Threshing floors are not generally provided in barns made in the modern way. It is a waste of space to set aside valuable storage room in a barn when it is only to be used for a few days each year. In many of the forests applications to lease five-acre tracts are pouring in, and dwellings from simple log cabins to pretentious homes are well, considering their susceptibility springing up in mountain glens and by river banks and lake shore.

In order to determine just what the forests present in the way of attractive sites for summer homes and facilities for boating, bathing, fishing. mountain climbing and other outing activities, the forest service is now making a recreational survey of the domains over which it has control and will list and publish the data as rapidly as possible. Now, it is realized, most of the applicants for cottage sites are persons who happen to be familiar with the forests. When the data now being collected are available, however, city-bound souls who long for the woods but have neither the means nor the time to make long searches for satisfactory sites will be able to choose just about what they wish without stirring from their doors.






PREVENT INJURY FROM WIRES

Constantly Increasing Use of Electricity Proving Great Menace to Various Kinds of Trees.


(By GEORGE E. STONE.) The increase in electric railroads, electric lighting systems and telephone lines, whose wires are usually located near the tree belts of our cities and towns has made necessary a lamentable amount of disfiguring pruning.

Of all the troubles with which tree wardens have to contend the wire problem is often regarded as the worst. Notwithstanding the strict laws

which some states have adopted in regard to injuring shade trees, the agents of some public-service corporations often have little regard for trees or the laws respecting them. Where 40-foot poles must carry the wires of three or four public-service corporations there can be little or no opportunity to preserve the natural symmetry of shade trees, especially when low branching maples and other trees are planted on the same side of the street with the wires. There is less interference from limbs with low than with high-tension wires. Trees like the elm, whose branches form acute angles offer less obstruction to wires than maples; but not all streets, of course, are planted with elms, which may be as

MAKE SUCCESS IN ORCHARDS

Excellent Results Secured at Iowa Sta tion by Cultivation, Pruning and Thorough Spraying.

What cultivation, pruning and spraying will do to make apple orcharding as sucessful in Iowa as in the muchtouted western districts was fully shown at the big Council Bluffs orchard of the Iowa Agricultural experiment station. This orchard, under the care of horticulturists from Iowa State College at Ames, yielded 4,000 bushels of apples from 15 acres of trees From 52 trees of Grimes' Golden, 540 bushels of apples were harvested, more than ten bushels per tree. Of this big crop, 450 bushels were fit for packing in boxes and sale of fancy trade at top prices. These results were due to modern methods of orchard care and management. The results of this work at Council Bluffs will later be carried to every orchard district in Iowa to encourage and improve commercial orcharding.

Easier Spraying and Picking. All limbs that chafe or cross each other should be removed and the tops made even enough that all fruit in the center of the tree will be well colored. This open top will also enable one to reach all parts of the tree in spraying and make picking much easier. Trees that are too tall should have the tops cut bock.
