Important Notice

The Honor Flag System instituted during the last Liberty Loan Campaign is still in force. The Honor Flag with four stars will be awarded to every county or Community oversubscribing its quota. Another matter to which we draw attention is the fact that the ships built by the United States Shipping Board will be named after the incorporated towns or cities raising the largest over-subscriptions to the Liberty Loan. In this connection, the percentage of population purchasing Bonds will also be considered and it is the two factors taken together which will determine which towns or cities are to receive the honor. Ten military tanks will be named after the Counties producing the greatest over-subscription, together with the greatest percentage of subscriptions by population. The last scholastic census will be used as the basis upon which to figure.

The honor of sending tanks into battle with the name of their County on the side should appeal to every citizen.

School Notes

Enrollment of scholars this year is not as large as previous years, perhaps on "account of the war." However for the same reason there is a greater spirit manifested on the part of those who are attending. The teachers are trying to create a spirit among the pupils that makes them consider a boy or girl a "slacker" who plays "Hookey" or comes to school and doesn't do his or her part. A truant or idler is worse than a military slacker or draft evader. It is the desire of the teachers that parents exercise their parental prerogative and privilege and duty in seeing that their children do not stay away from school unless absolutely necessary. The teachers haven't time to see that all the pupils are in school or round up the strays. The following rule will be applied to all pupils who play truant. The first offense will be punishable with whatever the teacher decides upon, and the second offense by expulsion.

Patriotism is taught in school more than the law requires, and the kind of patriotism whose fruition will be good and noble citizens. We believe that a worthless fellow can not be patriotic, no matter how often or how much he salutes the flag and praises the president.

Something like 59 pupils failed in their work last month. There is one of two things wrong. Either they are dunces and can't learn, or they can learn and won't. You see they will admit the former calamity, and strongly censure the latter. We hope you examined your children's report card and if he did failing work last month, you should have exerted some sort of pressure.

We are trying to make men and women out of your children somewhat different from what you are. It is a Herculean task. Help us out.

Word was received here yesterday that Lieut. Spencer M. Bell, United States air service, died after an airplane accident in France, Aug. 25. Lieut. Bell was a Lemon Grove boy and his mother, Mrs. Alice Bell, lives in that suburb.

Lieut. Bell was graduated from Berkley last September and when he had just completed his military training was sent to France, where he was stationed near Paris. A letter to his mother, dated Aug. 21, told of meeting his brother, Lieut. Paul Bell, for the first time since he left America, and of two days spent sightseeing in Paris together.

The Lieutenant is the first Lemon Grove boy reported lost. —San Diego Union.

Tells How to Send Christmas Gifts to France

The method by which Christmas packages are to be sent to American soldiers in France by friends and relatives was announced yesterday by the Dallas Chapter of the Red Cross. Under orders of the War Department, the American Red Cross will be the only medium through which Christmas packages can be sent abroad.

Each American soldier "over there" has been given a conventional gummed "sticker" upon which he has written his name and location with the American expeditionary forces. All soldiers in France who expect packages from home will send these stickers to their relatives, who must present them to the headquarters of the Red Cross, where they will receive specially prepared cartons which are to be used in sending Christmas presents. No boxes or cartons except those furnished by the Red Cross can be used for

this purpose. The kind of goods and weight that can be sent will be announced as soon as such specifications are received here. This probably will be about Oct. 15, it was announced. No package can be sent without the prescribed sticker.

All packages must be ready for shipment by Nov. 20, and the American Red Cross will defray the expenses of transportation from here to France. The plans of the Red Cross are being worked out so that the boxes will reach the men for whom they are intended on Christmas Day, and for those American soldiers in France who fail to receive Christmas packages the American Red Cross will "play Santa Clause," so that each man with the expeditionary forces can spend a happy day.

The greatest battle of the age continues to rage on the western front. The allies continue to drive the Huns back toward his own habitat.

The desperation of the Huns is shown in their efforts to secure an armistice. Realizing their defeat and the probable rout of their entire western army, they are trying to extricate themselves from their predicament by feigning sincerity and asking for a cessation of hostilities.

There is every evidence of their incincerity. They only want time to extricate themselves from their dangerous positions, and to regain the waning confidence of the civilian population, and to defeat the fourth great Liberty Bond issue of this country. Success in doing this would be a great victory for them.

President Wilson knowing all this has promptly rejected their peace proposals. Nothing but unconditional surrender will be listened to by the allies. They can get peace in this way and no other.

I will pay a twenty-five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of any party guilty of tying down any telephone wire or in any other manner tampering with the lines. The state law on the subject is as follows:

Penal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary apparatus to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.

If every woman who goes to the grocer, candy or delicatessen store each day would use this phrase to the clerk when buying package goods she would save thousands of tons of materials and chemicals now essential in making munitions, poison gas and other war materials. Don't be ashamed to carry home a bottle of milk, unwrapped in the usual paper bag. War pride should prompt you to take a basket, refusing your saved paper bags, not only once but a number of times, and thus do your share in paper conservation. Isn't the milk just as good, the package of chocolate as tasty, the biscuits as palatable? You must take the initiative; the store clerk doesn't dare offend you.

Your government needs your co-operation; it needs to restrict paper making; it needs all paper remanufacture into shell wrappings, for packing soldiers, food and clothing, for questionnaires, for records, correspondence for soldiers, letter. Do your part and prevent an actual shortage. —The war industries Board.

WHITE PAPER CONTAINS EXPLOSIVES.

Every time you use unnecessarily a sheet of white paper you use chemicals that the government wants for "I. N. T.," the most powerful explosive used in the war. The War Industries Board is asking for more chlorine used in bleaching paper that can be manufactured. It is the "white" in white paper. The war bread and war success and in no must have

"war paper." War paper is cream colored or yellow paper. Wood pulp papers are naturally of a yellowish tint, which is the natural color of the wood. To obtain white paper it is necessary to use quantities of coloring in order to neutralize this natural tint. To obtain the colored papers, such as are used in stationery, it is necessary to use a variety of colors. Coloring materials are made from a basis of intermediates, which are necessary for the manufacture of munitions and war chemicals. Use your paper therefore in its colored state, which is easier on the eye and, when one is accustomed to it, just as artistic as many finished colors. Snow white paper should not be demanded in war times. Cream colors or yellowish tints, which are more economical to obtain should be used.

Easy Way To Harvest Corn.

Husking corn from standing stalks is one of the biggest jobs where corn is a principal crop. Extra labor, hired by the day or bushel is usually required. If you have trouble in obtaining enough labor to husk your crop try to rent a mechanical picker if a machine of a satisfactory type is available. About 7 acres seems to be a fair day's work for one of these machines and its crew of three men and three teams. Two wagons are required—one unloading while the other is being filled. This makes 350 bushels in corn yielding 50 bushels per acre, and it takes four high class men husking by hand to average this amount throughout the season. Old men or boys who would be able to do only a small amount of work in husking do just as good work with the

mechanical help. The amount of ground covered per day by a mechanical picker will be about the same no matter what the yield; consequently the advantage derived from its use is greater in heavy corn than where the yield is low. Volunteer your services and go to the aid of the planters. Reports received by the Bureau of Crop Estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture from Louisiana state that there is a great shortage of field help and the labor situation grows more serious as harvest time approaches.
