Penal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull, tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary appurtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two or more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.

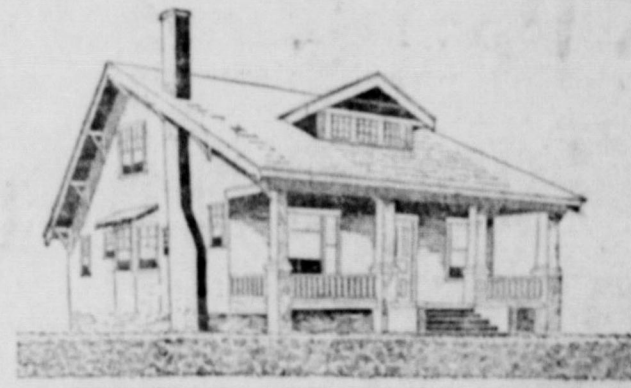

**Hereford Court Has A Heavy Docket**

Hereford, June 20.—After disposing of what was perhaps the heaviest docket in the history of the local district court, Judge Reese Tatum Thursday took a temporary adjournment and departed to his home in Dalhart. The minutes of the court have not been closed and the district clerk states that two cases are set down for trial on June 5.

At noon, every June 21, the sun is vertically above the mine. The sudden blaze of light penetrating to the bottom of the 1,400 foot excavation, where before all was dark, alarms many of the native miners, who fear they have opened up the infernal regions, according to the vice consul.

**Floods Tie Up Traffic On Denver Railroad**

Through traffic on the Fort Worth and Denver has been tied up since Sunday on account of washouts near Lelia Lake, following heavy rains Saturday night.

Seventeen hundred feet of track was washed out south of Lelia Lake, and several bents of the bridge across the draw at that place went out.

**Cyclone Razes Home In Randall County**

Canyon.—Demolishing everything in its path, a cyclone six miles east of Canyon Sunday afternoon swept a path 100 to 150 yards wide and three miles long. The home of

Fred Scheutte, farmer, the only one in the storm's course, was completely demolished, with all outhouses and barns, but none of the family was injured. Heavy live stock and property damage was also sustained by Mr. Scheutte. Other damage in the storm's path was done to growing crops.

A second cyclone followed in about 30 minutes in the same vicinity of

Scheutte's home, but failed to do any damage.

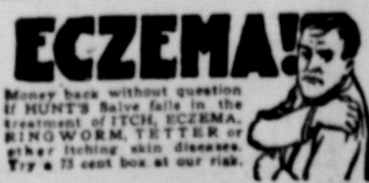

**Tomato Is Mated With Pineapple**

Lamarque, Texas.—A tomato has been mated with a pineapple and its progeny is named sunray.

Playing the role of cupid in this match is P. Dan George, gardener and horticulturist of Lamarque, who has spent 14 years in experimenting with Texas soil and plants.

The "sunrays," as Mr. George has christened them, are about the same size and shape as their maternal parent, but in color they are a brilliant yellow. Also they contain absolutely no acid. From 90 to 100 days, according to Mr. George, are required for bringing to maturity this new wrinkle in eatables. Pure white tomatoes, as well as blood red ones, containing no acid, also are growing in Mr. George's garden plot.

Another successful bit of plant surgery—and wizardry—was the grafting of three varieties of chilli pepper plants. The result of this "plant triangle" is a stalk upon which are yellow, purple, red, brown, white and green peppers. The pods are also of different sizes and shape.

Most interesting of all his present experiments, according to the Lamarque horticulturist is the crossing of a cantaloupe with a cushaw. At present the product of this "match" is about nine pounds in weight, but, according to Mr. George, when full grown it is expected to displace in the neighborhood of 18 pounds.

**HAT IS MEXICAN'S PRIDE**

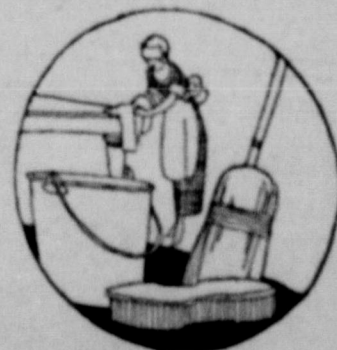
