Red Cross Membership Drive Begins Nov. 11

The annual Red Cross drive for members will begin Armistice Day, Nov. 11, and close Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 25. Red Cross workers throughout Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma have been notified by officials at southwestern divisional headquarters of the Red Cross at St. Louis. The campaign will be known as the "Fourth Red Cross Roll Call." Red Cross officers at national headquarters of the organization in Washington made known that as the result of the roll call last fall the American Red Cross now has 10,000,000 members, with returns still coming in. This is more than 20 times the pre-war membership of the society, and, of course, does not take into account the 14,000,000 school children members of the Junior Red Cross.

In fixing the date of the annual enrollment of members, explanation was made on the decision of the Red Cross to make each Armistice Day the occasion for renewing popular allegiance to the Red Cross through dollar annual memberships. Thus the Fourth Roll Call will have for its primary purpose maintenance of as nearly universal as possible to carry on the peace time responsibilities of the Red Cross.

These obligations include continuation of measures in behalf of America's veterans of war, particularly the disabled; service for the peace-time Army and Navy; development of stouter national resistance to disease through health centers; increase of the country's nursing resources and Red Cross co-operation with official health agencies; continued preparedness for disaster relief; home service and community work; and completion of relief work among the war-exhausted and disease-ridden people overseas.



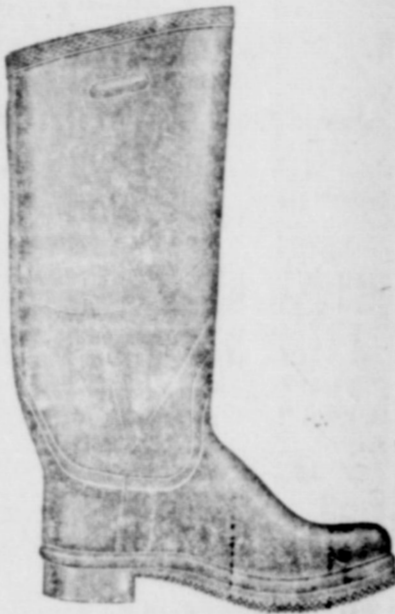

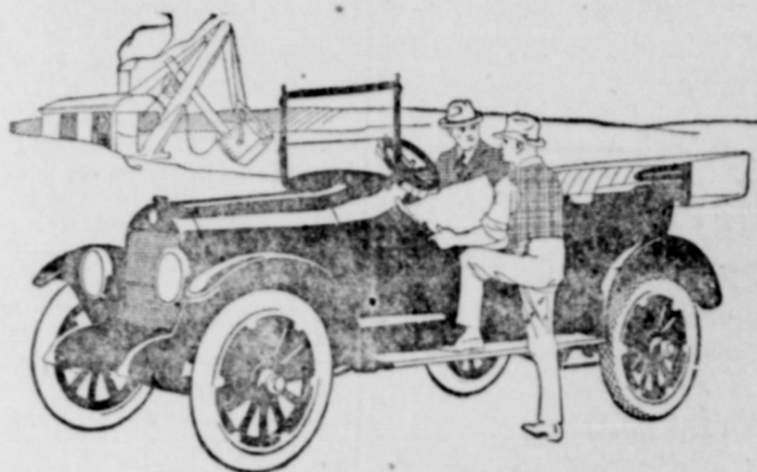

CITY OF STONES AND

Old Spanish Stronghold of Avila
Long Been Known by the Peculiar Cognomen.

Avila is an ancient Spanish hold now known as the city of stones and saints. The stones are piled enough in the high wall, broken towers, which surrounds the city and in the past kept out invaders. Some people say, however, that the term stones refers to stone pigs which decorate the city in unexpected places. No spot is sacred for these roughly carved which fact recalls the tradition when paganism ruled in Avila, grotesque animals were themselves objects of veneration. But today provoke only jests in spite of the tititudes of haughty aloofness.

The saint part of the stone saints epithet is adequately represented by Santa Teresa, the most famous saint of Spain, who spent most of her life in Avila. Santa Teresa at her career of saintliness at 17 years of age, when she tried to herself martyred by the Moors of the city walls. She was freed from achieving this at the criticism by her relatives. Later, translated, she was transported to Madrid and given instructions on building a convent, after which she turned to earth and spent the rest of her life carrying out the orders, and thereby winning the admiration of the people.

