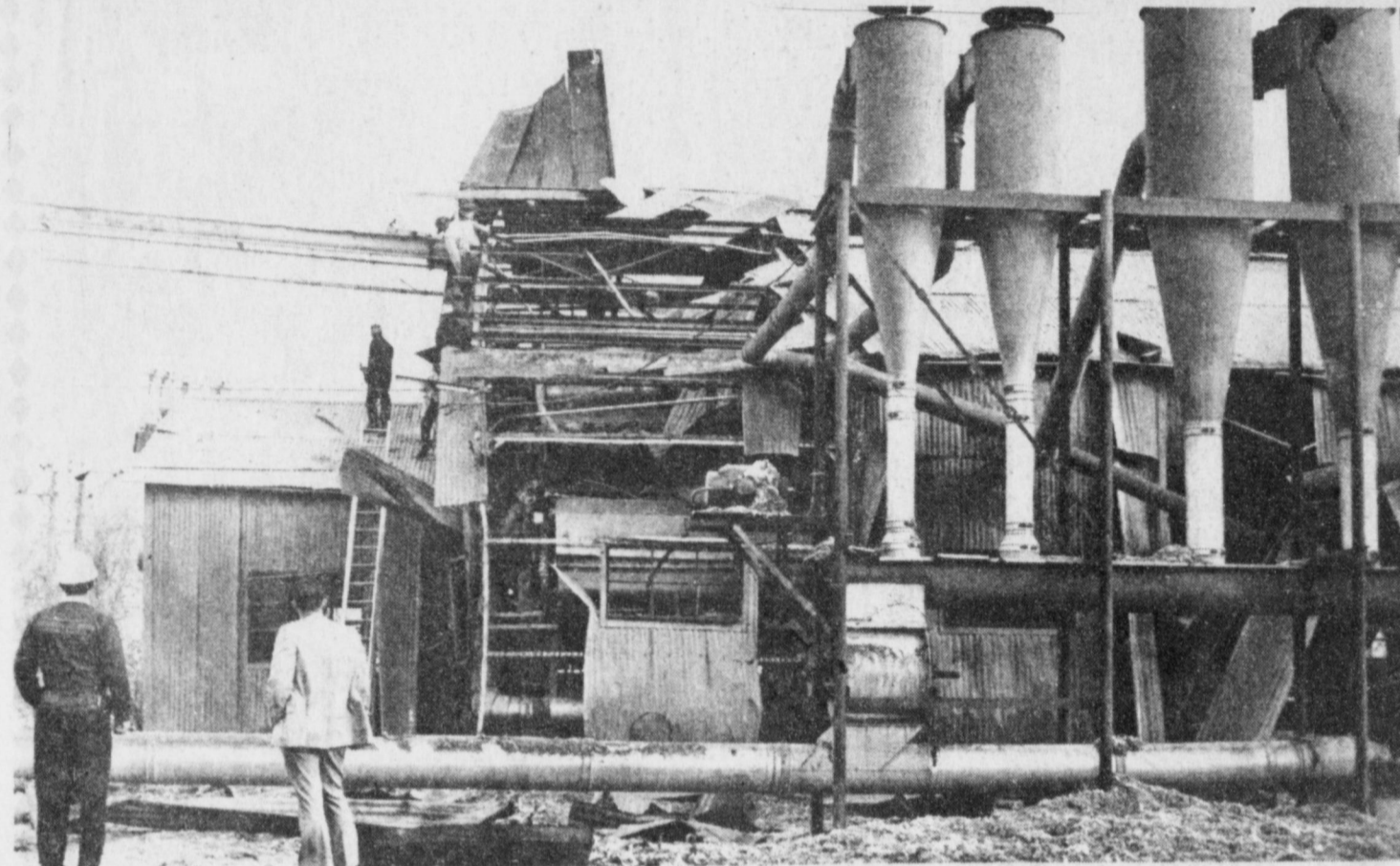

An explosion ripped through the Paymaster Gin Muleshoe Thursday afternoon, injuring three men working in the gin. The explosion could be heard all over town about 2:40 p.m. Thursday. The Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department answered a call to the gin immediately following the explosion. Firemen searched through the demolished tin building looking for a threat of fire, but no fire was ever found.

The tin structure was heavily damaged as tin was torn from the sides and the roof and all glass windows blown out.

Three men injured during the blast were Alex Alvarado, Servando Cavazos and Jessie Cassanova. All were treated for minor injuries, the most serious being a broken ankle, according to the gin manager.

The gin is located about one block north of the railroad tracks on North First Street in Muleshoe.

Many Motorists Are Exceeding 55 m.p.h.

The reduction of the speed limit due to the energy crisis has definitely affected the number of traffic fatalities in Texas, but many drivers are starting to disregard the limit and

drive at greater speeds.

Jim Arnold, Administrator of the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety, issued a plea for the motorist to cooperate and observe the 55 mph limit on a voluntary basis. He also announced plans for a statewide study to determine the effect of the lowered speed limit in relation to fatal accidents.

Said Arnold, "When the energy shortage hit and the limit was set at 55 by state and federal law, most motorists complied and kept their speed down and limited their travel. Now that gasoline is more readily available and travel more frequent, we are finding the driver is starting to allow his vehicle to surpass the regulated speed limits. While this is certainly not all drivers, it does appear we have a huge increase of speeders on our highways."

He continued by pointing out the increase in traffic citations that have been issued in recent weeks. "State troopers are finding the motorist is traveling at increased speeds without regard to law, and some

are creeping toward the 70 miles-per-hour mark. Department of Public Safety statistics show a total of 78,295 arrests were made for speeding during the three summer months of 1973. Comparatively, there were 188,976 arrests during June, July and August of 1974.

'Christkindli' of Switzerland Reappears at Holy Season

Christmas has a unique significance in the German and French speaking regions of Switzerland because the "Christkindli" or Christ Child, is believed to walk on earth during this season.

Instead of Santa Claus, the "Christkindli" represented as a beautiful, radiant, angel-like being with wings carrying a magic wand and wearing a shining crown, distributes Christmas gifts and Christmas trees glittering with fanciful decorations.

