The Top O Texas Jr. Livestock Show gets underway Sunday March 7-10. There are several entries from the McLean area. The county show will be on Saturday March 6th.

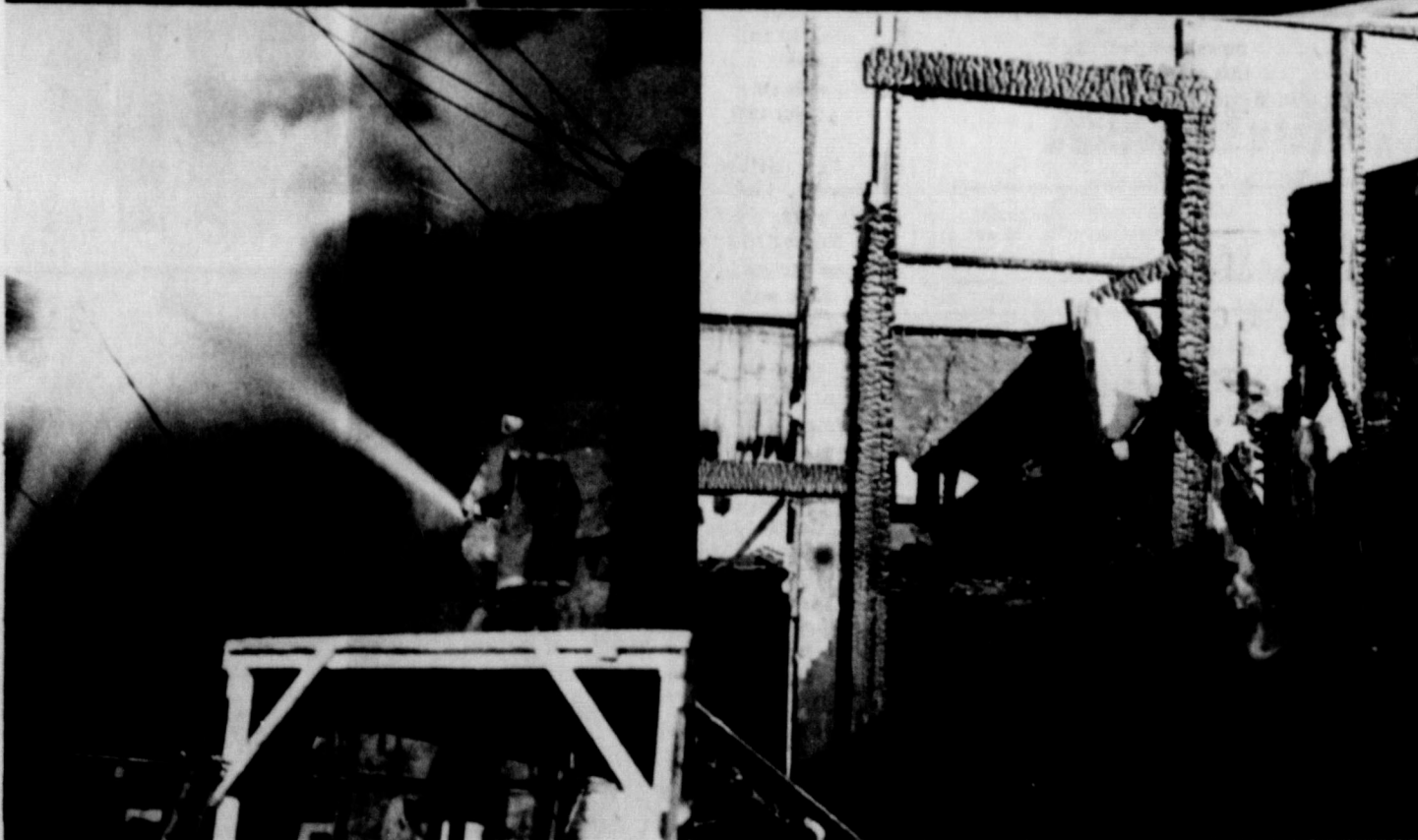
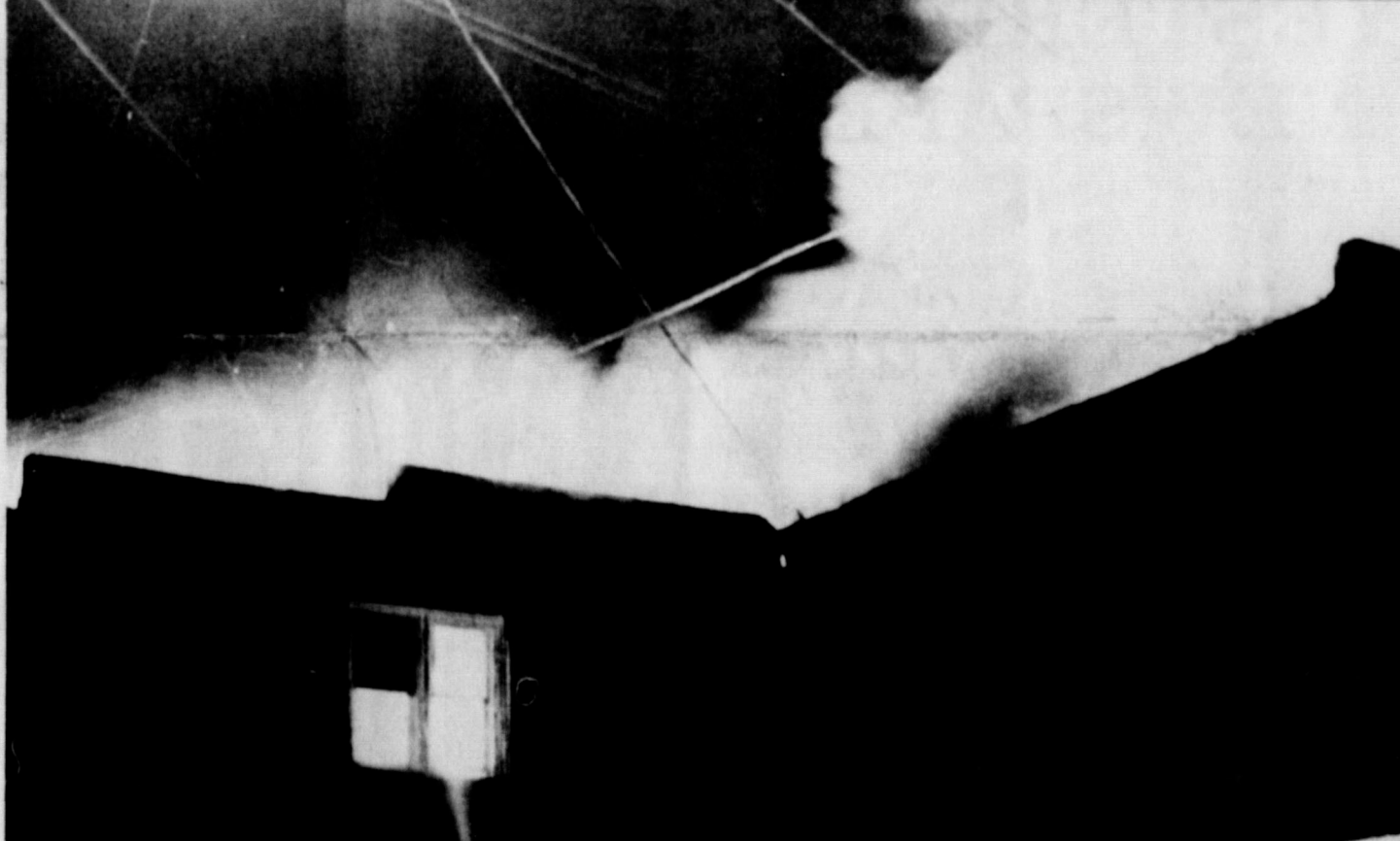
CATTLE PRICES
We hear quote of fifty cents a lb. on light weight calves and finished steer bringing thirty four dollars.

