





ket. More specific conditions may include type of soil, depth of soil, accessibility to railroad, water and air drainage, contour of land, proximity to rivers, lakes or mountains, prevailing winds, liability to frosts and many other things. Not all the land in any of the great fruit areas can be considered as fruit land.

In fact only here and there in these areas of country are there sections of territory that answer the requirements of fruit growing. And of these small land will measure up to the necessary spend it as it does to earn it. specifications for profitable orchard

We must expect also that the more broken and diverse a given area as our mountain districts, the smaller will be the proportion of suitable orchard in the British army. sites.

Beautify the Farm.