Although the "Christkindli" is commonly believed to personify the Christ-Child, he is sometimes represented as an angel bearing a light or a star just as an angel heralded the birth of Christ at Bethlehem. On the other

hand, the "Christkindli" has some of the characteristics of a sprite, as suggested by the wand and the wings, which can be linked to pre-Christian beliefs. Some suggest he may stem from the pagan custom of representing the New Year as a radiant and beautiful child.

Like Santa, the "Christkindli" also arrives in a sleigh drawn by reindeer, so there would appear to be some intermingling of Christmas legends here.

St. Nicholas is represented in several ways in different parts of Switzerland. In some, he is called Father Christmas and comes with his wife, Lucy (representing St. Lucy whose feast day is December 13) to distribute gifts. He wears the traditional Santa Claus costume, while Lucy wears a round cap over her long braids, a laced bodice and a fancy apron.

In the central part of Switzerland, St. Nicholas is represented more realistically in his bishop's regalia complete with mitre and crozier. On St. Nicholas' Day, which falls on December 6th, there is a magnificent parade in which white bearded masqueraders, dressed in long white shirts, carry huge three-foot mitre-shaped lanterns over their heads. These lanterns are perforated in intricate religious designs, similar to church windows, and when the candlelight shines through them, as their bearers execute a stately dance, they are an impressive sight indeed.

In the village of Urnaesch in the Canton of Appenzell, the men and boys go "Santa Clausing." Some wear red Santa Claus costumes with jingling bells while others,

dressed and masked as "ladies," wear enormous, elaborate picture hats decorated with panoramas of Alpine scenes. Starting early in the day on New Year's Eve, the group proceeds through the village with an unusual hopscootch gait, stopping at each farm to share their merriment and partake of refreshments. When darkness falls, they all head for the Valley to pursue their New Year revelry.

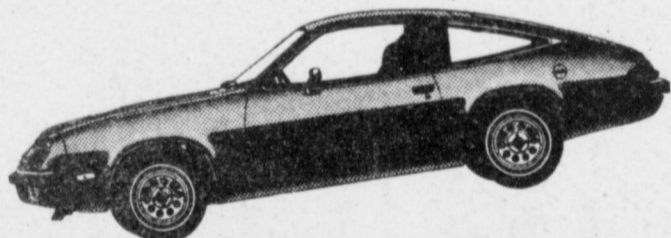

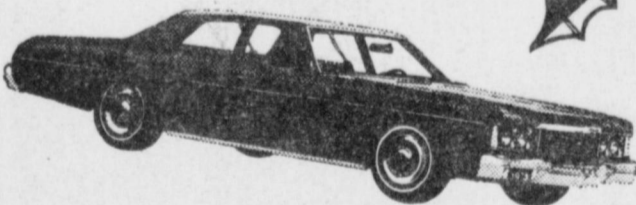

RECIPE

Your holiday meal will not be complete without a colorful and tasty salad. Cranberries and fruit salads always go well with turkey and ham. Cranberry Salad is used often during cold winter months at our home.

Cranberry Salad

- 1 can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple
- 1 lb. fresh cranberries
- 1 1/2 c sugar
- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1 c chopped pecans
- Lettuce

Drain juice from pineapple and add enough water to make 1 cup liquid. Combine juice, cranberries and sugar in saucepan; cover and cook until berries pop (about 10 minutes). Add gelatin to hot cranberries and stir until dissolved. Cool, add drained pineapple and nuts. Refrigerate. Serve on lettuce leaf. This salad can be made a day ahead of serving.

Conviction for the violations also reflected an increase," said Arnold.

Another contributing factor that may increase the chances of traffic crashes, injuries and fatalities, is the "variances of speed ranges." "For example," said Arnold, "a motorist is on the highway at 50 miles per hour and he is passed by a driver traveling 70 or more. This variance in the range greatly increases the opportunity for an accident."

Arnold said as the speed is violated to excess, the fatality figures may increase; there-

fore, he has called for a statewide study to determine the relationship of traffic accidents to the speed limit reduction in Texas.

The National Safety Council recently completed a study to evaluate the reduced limit in relationship to nationwide fatal traffic accidents. The study indicates reduced speeds played an important role in reducing the number of motor vehicle fatalities in the first four months of 1974 as compared to the same period of 1973. While the 55 mph limit did not force drivers to reduce their speeds on roads with already lower limits than 55 mph, the Safety Council feels the 55 mph limit was an important influence in convincing the driver to reduce overall speeds. Therefore, removal of the limit or increasing the limit, could encourage the motorist to increase his driving speeds at varied levels, resulting in an increase in traffic fatalities.

ASCS...

The ASCS has given farmers some provisions of the 1974 cotton and feed grain programs in every newsletter prepared and it is agreed that some provisions are hard to understand. Some have not followed the advice, or checked with the office before destroying the crop or residue, therefore, they will not receive any or a full disaster payment.

As soon as harvest is finished, and not more than 15 days after finishing harvesting, farmers must file Form ASCS 574 showing you have had a loss. If farmers spot harvest, they must file a Form ASCS-574 with the ASCS office and have the crop you did not harvest inspected before destroying it. Failure to do this will make the acreage ineligible for payment.

All gins in Bailey County have signed the agreement that they will use specification bagging and ties for 1974. The ASCS will prepare cotton loans in this office upon request. The loans mature 10 months from the first day of the month in which the loan is disbursed. Interest rate for loans is 9.375 percent.

If anyone has sold any wool or unshorn lambs in 1974, they must apply for the incentive payment by January 31, 1975. Wheat yields are in the process of being completed for 1975. If anyone wished to prove wheat yields up, submit five years production to the ASCS office by January 6, 1975.

Teenage Shoplifters Cost Millions

COLLEGE STATION--During the holiday season, merchandise worth millions of dollars will be stolen from Texas businesses by teenage shoplifters, one family life education specialist pointed out this week.

"The majority of teenagers will never shoplift--but about one in twenty teens will," Ilene Carrington, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System said.

She pointed out that teens who do shoplift don't usually steal because of actual need.

"They steal for kicks, to win peer acceptance get attention, or to support a drug habit. Others shoplift because of compulsion, psychological problems or for revenge against the establishment."

Figures show the majority of teenage shoplifters are females from middle and upper income families, she reported.

"Most teens don't consider shoplifting a serious offense. They don't realize they will probably be punished if they are caught. Young people 17 or older can be arrested, prosecuted

and can have permanent record for their theft. That kind of record could make it difficult to find a good job or get into college, she reminded.

