Masonic Building Two Story

It has been definitely decided by the local Masonic fraternity to erect a lodge building and actual construction work will be commenced as soon as plans can be made and a suitable estimate of the cost, etc., arrived at. The building will occupy the lot now owned by Messrs Johnston and Callahan at the corner of Main and First streets and will be two stories high, the first floor being fitted up for a store room.

Tentative plans indicate that the new lodge home will occupy a space twenty five by ninety feet and will be built of brick. The second floor will have one suite of offices and the remainder of the space will be utilized for the lodge room, ante room and a spacious reception room and parlor.

The building is to be modern and attractively furnished and will probably be the handsomest structure of its kind in the city when complete.

Crop Rotation Will Conserve Soil.

One of the most important factors in conservation on the farm is the rotation and diversification of crops. It is a well known fact that the continuous planting of land to one given crop, whatever that crop may be, will, in course of time, deplete if not exhaust the producing capacity of that soil. Each successive year of such cultivation will leave the soil in a more rundown and unhealthy condition, and each year more subject to the outbreak of fungus diseases. Again, such a method of cropping concentrates all kinds of insect pests that forage upon the particular crop grown upon the land.

On the other hand, it is equally well known that it is best, on the conservation idea, to have the shallow-rooted plants or crops follow the deep-rooted ones, and vice versa, keeping in mind always to plant some legumes each year on portions of the farm.

looks as if there is no honest way to avoid armed intervention by the United States in Mexico. The government in the war-ridden republic is ably powerless to protect its interest or the lives and property of those living across the border from depredations of law bands who are roaming about in search of loot and plunder. The United States has tried bravely to co-operate with the defacto government in effort to re-establish order and wipe out the lawless element, but her good offices are looked on as an encroachment and frequent clash between United State soldiers and Caranza soldiers has been the result.

Now Senior Caranza has informed Washington that he is already in a state of war with the United States and there is nothing left for us to do but intervene. Many people are ready and anxious to see this turn in events and express the hope that the Stars and Stripes will wave over the battlement of every important strategic position in Mexico, but many, on the other hand, can look behind the seeming insults and many untoward acts of the Mexican people and see the pitiful state of poverty and ignorance and almost hopeless degeneracy that has driven them to this mad enterprise. It is probably the impulse of a brave man to strike back when he is assaulted, but it is also his privilege as a brave man to consider the mental and physical condition of his assailant. The poor Mexican peon, upon whose demaciated shoulders the burden of war will fall, has no conception of right and liberty. He is an ignorant starving slave who is striking blindly against an unkind fate and while there is now no alternative for the United States, yet we are truly sorry that as great and powerful a nation as we should find it necessary to kill and maim this helpless, benighted people.

FORMER HITCHIN RESIDENT IN TEXAS.—About two years ago, Mr. H. A cutting from the "McLean News" describes the event, stating that the children of the local school planted 300 trees on the school grounds. Each child brought a tree and assisted in the work of setting them out and carrying water from the cistern to give the trees a good start. "One patron" proceeds the local paper, "was Mr. G. H. Williams, who recently arrived from England to make his home in the United States. He created considerable favourable comment by furnishing his two little boys with trees that were decorated with the national emblematic colours—Red, white, and blue." The report, in encouraging this beautifying of McLean, points out that the initial cost of trees is so small, compared their real value, that every street in town should be lined with them.

Berry Pursley Killed.

Berry Pursley, a prominent ranchman, of Kent county was killed at his ranch five miles south of Jayton Saturday morning. From heresay and otherwise we have heard the following facts in regard to the killing. It seems that there was trouble between Pursley and his wife, and her little boy, step-son of Pursley went to the field and informed Mrs. Pursley's brother, a sixteen year old lad, of the trouble. So he left the field and went to the house. On his arrival he found Mr. and Mrs. Pursley in the bath room, and Mrs. Pursley lying on the floor, and he asked what was the matter, and she informed him that Pursley had knocked her down. Then he asked Pursley why he did it and he told him it was none of his d—n business. Then young Gray walked into an adjoining room and picked up an automatic six shooter, walked to the door and fired at Pursley, he was sitting down on the side of the bath tub when young Gray fired at him, immediately he got up and took two or three steps and fell dead, never spoke. Young Gray was arrested and placed in the Clairmont jail, charged with the killing. The last remains of the deceased was buried at Jayton Tuesday.

To The Democracy of Texas:

We have been appointed, as a committee of those who favor submission, to call your attention thereto and to urge upon you the propriety and necessity of voting to instruct the Legislature to submit the question. It is only necessary to mention a few of the reasons:

The last expression of Texas on the question of prohibition was in 1911. The difference between the contending factions on the subject was less than 7,000 votes. Many charges and counter charges of illegal voting in that election were made. Six years will have elapsed between that election and the one we are seeking to have held. Since the last prohibition election many thousands of voters have come to live in Texas. It is believed that since 1911 many persons who were then here have changed their views. Inasmuch as the issue enters into every political question discussed and is more or less considered in the election of every officer, legislative, executive and judicial, it is believed wise to now definitely settle the question so as to preclude its further discussion and agitation, and thereby enable us to give our attention to the great economic problems which confront our State.

