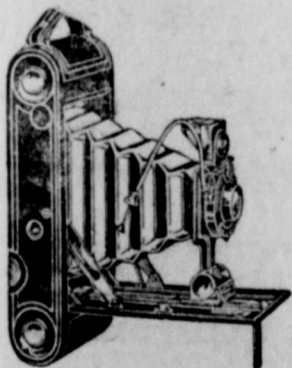

Fair Weather Sunday Causes Many Folks to Go to Sunday School

McLean people who attend church and Sunday school may deny the charge of being fair weather church goers, but the large number who were present Sunday, as compared with the record for several months past, would indicate that they are. It was a beautiful day; in fact it was the first Sunday this year that there has not been something wrong with the weather—either cold, wet, threatening or windy, and sometimes all four. But the weather being ideal, the people wanted to go somewhere, and there was no place else to go on Sunday morning, so they went to Sunday school.

The Methodist church reported 136 present and only 14 absent, an increase of about 100 per cent over previous Sundays. 84 had good lessons, and there was \$10.69 collection. The large offering was due to last Sunday being missionary Sunday, and the people were more generous than usual because the money goes to missions. Another wonderful thing about the Methodists' report was that all the officers and teachers were present and on time.

The Baptists report a substantial increase over the average for the past few months, with 70 present and only 18 absent. Their secretary, John Cobb, says they also had all officers and teachers present and on time, which in their case is also unusual.

The Presbyterian Sunday school had an attendance of 40, with 10 absent. There was only one teacher not present, and that person is out of town on an extended business trip.

The only Sunday school that did not have an unusually large attendance was the Nazarenes, who had 22 present of an enrollment of 36. They claim to have the most reliable bunch of church-goers in town, the average all through the winter being around 30. The drop for last Sunday is accounted for by the interior decoration that is being done. The house is full of scaffolding, which detracts from comfort as well as convenience.

McLean Democratic Precinct Convention For Administration

More interest was taken in the Democratic precinct convention at this place Saturday afternoon than has ever been shown before, because of the important issue at stake. About fifty or sixty voters, nearly half of them women, were present at the meeting in the Odd Fellows' hall Saturday afternoon.

Many who heard the big noise the Bailey faction had been making were disappointed in their representation at the convention. There were a few there, but they were as quiet as mice, being hopelessly in the minority.

Precinct Chairman J. H. Bodine called the house to order and announced that C. E. Anderson had a resolution to offer. Mr. Anderson read the resolution, endorsing the administration and the League of Nations plan, and it was adopted unanimously, without any discussion. Mr. Anderson then read another resolution denouncing Mr. Bailey of Washington and the anti-administration faction, which was adopted by such a large standing vote that those opposed to it did not rise when the chairman called for the opposing vote.

After the adoption of the resolutions, speeches were made by S. E. Boyett and C. E. Anderson.

The following were chosen as delegates to the county convention, which met at Lefors Tuesday: M. M. Newman, C. E. Anderson, S. E. Boyett, M. D. Bentley, J. O. Quattlebaum, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Bodine, Mrs. J. M. Noel and Miss Vella Wilson.

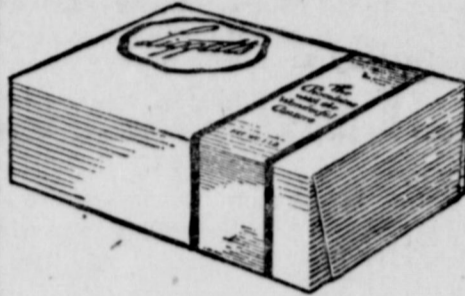
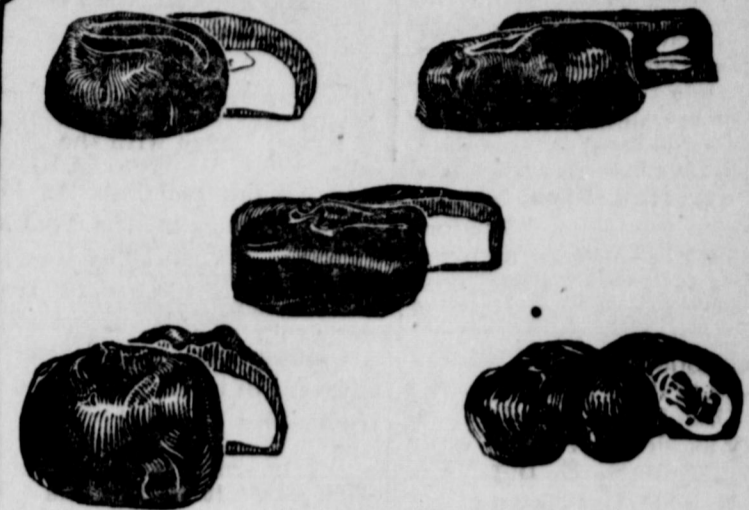
30-Piece Orchestra Organized in McLean