Even if a young person does not shoplift himself, he may be tempted to accept or buy gifts from teens who do shoplift. But if caught with property he knows is stolen, a teenager may be prosecuted.

Youths under 17 caught shoplifting would be subject to the juvenile court processes, Miss Carrington said.

"Shoplifting is a problem in many Texas communities. Admitting that the community has a problem is the first step to changing the situation."

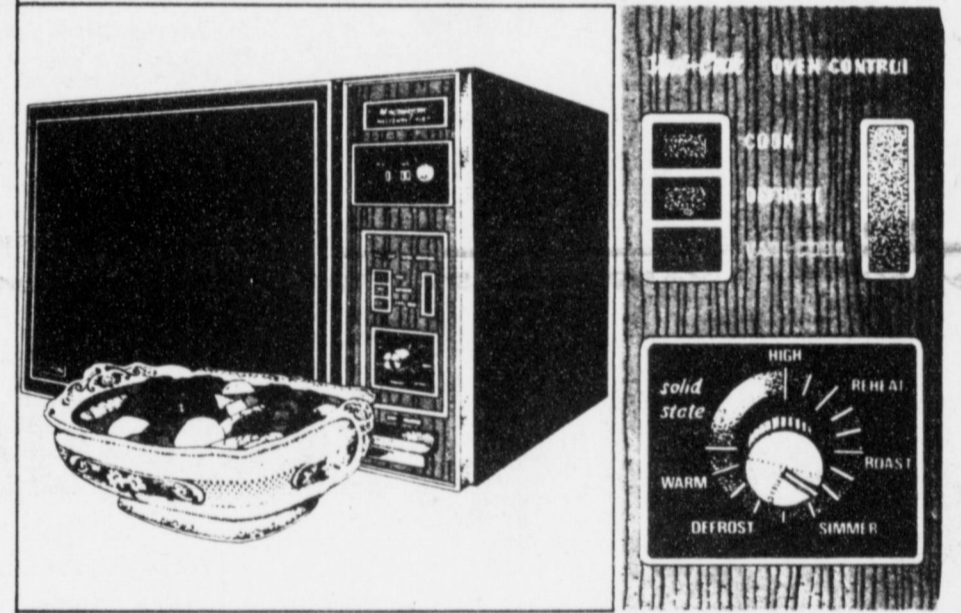

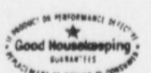

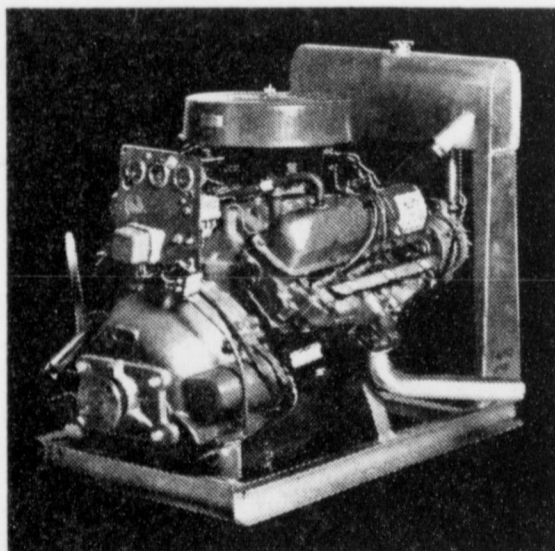

The First American Xmas Tree

Young Imgard went into the woods and chopped down a spruce tree. From the village tinsmith he obtained a twinkly tin star. The family made paper decora-

tions, and thus the Christmas tree, as most of us know it, came into being.

The townsfolk gathered 'round to admire it. Before long, the word had been spread far and wide, about the beautiful tree in Wooster, Ohio. It became an American custom.

America honors August Imgard. His tomb stands on Madison Hill in Wooster. This year, as in previous years, a lighted Christmas tree will probably stand at its door, a tribute to the man who first brought to America the symbol of joy and peace and love that should be Christmas for us all, all over the world.





LCC Calling Local Ex-Students Here

A \$6,000,000.00 fund raising drive called "Design for Destiny" has been launched at Lubbock Christian College in Lubbock, Texas, and a part of their program involves a marathon phone-a-thon, beginning December 6, and ending sometime in January 1975.

Forty-two faculty and staff members of LCC have pledged their time and effort to call all ex-students everywhere to request pledges and cash gifts to the College over a three year period. This will constitute half of the "Design for Destiny" goal. Then, when the College has raised an additional \$1,000,000.00 from outside the Lubbock area, Dr. Joe Mabee of Midland, Texas, and his friends have agreed to spearhead a national drive to raise the remaining \$2,000,000.

Dr. Joe Harker, President of the College said, "No one knows better the value of Lubbock Christian College than those who have been benefited, and we are counting heavily on their being a significant aid in our current "Design for Destiny" programs."

When Congress returned after the month-long election recess in November, the primary concern of almost everyone was the state of our economy. Much of the discussion and disagreement has centered around whether our major problem is inflation or recession. There are as many opinions on what solutions should be applied to these problems as there are people who offer the opinions. This diversity of thought has only served to aggravate and even to confuse the issue.

In light of this situation, the Republican Conference Committee, which is composed of all Republican Senators, met more than a week ago in an attempt to arrive at a consensus on economic policy. There was no desire among any of my Republican colleagues to replace the President's economic program. Rather, we felt that we could play a strong sup-

portive role by presenting a unified effort in the Senate as well as offering guidance from Capitol Hill to the President.

The conference adopted a resolution calling for an ad hoc committee of seven senators to study the economic situation and to draft appropriate policy statements and to suggest supplemental initiatives. The committee of seven was asked to report back to the full conference committee in one week.

Because of my background as ranking member of the Senate Banking Committee and because I am chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee and I served as the Republican Senator on the Steering Committee of the President's Economic Summit Conference, I was chosen to serve as chairman of this task force. The others who served with me are Senators Howard Baker, Carl Curtis, Paul Fannin, Jacob Javits, Ted

Stevens and Charles Percy. The committee met in five separate sessions, each session lasting at least two hours. Bill Simon, Secretary of the Treasury, met with the committee twice. In addition, Alan Greenspan, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors, and Arthur Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board met with me personally. These men, who are the top economic advisors in the administration, willingly submitted to our questions and contributed to our deliberations in a significant manner.

