LOTHES

Warns Against Danger of Typhoid

That every precaution should be taken to prevent typhoid during the fly season, is the opinion of Dr. J W. Ballard as told to the News in an interview several days ago.

"They should be particularly careful," says the doctor, "about drinking water. When the water comes direct from the well, there is little risk. But when it is pumped into a tank and allowed to stand indefinitely there is danger of contamination unless the tank is cleaned ocassionally. There is always more or less slimy filth that will settle from even the clearest well water, which in time will form a menace to the health of those who drink the water."

One case of typhoid has been reported this year, and it may be followed by others if care is not taken with the drinking water, and if more attention is not paid to screen ing houses and fly breeding places attended to.



Art. 784: If any person shall int ntionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph r telephone wire, post, m chinery or other necessary anpu ten nce to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct o interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penicentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.