To this end we urge upon the democrats of Texas, of every shade of belief, the importance of organizing in their various counties and precincts, with a view of securing as many qualified voters as possible to cast their vote in favor of submission. It is not necessary to discuss past differences, either of men or measures. The only issue is: Do we want a prohibition election to be held in Texas next year? We earnestly urge all submissionists to bear this in mind and not permit themselves to be divided by immaterial matters. No doubt there are many opposed to prohibition who desire to see the question settled. Surely all prohibitionists will vote for submission. In perfecting the organization we urge that our chairman, M.

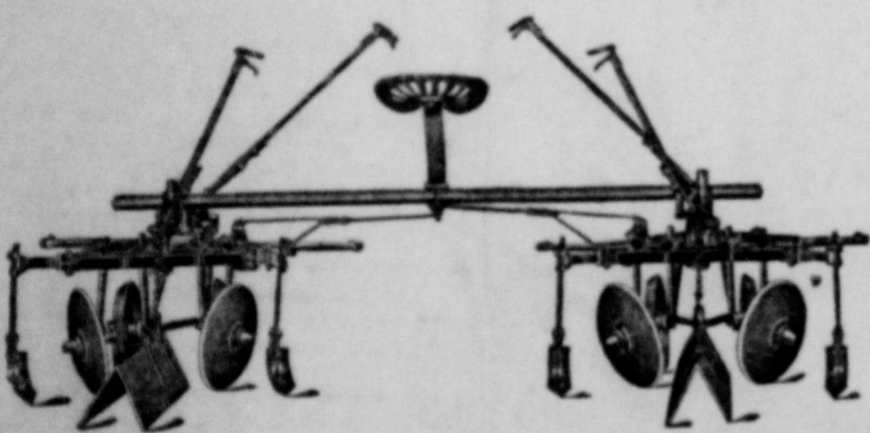
H. Wolfe, be advised of the names and addresses of the several chairmen of the club so organized, with a view of uniting all the organizations throughout the State for more effective work. Please bear in mind that no speech-making campaign will be made by us; no workers will be sent out; but we shall confidently rely upon the Democrats of each county and precinct to take up the work above outlined and energetically press it forward. Houston, Texas, June 10—The first bale of the 1916 cotton crop, the earliest bale ever marketed in the United States was sold here Saturday morning. It was raised in Cameron county and weighed 608 pounds. Jesse H. Jones bought the bale for \$950, about \$1.56 cents a pound. The previous early record bale, which came in 1911, weighed only 493 pounds. The 1916 bale classed strict middling, good staple.