On Wednesday of this week the Republican Conference convened and the task force presented its unanimous recommendations for consideration. Following considerable discussion, the Conference adopted our proposals designed to supplement and reinforce the President's economic package. In the next few days, a delegation will present our suggestions to the President in some detail.

In considering general economic policy, we agreed that monetary policy must pursue an orderly and moderate growth and we hope that the tight monetary restraints we have experienced for some time now can be eased. The easing of the money supply, however, must be accompanied by a stringent control on federal spending. Likewise, tax reform is essential to relieve the burden on those of low and moderate income and simultaneously encourage increased investment, capital formation and employment.

We stress in our proposals that wage and price stability should be sought through the discipline of the marketplace and not through a system of economic controls. Additionally, trade reform, strengthened anti-trust policy, review of federal regulatory agencies, financial reform, and support for the ailing housing market all should be made priority items for both the President and the Congress to address.

The package which we have adopted is multi-faceted and cuts across the entire American economy. In addition to general economic policy, we addressed the areas of jobs and employment, energy resources and conservation, food production and productivity.

Increased employment and unemployment assistance through public service jobs and an emergency jobs program have become essential with the leap-frogging unemployment figures we now are experiencing.

We must launch an aggressive attack aimed at eliminating wasteful energy consumption while at the same time stimulating and encouraging increased domestic energy exploitation and production.

Food production at maximum levels should be encouraged through free market channels in order that we might meet present needs domestically and foreign demands for U.S. production.

And, we must be aware constantly of the need for the importance of a continual effort on the part of private enterprise and government bureaucracy alike to increase our nation's productivity across the boards.

In order to get the economy moving in the right direction, we must all pull in the same direction—the Congress as well as the Administration. The economic problems of the United States are an integral part of an international inflationary crisis. Only by working together can we bring our economy back to a normal rate of growth and expansion so that everyone in the United States as well as the world can enjoy a better way of life.

Cattle Lice Treatment Time

With the onset of cooler weather, livestock producers need to turn their thoughts to the problem of lice control. Generally, lice problems are more severe in the northern United States but sufficient numbers are often present in the southwest to cause economic damage.

Both types of lice—blood-sucking and biting—attack cattle. The sucking lice pierce the animal's skin and draw blood while the chewing lice feed on particles of hair, scales, scab and skin exudations. The life cycle of both is similar with increase in populations starting in the fall. Peak populations normally occur in late winter and early spring and then a rapid decline occurs.

Low numbers of lice may be present on certain animals year round. Since lice do not do well at high temperatures, the reproduction nearly ceases in the spring and the lice will migrate to the tips of the ears or tail to avoid the excessive body heat. With the arrival of cooler temperatures, lice reproduction increases. Cattle will tend to bunch or crowd up more allowing transfer of lice from one animal to another. Heavy hair coats also offer more protection to the parasites.

Often the first signals of lice problems are signs of rubbing and intense irritation to the animals. Large patches of hair may be rubbed off and fences may be pushed down. Lousiness is generally first noticed on poor, weak and unthrifty animals. Some animals will have heavy infestations every year while others seldom have a problem. There is definitely a resistance factor present in many animals.

If you wait until lice problems are too severe, large economic losses may occur prior to treatment. Cattle that harbor lice often do not respond to feed properly and are more subject to diseases because of their weakened condition. Anemia may result from blood loss from sucking lice and calves may become stunted.

Cattle lice may be controlled in a variety of ways. One pr-

actice that will lessen lice problems is to eliminate the "carrier" animals that constantly harbor high populations. Chemical treatment is very effective. Self-treatment devices such as dust bags, back rubbers, chain oilers and other such devices generally afford effective control at a low cost and with a minimum of labor. The location of these devices is very important to insure adequate use. The old practice of using used crankcase oil is not recommended since it often will cause more severe skin irritation than light populations of lice.

Approved sprays, dips and pour-ons are also effective but the animals must be gathered

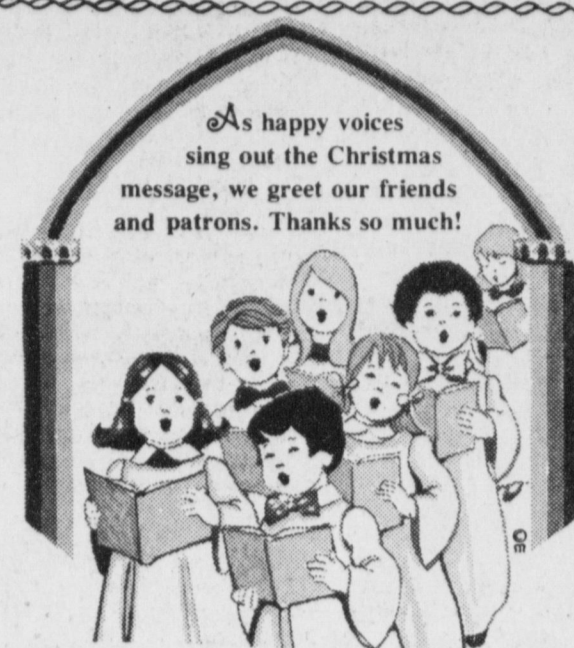
for treatment. If one of these methods is used, two applications on a 10-14 day interval may be necessary. After this is done, any new animal to be introduced into the herd should be treated in a similar fashion before it is placed with the previously treated animals.

Numerous materials are currently registered for cattle lice control. Before any material is used, the label should be thoroughly read and all restrictions and precautions should be followed. The product best suited for your use will depend on its price and availability. Producers are urged to check with local suppliers to determine the

most economical and effective material. Additional information on livestock parasite control (Suggestions for Con-

trolling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry, MP-691) is available from your local county Extension office.

These are the senses of home, the wondrously comforting "little" things that meant Christmas to many of us, many years ago.

