## Your Check Is Good at Depot No Longer

"Nope. Sorry, but I can't accept your check," says B. L. Burk, local agent for the Rockland railway. Yes, he says it is everybody, for he says he is tired of being continually in suspense. During the three and a half months he has been in McLean, Mr. Burk says he has been in about \$750 in checks that were absolutely worthless, ranging in amount from 91 cents to more than \$400.

When an agent accepts a check in payment for anything in the transaction of "company business," it is entirely at his own risk, he having instructions from the general office to demand cash.

While Mr. Burk has succeeded in collecting money from all parties who have given bad checks, he feels that he is taking a big risk, and says that anybody's check will look good at the window any more.

## 500 Miles of Red Cross Seals for Texas This Year

Austin.—Five hundred miles of Christmas seals will be placed on sale in Texas during the Christmas holidays. If all the seals printed for Texas would be placed end to end they would make a line one inch wide and five hundred miles long. This is the statement made by the Texas Public Health Association, which directs the Christmas seal sale in Texas.

Enough tuberculosis Christmas seals have been printed and distributed by the National Association to reach more than half way around the world. Nine hundred million seals have been distributed to the forty-eight state tuberculosis associations and more than eleven hundred local anti-tuberculosis associations scattered throughout the United States. If placed in a row these seals would measure fifteen thousand miles.

The penny seals will be used in the fight against tuberculosis, and this year will be known as the tuberculosis Christmas seals. They are sold to support the national, state and local anti-tuberculosis associations in the country.

Ninety-five per cent of the money raised through the sale of Christmas seals will remain in the Lone Star State for the fight against tuberculosis and other public health work of the Texas Public Health Association and its local societies all over the state.

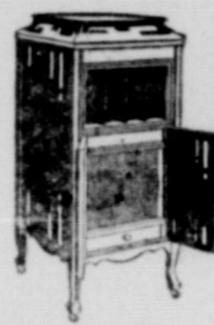

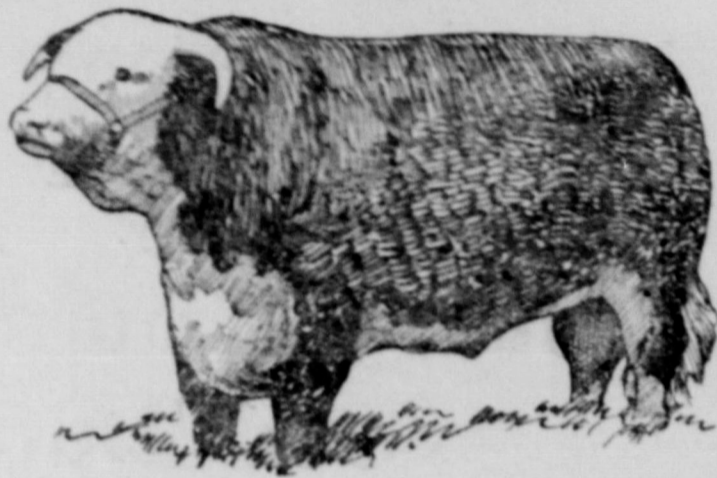

Penal code, Art. 184: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull or tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery, or other necessary appurtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two nor more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.

