postmarked before Friday midnight. Last minute payments also poured into the Big Spring Independent School district tax office. By Friday school taxes totalling \$95,807.06 had been deposited, Mrs. F. M. Purser, assessor-collector, said. This did not include a number

of payments received Friday which were yet to be posted, however. Others were expected to claim their three percent discounts by mail at the last minute.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 16. (AP)—Many Negroes walked through a Negro picket line to attend a showing here last night of "Carmen Jones," with an all-colored cast. The National Association for the Advancement of the Colored People and the Kentucky Bureau of Negro Affairs joined in the picketing for what they called "segregation" of Negroes and whites in the audience. Negro actors expressed no sympathy with the picketing.

Stoecklin, Jr., vice-president of the Stoecklin Aircraft Corporation of Cincinnati, was killed in the crash of his plane in a pasture near here today. The pilot was alone. The plane, which did not burn, was a "new Swift."

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Schleicher Tests Appear Promising

SAN ANGELO, Nov. 16.—Prospects of shallow Permian lime production west of the Page (Strawn) field in Schleicher county, completion of a small flowing discovery well in northeastern Runnels county one-half mile west of Crews and staking of a scheduled Ellenburger wildcat in southeastern Tom Green county drew attention this week to the east side of the West Texas district.

L. W. Elliott of Sonora, trustee, No. 1 Virgil G. Tisdale in Schleicher county recovered two stands of oil-cut mud on a 30-minute drillstem test from 2,709-26 feet, and three stands of oil-cut mud were recovered on a 22-minute drillstem test from 2,755-70 feet. The operators reported evidence of gas on both tests and no water on either.

Seven and five-eighths inch casing was cemented on bottom at 2,774 for perforating, probably early next week. Acidizing may follow natural testing. The promising section was believed to be the Wichita-Albany, entered around 2,290 feet. It is not productive in the Page field. Derrick floor elevation is 2,424 feet.

No. 1 Tisdale is in the C NW NW 16-A-HE&WT, 3 1/2 miles north-northwest of the heaviest oil producing sector of the Page field and 3 1/2 miles east of Eldorado. W. M. Holland and Rudolph Grossenbacher of San Angelo have an interest in the wildcat, which is slated to drill 6,000 feet if necessary to explore the Ellenburger.

Geophysical surveys filed completion of its No. 1 John W. Harris, opener of a new pool in Runnels county, for a flow of 59 barrels of 42 gravity oil by heads in 24 hours. Pay sand, reported to be the Gardner, had been shot from 3,922-22 feet with 100 quarts of nitroglycerin.

No. 1 Harris is 695 from the north, 2,230 feet from the east line of tract 514, a 184-acre lease, in block 1, J. V. Cabrera survey, 15 miles northeast of Ballinger.

Tom Palmer of Wichita, Kan., prepared to start No. 1 W. N. Oats, proposed 5,500-foot wildcat in Tom Green county, C SW SW 52-11-SPRR, two miles southwest of Wall and 10 miles southeast of San Angelo.

Farm And Ranch News

By WACIL McNAIR

Considerable improvement in quality of 4-H club pigs was apparent at the county and Sears foundation show held Friday. James Grote, judge for the show, pointed out to the audience that selection of winners in the barrow classes was based chiefly on commercial appraisal, and in turn, the amount of excess fat some of the animals carried. A few of the club boys apparently were a little overzealous in their feeding schedules, since some entries were extremely fat. However, all entries showed to advantage in comparison to swine exhibited at the county livestock show last spring.

Both the first and second place barrows came from the Texas Electric show last spring, when they were awarded as pig prizes to club members. Wanda Robinson showed the first place heavy-weight barrow, which also was named grand champion, and Joyce and Carroll Choate fed the second place entry.

Development of winter legumes adaptable for this area still is a matter of pure speculation as far as proven results are concerned, E. A. Miller, extension service agronomist, observed while attending the field day at the Big Spring Experiment farm Thursday. However, more and more farmers are trying vetch, and something more may be learned of its possibilities within the next year or two.

One point brought out by Fred Keating, superintendent of the experiment farm, at the field day Thursday drew considerable attention. The experimental plots at the experiment farm indicate the Caprock variety of milo maize produces a greater yield here than the Plainsman variety, which is grown by an estimated 90 per cent of the county's farmers who plant grain. In the experiments this year, the Caprock seemed to stand up better during the drought, and the heads were full and compact.

Texas farmers who wait until spring to start hunting seed for a sudan crop may find themselves out of luck. According to a report from the Bureau of Agriculture Economics, production of sudan estimated to be only 5,200,000 pounds, the smallest since 1929. grass seed in Texas this year is received by the extension service indicating just how low that figure is, the report showed the average seed production of this state over the past 10 years to be 27,490,000 pounds. Last year's crop was only 9,000,000 pounds, which was still nearly twice as large as the current crop.

Although Texas farmers aren't ordinarily on the lookout for sudan seed this far ahead of the spring planting season, the short crop, as indicated by the BAE report should move them to buy sudan seed now instead of waiting until spring when a mad rush to find seed usually occurs. Present supplies of the sudan seed for the entire nation, including production this year plus the carryover, stand at 45,859,000 pounds. This is 34 per cent smaller than the 1945 supplies.

By working late Friday night, workers were able to complete the prime coat on the 16 blocks in one day and under normal conditions the seal coat can be applied to six or more blocks a day.

Credit Curbs To Be Lifted

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (AP) — The Federal Reserve Board is ending, in time for the Christmas buying boom, all controls over consumer credit except installment purchases of autos, radios, furniture and nine other kinds of durable goods.

Effective December 1, the board eliminated requirements that charge accounts be settled in 70 days and single repayment loans in 90. For the first time in five years parties to these deals now may work out their own terms.

Restrictions also will no longer apply to time payments on durable goods involving credit of less than \$50 or more than \$2,000, the board still will require a one-third down payment on automobiles, refrigerators, cooking stoves and ranges, washing machines, ironers, dishwashers, air conditioners, radios and phonographs, sewing machines and vacuum cleaners.

However, buyers may have 15 months to pay for any of these articles instead of the present 12 month limit. On all but automobiles, where the 15 month term already is in effect.