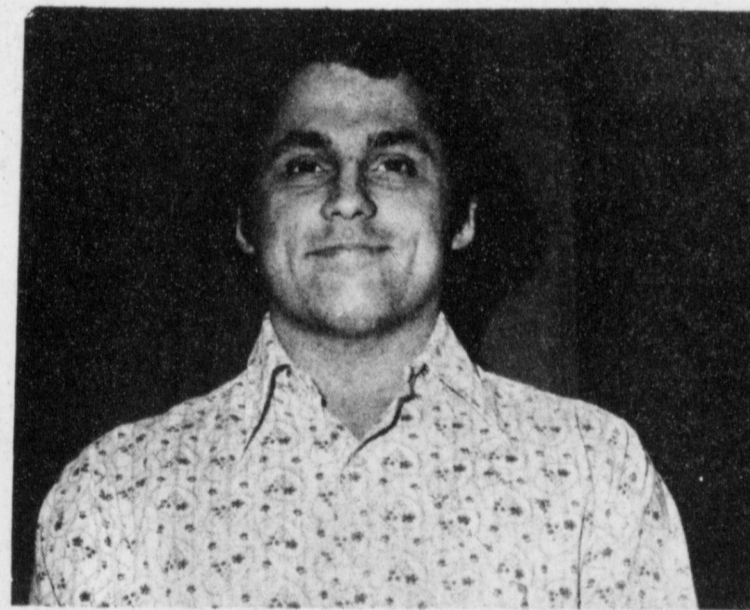

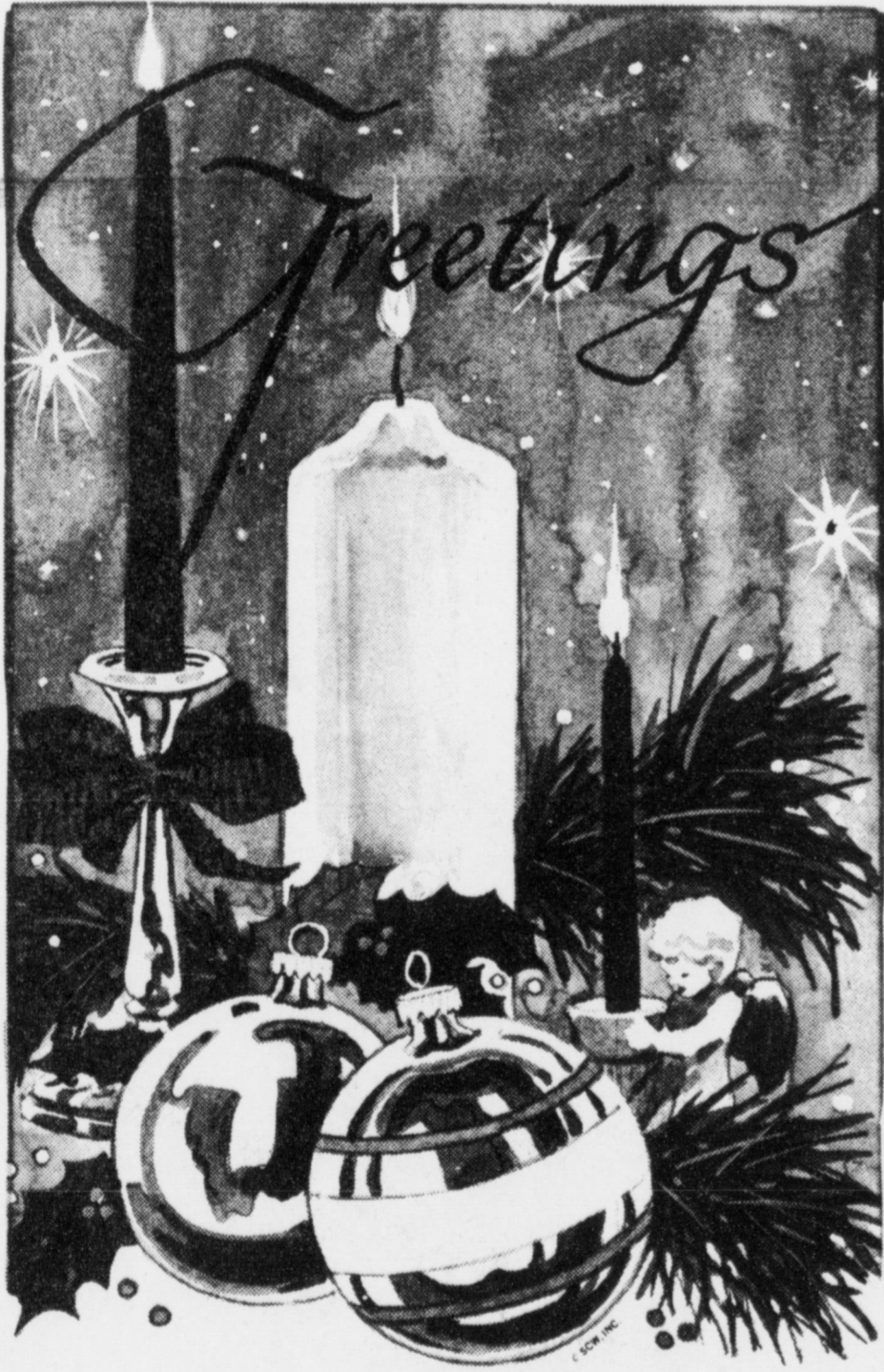

Yule Legends Span Many Years and Many Lands

Did you know that the first Christmas tree erected in a church in U.S., in 1851 shocked its Cleveland

congregation. It was considered too heathenish! ☆ America gave the world its most Beloved Christ-

mas plant—the poinsettia. The plant is a native of tropical America.



☆ Bayberry candles, which are said to foretell good luck for the coming year if they burn bright at Christmas, were first made by early settlers in America. They dipped bayberry branches in wax and burned them during the holidays.

☆ The story is told that over a hundred years ago, a parish priest in Salzburg, Austria, returning late one night from administering last rites to a dying woman, was awed by the particular majesty of the still, sparkled-with-stars night; he went home, wrote the lovely, haunting words of "Silent Night, Holy Night." With his organist, Franz Gruber, playing the great music on his guitar, the Father, Joseph Mohr, first introduced the strains of this popular hymn to a small congregation in Austria.

a Spanish Indian miracle play

Los Pastores, a Spanish-Indian play, is given in Texas each year. It is given by every-day people who work for a living, and find time to act at odd hours.

The rehearsals take place secretly in someone's back yard . . . and the play is performed in someone's back yard, unpublicized, unheralded. The objective is that no one shall see the miracle play just from mere curiosity; spirituality is the raison d'être.

