Rail Traffic and Damage the Crops

Begining Sunday, a series of heavy rains have fallen over the Panhandle and West Oklahoma, causing some damage to crops and washing out part of the bridge across the Red river at Sayre, Okla., and destroying part of the track on the approach.

The last train to cross the bridge that pont was the early west bound passenger train Monday morning. Since that time trains from this end of the line have gone only to the first town this side of the washout, the waters being too high for passengers and mail to be transferred safely. The night trains have been cancelled, but were put on again last night

Some crops over the country have been washed away and it will be necessary to replant. The continued wet weather has made field work impossible, except for two or three days at a time, and the fields have grown up in weeds, and there will be much difficulty in getting many of them cleaned out.




Six Inches of Rain In 2 Hours at Tulia

Penal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, renal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally oreas, cut, pull, tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary ap-purtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way will-fully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two or more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.
