Red Cross to Have a Local **Health Nurse**

McLean Red Cross Chapter has arranged for a public health nurse to be sent here by Feb. 1st, to work in the schools of the south side of Gray county, as well as to do health work among the public in general.

One of the first things to be done will be to weigh, measure and examine all the school children for physical defects. Experience has proven that a large per cent of children have some defect which interferes with their school work, and that in many cases the children are undernourished, merely because people in general have never been taught how to plan a balanced diet. It is said that when a child is as much as seven per cent under weight, there is something wrong, and the public health nurse will make it her business to find out what it is.

HEALTH PROGRAM Following is the health program that has been outlined for the public health nurse and will be begun as soon as she arrives: Meet with mothers of the chilphysical defects, malnutrition,

explain to them.

Weigh and measure each child. Go into schools with local doctors and examine each child for physical defects.

and make suggestions.

Conduct classes for mothers and older girls in home hygiene

Act or serve as public health nurse while here, working with local doctors.

Establish health center and rest room if wanted.

Farming in the McLean Country

The agricultural resources of the McLean country have not as yet been fully developed; however, the variety of crops grown and marketed here is surprising. It is a place where Old Mr. H. C. L. met his Argonne. The farmer sets his own table with everything good of his own raising. One farmer had served his friend a sumptuous meal that would tickle the palate of Dives himself, and when it was over he informed his guest that the actual money spent for that meal was two cents, and that was for sugar.

The farmer at McLean plants first in the spring Indian corn, then kafir and cotton, milo maize and sorghum. In the meantime he has his garden growing with all kinds of garden truck and his sod seeded with watermelons. His sweet potatoes are growing apace, and he works happily as he watches the apples, pears, peaches, plums, cherries, apricots, grapes and berries forming on the trees and vines.

The boys and girls on the farm delight in the promise of peanuts, popcorn and candy. In fact, the McLean farmer lives at home, and with his home as his heaven and his children as his angels, he sleeps peacefully at night without any disturbance from the worrying thoughts that are wont to pester the one-crop wheat farmer or the one who trusted his all to a crop of cotton.