Introduced into Mexico by Spanish monks, it is given from Christmas to Candlemas by an amateur group gathered by invitation from house to house.

The scene: at one end of the yard an altar of wood covered with black sateen, the background for the manger scene. On the steps, the family's prize possessions, while above ceilings are decked with rose-entwined crepe paper. In the center of the lowest step is the Christ Child, a life-size doll, placed on a platter of colorful candies; nearby are creatures of the Manger, of odd sizes and shapes.

Opposite this scene, at the other end of the yard is a tent with volcanoes, devils, fire. From it "live devils" emerge.

ils are vanquished, and the shepherds kiss the Child. A wild Indian enters and a fight ensues. He is overcome, and he kisses the Child. Then all solemnly and slowly approach the

altar and pay respects to the Child. Candy and food are offered.

THE YULE LOG STORY

Remember those familiar scenes of men and horses pulling a freshly-cut log home o'er the snow from the forest? It was the Yule log, destined for a Christmas fireplace! It lighted up the house with a cheery glow, turned night into day, and made the holiday festivities so much gayer.

This custom, which is observed in many places, goes far back into pagan times, long before Christianity.

Our ancestors called it the Mid-Winter Fire Festival. It was held indoors because of the bad weather outside.

The Yule log, generally an oak tree, would be ceremoniously lighted from a fragment saved expressly for this purpose from the year before.

When the new log sent out its brilliant flames it was believed that the house and family would once again be protected against lightning and fires; that the cattle and grain fields would thrive, and all the earth would be fertile.

Kissing Under Mistletoe

The word "mistletoe" derives from the Anglo-Saxon word "misteltan." It is a parasitic plant which grows on evergreen trees, with small yellowish-green leaves, yellowish flowers and waxy white, poisonous berries.

Mistletoe was considered sacred by the Druids in ancient Britain and they performed elaborate ceremonies around it at the winter solstice. Because of these pagan associations, it is seldom used in church decorations.

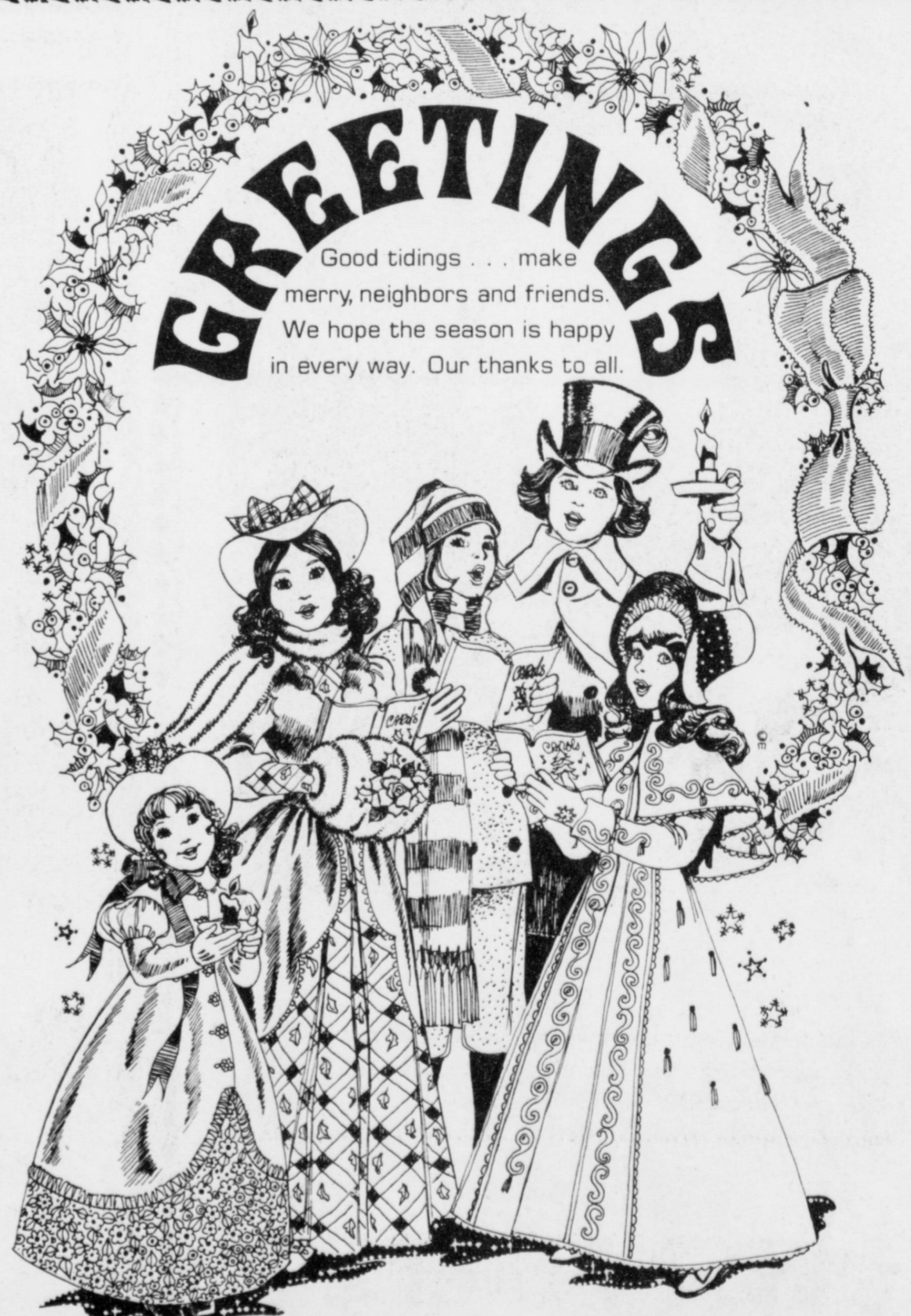

the legend of the woodman and the little stranger

Once upon a time, many years ago, there lived a woodman and his family in a little cottage deep in the forest.

When Christmas Eve came, the family sat down to a meagre meal, but their spirits were rich with gratitude that they had anything to eat, and a roof over their heads against the snow-storm raging outside. They

were grateful too, for the fire burning briskly in the grate.