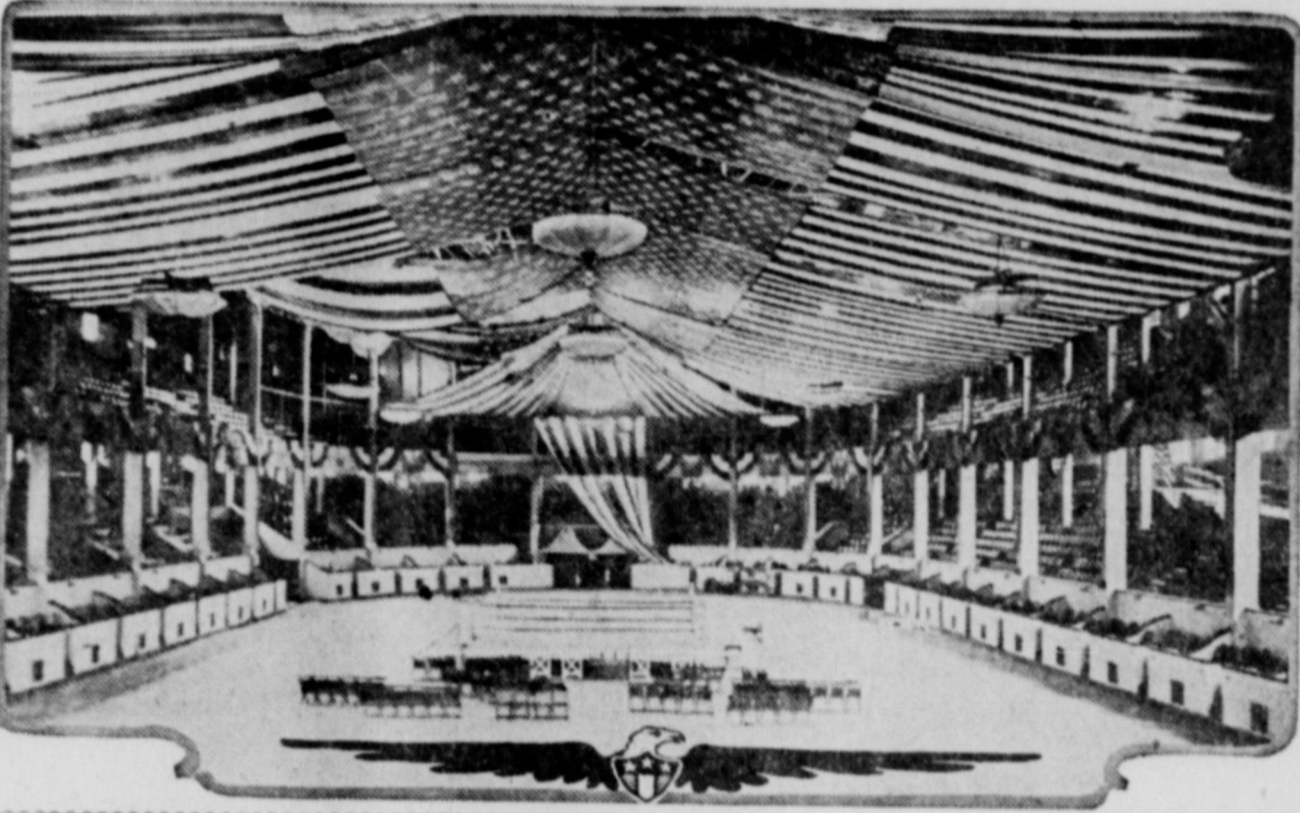

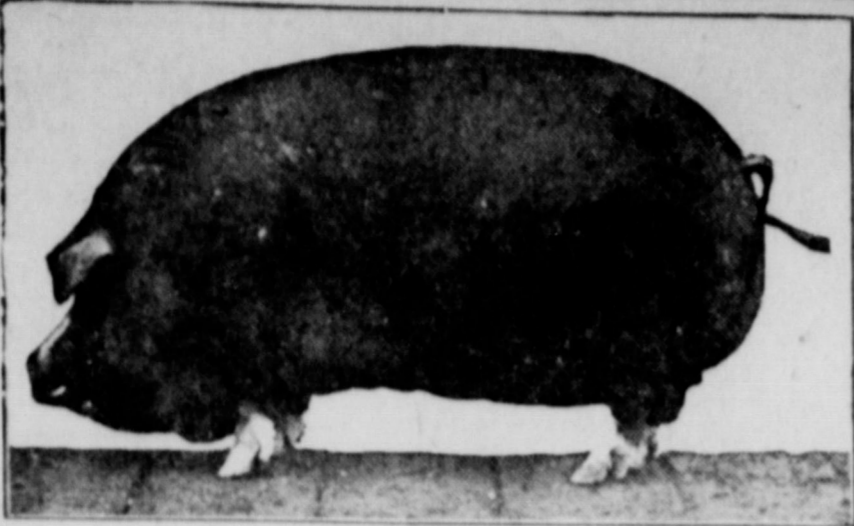

LICE ARE COMMON PESTS AMONG SWINE



Grand Champion Poland-China Sow.

(From the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The farmer should frequently examine his hogs about the ears, flanks, and inside of the legs to see if they are lousy. Lice are common pests among swine, and vigorous and persistent treatment is required to eradicate them.

Dipping Swine. To free hogs from lice they should be dipped two or more times at intervals of about two weeks. Several dippings may be required before complete eradication is accomplished.

Dipping vats are made of various materials, but the most durable is cement. (See Farmers' Bulletin 481, Concrete Construction on the Live Stock Farm.)

Hog Wallows. Some farmers favor hog wallows; others are strongly opposed to them. Filthy hog wallows are a source of danger.

Other Methods. In many cases a farmer is not financially able to build a concrete hog wallow or a dipping vat.

According to directions, can be applied with a spray pump or sprinkling can, or else rubbed on every part of the hog by means of a brush or a swab of cotton waste.

Another method of controlling lice is to tie the gunny sacks or similar coarse cloths around a post and saturate the sacks frequently with crude oil.

Change Pastures Frequently. Swine can be raised when they are confined in limited quarters if the quarters are kept clean, but they will do much better and stay in better health if they have plenty of pasture.

DISPOSE OF PESTS THAT EAT UP PROFIT

Everyone With Sound Sense Knows That It Doesn't Pay to Feed Ticks and Lice.

(By F. A. SPENCER, Department of Animal Husbandry, Oklahoma A. & M. College, Stillwater.)

Does it pay to dip sheep? This question is asked during the spring by many beginners in sheep husbandry.

The flock may appear to have no ticks, but a few stray ones may be lurking here and there, ready to bring forth an army of ticks if conditions remain favorable.

If the ticks are thick it may be wise to dip as soon as the sheep are shorn. Otherwise wait three or four weeks after shearing so that there may be sufficient growth of fleece to hold some of the dip.

SELF-FEEDERS GOOD FOR ALL LIVE STOCK

Interesting Test Being Made With Dairy Cow at California University Farm.

If the self-feeder for pigs, because it lets them follow naturally bodily demands of eating just what food their system required, is such a great success, the self-feeder might prove equally good for other kinds of stock also.

At the California university farm, just as a feeder, not as an experiment that would certainly prove anything, a dairy cow has been fed since lactation with a self-feeder.

The test may prove nothing for practical purposes on account of expense of grain and concentrates. However, one noticeable fact is that her bodily weight remains without any change.