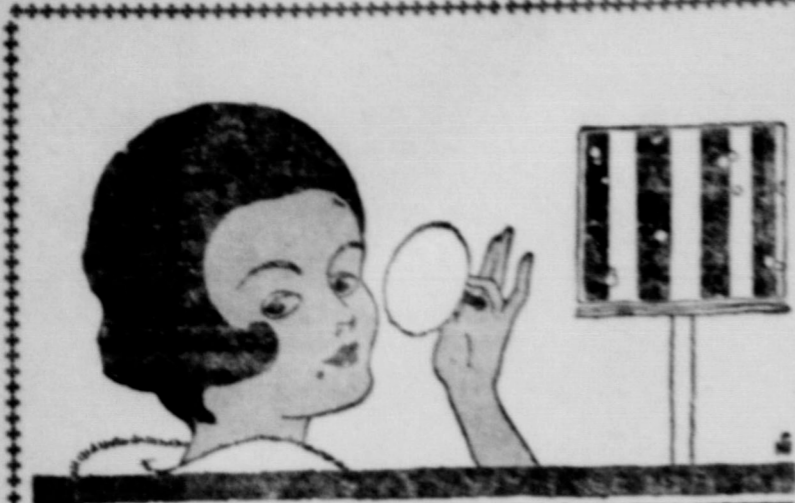

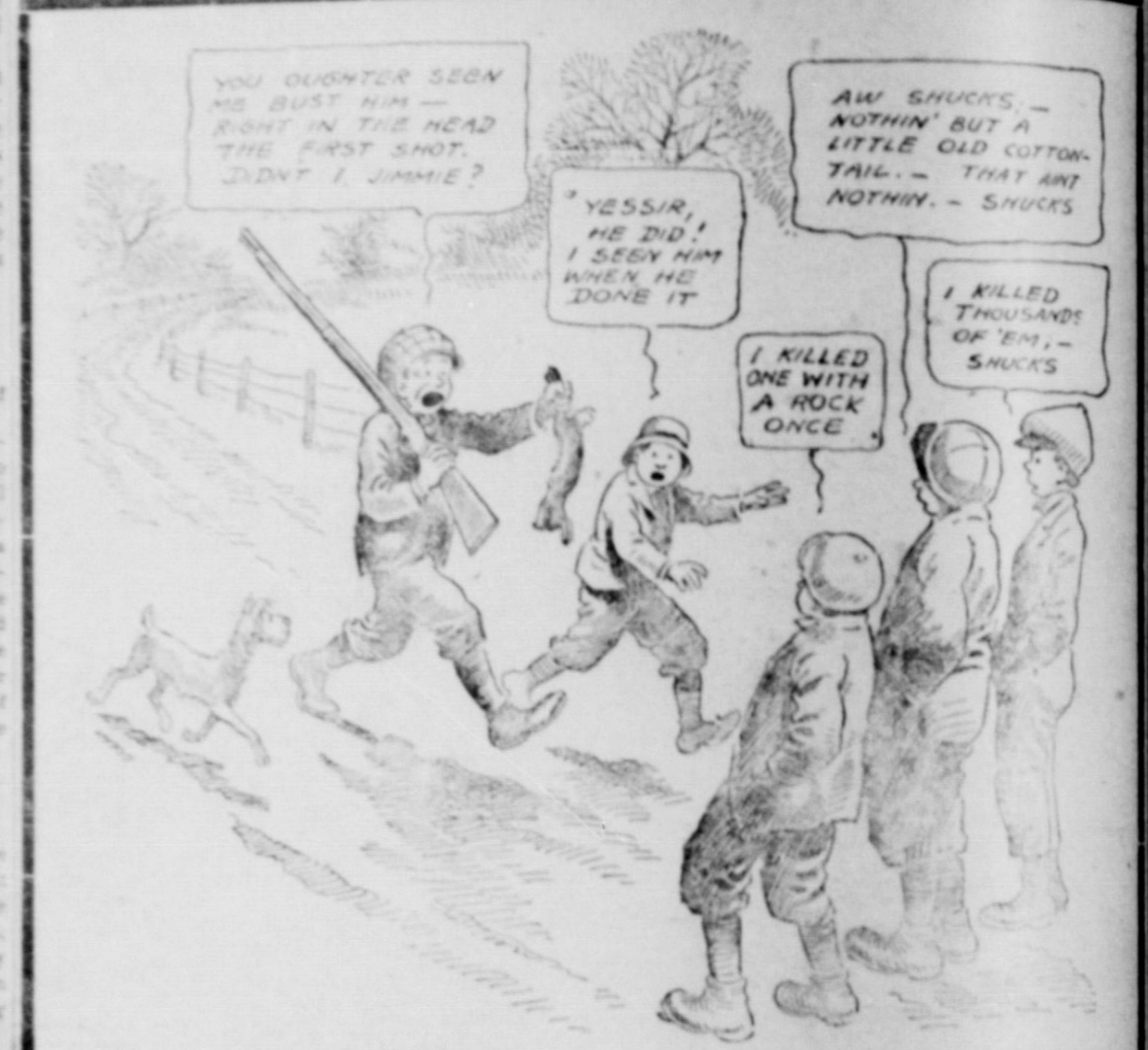