Young Man's Opportunity

There are from twelve to four million bales of cotton produced annually. Every bale is to be classed from one to five times, seldom by the same man twice. 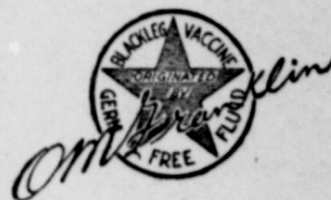

\$25 REWARD

I will pay a twenty-five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of any party guilty of tying down any telephone wire or in any other manner tampering with the lines. The state law on the subject is as follows:

Penal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary appurtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.

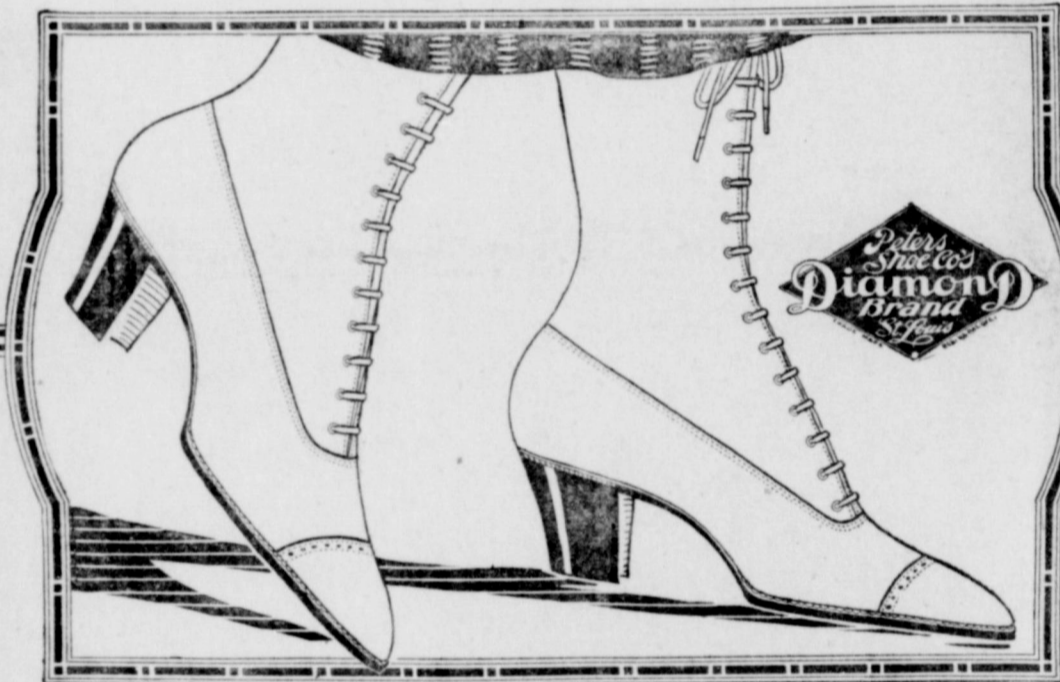

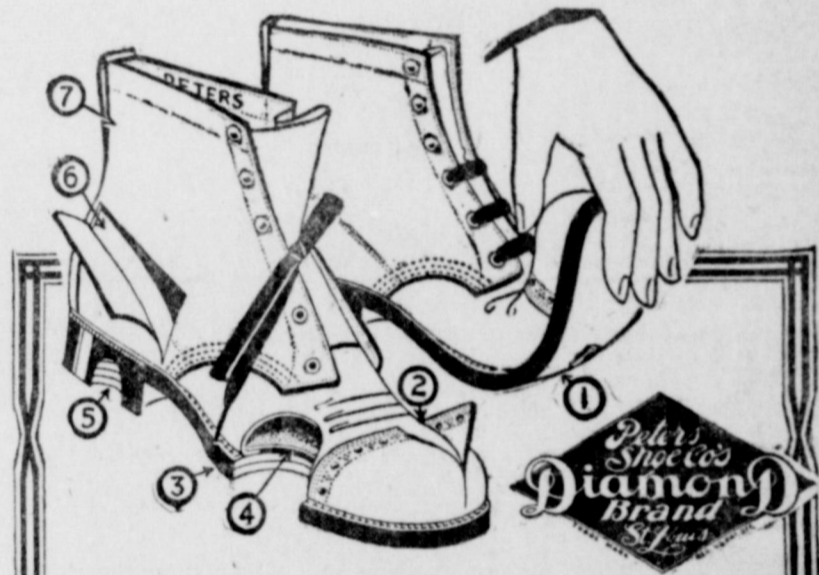