Some believe finished steer will be bringing fifty cents within a few years. Cattle prices are tied to the inflationary spiral. "How long will the recent price rise last" seems to be a big question mark in everyone's mind. The Jan. 1st cattle on feed report was very optimistic. The Feb. 1st report didn't look quite as good. However, the increase in numbers on feed was in Texas where lighter weight cattle is fed. We think you are in for a sustained good price picture. This is especially true of light weight calves. Or for the most part, anything weighing less than five hundred lbs.

FIRE DESTROYS LANDMARK

McLean Volunteer Fire Department answered a call Sunday evening which turned out to be a great loss to downtown McLean. The fire at 100 block North Main started shortly before 6 p. m. in the Kenneth Hambright Cabinet Shop.

Fire Chief Jim McDonald said damage estimates were placed at about \$200,000 from the fire that started from a gas heater in the rear of the Hambright Cabinet Shop.

Totally destroyed was the McLean Cafe, owned by Bob Massey, Smitherman Tax Office, and the home of Mrs. Pearl Mercer, who lived above the cafe, The Hambright Cabinet Shop and the Jerry Smith Tax Service.

Ted Robertson, who made his home in the former recreation parlor, also sustained loss of household goods and personal belongings when the adjoining wall fell causing his roof to collapse. Mrs. Mercer also lost all of her household goods and personal belongings.

All equipment and records were removed from the income tax office operated by Mrs. Tony Smitherman. The Jerry Smith office next to the McLean Cafe also was damaged.

Equipment was removed from the office of the McLean News, weekly newspaper, which suffered smoke and water damage.

Lefors and Shamrock fire departments sent trucks to help fight the blaze. Volunteer firemen under the direction of McLean Fire Chief Jim McDonald.

Under control at 6:30 to find smoke continuing from between Hambright and Massey building. The fire was in the walls and in the double ceiling and roof.

The blaze was under control about midnight Sunday following the collapse of the roof of the McLean Cafe.

Small outbreaks occurred through out the night and Monday morning.

Shamrock sent 15 men and Lefors sent one, to the scene. The three fire departments also had the assistance of members of the Strategic Air Command which is stationed in McLean.

Fourteen hose lines were used on the fire when it was in its height.

Fire Chief McDonald said while there was extensive damage to all buildings, exact figures on the total loss probably would not be known until a later date. It was only partially insured.

The fire attracted several hundred spectators to the scene. Law enforcement officers along with highway patrolmen and volunteers aided in directing traffic.

Two firemen, one from Shamrock and one from Lefors were slightly cut by glass as windows were broken.

Boat Owners Should Keep Their Certificate Of Number

Boat owners should make sure they have their certificate of number aboard when they go boating on public waters, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Department officials warn that sometimes lienholders will keep the certificate as part of their mortgage holdings, leaving the boat owner open for prosecution. Lienholders are expected to allow the boat owner to retain the certificate.

The Texas Water Safety Act requires operators of boats on public waters to have the certificate, or facsimile thereof, on board the craft at all times.

Motorboats do not require a certificate of title per se, but the certificates of number are required to establish ownership.

Cal Fraser To Build Plant At McAllen

Cal Fraser, president of Form-O-Uth Co., of California and Marie Foundations of Texas, has announced plans to build a factory in McAllen. Work on the plant, which will be located at a 10-acre site will begin within 90 days. Cost will be approximately one quarter of a million dollars. 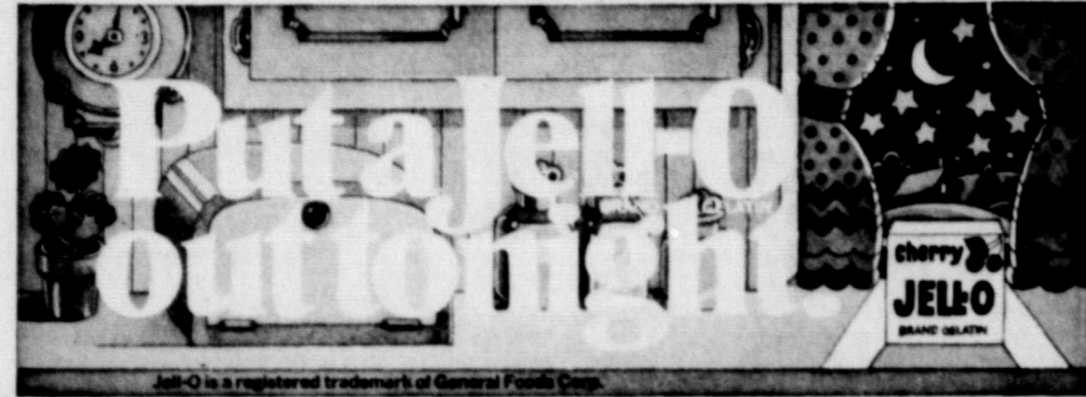