As they were partaking of their thin soup there was a gentle knock on the door. "Who, I wonder," said the woodman, "is coming to see us on such a bitter night?" But he opened the door, letting the snowflakes blow in. There stood a child, pale and tired and shivering in ragged clothes. The family quickly brought him in, put warm, dry clothes on him and gave him some hot soup and bread. Then the woodman's wife, a kindly soul, gently put him to bed on the cot where her son usually slept.

After a time the whole family went to bed. During the night they were awakened by the sound of singing, the most beautiful to fall on mortal ears, for when they looked out the window they saw it was coming from a choir of angels!

In the center of the choir stood the little boy, dressed in splendid robes, and around him a radiance which out-dazzled the white snow about him.

Awed by the spectacle,

the woodman and his family knew at once that the little visitor was the Christ Child, and bowed in reverence.

Joyous Bells!

One of the most joyous symbols of Christmas is the ringing of bells. The mellow, sweet-toned ones in church steeples and belfries have heralded the coming of Christmas since the Middle Ages.



In addition to the bells that ring with solemn grandeur from cathedral and churches there are the secular types that hail the pure joy of the occasion.

Christmas had become well established before bells became an important part of the celebration. The first large bell for a Christian church is said to have originated with a bishop in Italy, in the fifth century, A.D.

Church bells have called people to worship, they have told the time of day, they peal for weddings and toll for deaths, they have been rung to warn of enemies and disasters and to celebrate happy events of many varieties. But the high point of every year has been the ringing of church bells during the Christmas season. In England, especially, this became a tradition, during the Middle Ages. The joyful clangor started at vespers on the first Sunday in Advent, and repeated on the following Advent Sundays. On the three mornings before Christmas Day, happy peals were rung as a reminder. At sunset on December 24th and every hour thereafter until sunset on December 25th bells pealed joyously. On Christmas Day bells would be rung spontaneously, at any hour.

In the melodious tones of their church bells people believed they heard "the songs of the angels" on that first Christmas, so long ago.

Breaking a branch from a fir tree the Child set it in the ground, saying, "Because of your goodness to me, this branch will become a tree. It will always be green and will bear fruit at Christmas, and you will

always be blessed with plenty at that season."

And so, every Christmas after that, the woodman and his family enjoyed delicious fruit heaped high on their table, the gift of the Christ Child.

Religion Historian Urges that Xmas cards emphasize the Christ

A noted historian of the Southwest, an archivist of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of a city in the Far West, puts the blame of some of the world's disorders on the secular nature of many Christmas cards.

"Over two and one half billion cards are distributed annually in the United States. If more of them were religious and carried messages that would appeal to thoughtful, even non-religious adults, these cards would help bring peace on earth," he declares.

The priest exhibited one card, printed in Germany and mailed in New York

December 24, 1908, to a student of a Boston seminary, as an example of an attractive early Christmas card which also was religious.

The card, like an ordinary postcard, pictured a rather stylized angel with wings, a palm frond which perhaps was meant to symbolize peace on the order of an olive branch, and an upraised arm. Between the wings appeared the star of Bethlehem and the words, "in terra pax," or "peace on earth."

The angel, emerging from a cloud, was peering down upon a village, with the church the most prominent structure visible.

The historian pointed out that sending cards probably started in the early Victorian era. Sir Henry Cole, an art dealer and publisher, sent the first one, in 1843. It was a card designed by a well-known artist of the period, John Calcott.

a lovable legend, bringer of gifts

Throughout history, Santa Claus has had many names, many origins. He has as many personalities as fertile imaginations through the ages can dream up.

The symbol of Santa Claus and other magical bringers of gifts is infinitely variable. In Europe the chief gift-bringers are St. Nicholas on his saint's day, the 6th of December; his Anglo-American descendant is Santa Claus; in parts of Scandinavia dwarfs and goats take his place; there is the Christ Child of the German Xmas Eve; the white-robed girl Kolyada in pre-revolutionary Russia arrived by sleigh on Christmas Eve with attendant carol-singers; and the Epiphany gift-bearers associated with the Magi — such as the Befana of Italy, Baboushka of old Russia, and the Tres Reyes Magos of Spain — all parade down through the centuries with essentially the same function — to bring gifts to good little boys and girls.

Santa Claus himself is composed of many elements; he is half Saint Nicholas and half ancient yule god. St. Nicholas, the original, was a bishop of Myra in Asia Minor in the fourth century. He is supposed to have wrought miracles; certainly he was a good man. Many stories evolve from legends concerning the Bishop. One which is not as well known

is told which introduces his connection with children.

Three boys were murdered by an innkeeper, cut up, and the pieces preserved in barrels of vinegar. St. Nicholas found these truncations, fitted them together with a prayer, and brought the boys back to life. To our 20th century minds this may seem a most macabre way to begin a legend's association with children!

In Holland, St. Nicholas becomes Sante Klaas. The children put out a pair of shoes or clogs filled with hay, water and carrots for his white horse; these are placed before the fireplace, and the next morning the shoes are found filled with either sweets and little gifts — or, depending on

past behavior, birch rods:

Santa's arrival by chimney in America probably has an origin of antecedent significance. Hearth-gods and gods of the Yule-log went in and out by chimney — also witches, adherents of the old and earliest religion of the horned god only much later made into a satanic Christian devil-figure. (Shades of an exorcist!) These people used hallucinatory drugs and used ointments like belladonna that made them feel like they were flying.

So it seems that the jovial, genial fellow whom we know as St. Nick or Santa Claus has had his darker side, too. All very interesting, as is most history, if you dig deep enough.

Christmas Trees For Ecology . . .

Many people believe that the cutting of trees for Christmas "robs" nature and destroys a portion of our forests each year, but the truth is that nearly three-quarters of such trees are raised specifically to be cut at Christmas-time. Most of the remainder are "thinlings" — young trees cut in forests to improve the growth opportunities for other trees.

Forestry experts and nurserymen point out that young, growing trees give off more oxygen and absorb more carbon dioxide than mature ones, so that the cultivation of Christmas trees actually helps the ecology. In contrast, they say, the manufacture of artificial trees uses up valuable energy and natural resources, which are not recoverable.

After Christmas, discarded trees can be used in various ways to benefit the environment. Even if you live in a city, ecologists suggest, you can help by getting in touch with a local conservation organization or commercial nursery.

