



The sooner authorities know about fish kills the more apt they are to determine the cause, and if the situation warrants, nail the guilty parties, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department,

Anyone discovering a fish kill should call the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department as soon as possible, and if he has a camera on hand, he sould take several photographs show ing the extent of the kill.

Had a recent fish kill at Free port been handled this way, department authorities say, the job of determining the cause and the extent of the kill would have been easier.

By the time department of ficials found out about this kill, most of the dead fish had been buried in order to rid the area of an unsanitary situation.

Department personnel now have little to work with in their efforts to find out exactly what happened.



Early Weaning Of Lambs Suggested

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fruit

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Early weaning and drylot feeding of lambs are praotices that the sheep producer can use to his advantage in drought eriods, according to Dr. Mautice Shelton of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's Research and Extension Center at McGregor.

Dr. Shelton said that dry feed should be provided where forage can't support good grow-th of the lamb (.3-.4 lb. dailminimum). Where extensive feeding is necessary, he recom-mended separation of the ewes and lambs for better manage -

ment of their requirements. Only about 25% as much nutrients are required to produce pound of lamb gain when the lambs are fed directly, he ad-

Of course, this saving is valid only when the ewe can bemanaged or disposed of so that her maintenance isn't charged to the lamb.

Dr. Shelton commented that f both the ewe and the lamb are fed, but separated, a feed saving of 40% can be realized over feeding the ewe of pro-duce milk for the lamb. Additional information on

early weaning and drylot feed-ing will be discussed in depth at the Sonora Field Day, April 1, Shelton said.



Safety Against **Poisoning Children**

Who would want to hurt a child? Certainly not you. But for every child accidently poisoned, an adult is responsible says Mrs. Doris Myers, Extension specialist in home mana. gement at Texas A&M Univer-

Each year, close to one mil lion children accidently ingest medicine and commonly-used household products, such as cleaning agents, furniture po-lish, kerosine, paint thinner and pesticides.

To prevent a tragedy, learn the potential danger spots for your child. For example, Mrs. Myers sayd that a child under five is constantly exploring his surroundings. When he learns to crawl, he reaches, touch and tastes everything within reach. Products stored on the floor and in floor-level cabinets, then are potential danger spots for him.

A common remedy in protecting a child against house hold poisons is always keeping them locked up. But other simple rules are vital for your child's safety, Mrs. Myers adds, Never describe medicine as

candy; call it by name --- med icine.

Read the label on the bottle of medicine each time you use it, even if it means turning the light on at night. This practice prevents giving an overdose or the wrong medicine. Children are tempted to imi-

tate, so don't take medication in their presence. When the phone or door bell

rings, take the furniture polish with you. Don't leave it on coffee table to tempt your child to sample it. Keep all products in their original container. Don't transfer it to a soft crink bottle or cup.

Texas Gets Federal Funds Texas was allocated \$653

750 in federal funds for fish restoration and \$1, 538, 500 for wildlife restoration for operations in 1971.

Texas and Alaska received equal amounts for wildlife resotration and were the two states receiving the highest allocations. Texas, Californ ia and Alaska received the highest allocations for fish restoration.

Funds are made available by the U.S. Department of Interior's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife to all 50 states, Guam, the Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico.

Wildlife funds are derived from the 11% excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition, and money for fish projects comes from a similar levy on certain sport fishing equipment.

States receive amounts based on a formula using the state's area and the number of its hunting and fishing license holders. Under these restoration programs, states initiate projects and are reimbursed for up to 75% of their cost.

Projects which qualify in clude acquisition of land and water for wildlife and fish for public use, improvement of wildlife and fish habitat, development of vacilities for sportsmen and research to aid in wildlife and fish ma nagement.

In all, \$30, 800, 000 was al located to the states for wildlife restoration and \$13, 105, 000 for fish restoration.

nutrients lacking in the soil. If no extensive water analysis is performed a simple rule of thumb may tell you whether fertilization would be practical. Thrust your arm into the water up to elbow level. If you can't see the palm of your hand clearly, don't ferti-

lize. If the water is gray or brown ish color, it's muddy. If it's greenish there probably are enough (or too many) nutrients there already.

Use the same type of water soluble organic nitrogen fertilizer your county agent would recommend for the soil around the lake, and figure the application per acre about the same as for dry land fertilization. Fertilizer shouldn't be dump ed into the water. If this is

done, most of the material will sink to the bottom and be used by undesirable plants. Put the fertilizer in a loose -

weave burlap sack and suspend it a few feet underwater from the end of a dock or floating raft. Allow it to drift around the lake if possible.



Under the new farm programs, participants will make their set-asides, maintain their farms' conserving bases, and be free to use the rest of their cropland as they choose, except for crops under marketing quotas or other controls----these are peanuts, rice, tobacco, extra long staple cotton and sugar cane.

> The set-aside farm program is quite different from any previous farm programs. For the first time, the allotments and bases for a farm do not dictate to a farmer the number of acres he is allowed to plant to a specific crop. Allotments and bases are used to figure the set-aside acreages and price support payments, not to limit produc tion of any one crop.

This is based on the fact that U.S. farmers are able to produce more farm products than the market will




