Home Demonstration Notes

Our Domestic Science short course held in the school house at McLean was quite a success. Mrs. Barnes, district agent, and Miss Taylor, specialist, are very fine in their respective lines. There was a good attendance, and interest ran high.

At this meeting the members decided to fit up a kitchen for use in demonstrations. Mrs. W. D. Sims donated an oil stove and the other members present agreed to contribute a hen or the price of a hen to buy other necessary equipment.

June 7th the "hen party" for the kitchen equipment began. On June 8th the "hen party" opened in McLean. Those who contributed are: Mesdames Charlie Back, J. S. Morse, C. E. Hunt, R. H. Corum, C. E. Henderson, Joe Penland, and Miss Vella Wilson.

The hens contributed from the Back settlement weighed 27 lbs., at 24c, \$6.48. Those from McLean weighed 11½ lbs., \$2.76. Mrs. Geo. Colebank gave \$1.25, making the total \$10.49.

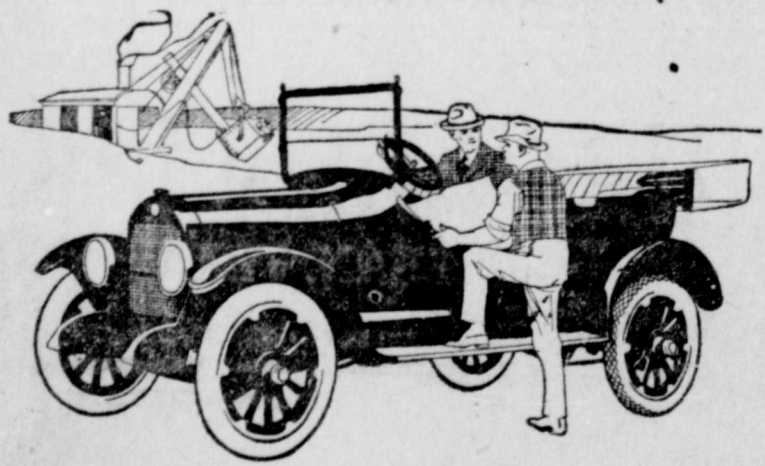
