The fire attracted several hundred spectators to the scene. Law enforcement officers along with highway patrolmen and volunteers aided in directing traffic.

Two firemen, one from Shamrock and one from Lefors were slightly cut by glass as windows were broken.



Boat Owners Should Keep Their Certificate Of Number

Boat owners should make sure they have their certificate of number aboard when they go boating on public waters, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department,

Department officials warn keep the certificate as part of their mortgage holdings, leaving the boat owner open for pro secution. Lienholders are expected to allow the boat owner to retain the certificate.

The Texas Water Safety Act requires operators of boats on public waters to have the certificates, or facsimile thereof, on

board the craft at all times. Motorboats do not require a certificate of title per se, but the certificates of number are required to establish ownership.