Candlemas Day, still observed in some churches on February 2, was instituted in the 11th century. On that day, candles were blessed and Scripture was read describing the candle as the symbol of the Christian's love for the Christ that dwells within him.

Italy Celebrates Religious Christmas Festivities Representing Many Origins

The celebration of Christmas in Italy, perhaps more than in any other country, illustrates the multiple origins of the festivities we observe in modern times.

Christmas in Italy is primarily a religious festival, highlighted by the Christmas Novena, a series of church services on nine

nights preceding Christmas and culminating in a Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve.

A feature of the observance is the display, usually from Christmas Eve to Epiphany (January 6th) of the creche or Persepio (the word means manger or stable), a Nativity scene

with more or less elaborate landscaping and figures of sheep, cattle, and shepherds, as well as Mary, Joseph and the Christ Child. At Epiphany, figures of the Three Kings with their retinues, bringing gifts to the Child, are added.

These Nativity scenes originated in the thirteenth

century with Saint Francis of Assisi, who decided to make the Christmas Eve Mass a re-enactment of the birth of Christ, and for many centuries they remained essentially an ecclesiastical presentation, with local churches vying for the most decorative creche. In more recent times, Nativity scenes have moved into private homes as well.

In the early years of the Christian faith, persecution made public observation of Christmas impractical, and it was not until several hundred years had passed that the birth of Christ was given an official date for celebration. It is by no means certain that December 25th is the actual anniversary of the birth of Jesus, but it was an appropriate date for the observance. It coincided with the Winter Solstice celebrations of long standing throughout the northern world, with the Roman Saturnalia, and

with the Jewish Hannukah, Festival of Lights, providing a firm historical base, familiar to everyone in the then-known world, for a major festival.

EARLY CUSTOMS

It is not surprising, therefore, that many customs derived from earlier celebrations have become a part of the Christmas observance in Italy. The coming of the Winter Solstice, marking the beginning of longer days, was observed in pre-Christian times by the decoration of houses with greens, and this custom, taking on added signifi-

ficance as a symbol of the rebirth of hope in the coming of Christ, is observed in Italy with sprigs of holly and mistletoe.

Similarly, the seasonal giving of gifts, already traditional in the Roman custom of giving branches picked in the grove of the goddess Strenia was appropriately converted to the giving of "Strenne," Christmas or New Year's presents, following the later tradition of the gifts of the Magi to the Christ-Child and symbolizing the gifts to mankind brought by Jesus' birth.

CHRISTMAS TREE ORIGIN

The Christmas tree, which originated in Germany, has come slowly into popularity in Italy, especially in the north, but it had its forerunner, especially around Florence, in the Ceppi, or Christmas pyramids, composed of shelves

of various sizes fixed to a pole. (The word "ceppo" means tree trunk and, by usage, a Christmas gift.) On the shelves were placed decorations of greens and small toys and presents.

It is possible that the ceppo may have been a replacement for the Yule log. But the burning of the Yule log, another custom of pre-Christian origin, is not unknown in Italy, where there is the pleasant legend that the Virgin Mary enters the homes of the humble at midnight, when the household is at Mass, to warm her newborn Child before the blazing log.

ITALY FOCAL POINT

The fact that Italy contained the capital of the Roman world and, as a logical result, the headquarters of the Christian Church, has given Christmas in Italy a particularly rich observance.

Letters to 'Santa' Overflow Mailbox

There's something special about Santa Claus in a small southern Indiana town where the famous Christmas legend has become somewhat of an everyday reality.

This town with a population of about 300 year-round residents, and a family of deer, is the jolly reindeer's namesake home — Santa Claus, Indiana — as well as the home of his helpers, and the location of his overflowing mailbox.

A unique landmark at Santa Claus is the U.S. Post Office near the intersection of Indiana highways 162 and 245, and next to the entrance to Santa Claus Land.

There is nowhere in the world where you can find a post office like this one. Its architecture is that of a stone-fronted, fairyland castle in design and while the community has but slightly more than 300 year-round residents this post office each year is flooded with about four million pieces of mail. The bulk of all this mail comes around Christmas time to receive the cherished Santa Claus

postmark. Still others arrive addressed simply to "Santa Claus, 47579."

Letters addressed to "Santa Claus" represent the tens of thousands of children's "want lists" that foretell visions of Christmas morning, promise cookies and milk, and extend best wishes to Santa, Mrs. Claus, and Rudolph, and, to the delight of children everywhere, all of these letters receive an answer from Santa Claus.

This unique practice dates back to the late 1920s when Robert L. Ripley popularized the town by featuring it in an article in his "Believe It Or Not" column. After the article appeared, mail began to mushroom, especially letters addressed to "Santa Claus."

Tourists with children also start to arrive and make visits to the post office with their Christmas mail, following in the steps of Ripley who also sent his Christmas cards through the office here as proof that there was indeed a Santa Claus — as verified by the postmark. For over 40 years, children have met Santa himself, played by Raymond Joseph "Jim" Yellig.

Besides taking up the role of Santa Claus at the Santa Claus Post Office in the early 1930s, Yellig also embarked on a project that now involves much of the community of the Santa Claus, Ind. area. He noticed that the incoming letters were being stored away because there were too many for the postmaster of the day to answer and took part in hand, along with his wife, to make sure children who cared enough about Santa Claus were answered.

ST. NICK RESTORED

When Queen Victoria, married German Prince Albert, Christmas visits of St. Nicholas (and the gift-giving) came back to England, three centuries after Henry VIII had banned the traditions when he broke away from the Catholic faith and formed the Church of England.

POPE'S YULE INSTRUCTIONS

Pope Gregory I in his instructions to missionaries on Christmas festivities sent out from Rome in the year 601: "The people should celebrate a religious feast and worship God by their feasting, so that still keeping outward pleasures, they may more readily receive spiritual joys."



Biblical Group of Domestic Animals Present at the Stable in Bethlehem

Scientists have established that domestication of animals first began in the Holy Land several thousand years before the birth of Christ.

The ox, ass, camel and sheep are known as the biblical quartet of animals because of their frequent mention throughout the Old and New Testaments.

All of these were probably present in the stable when

Christ was born. Oxen, when mentioned in

the Bible, may refer to bullocks, bulls, cows, heifers or calves, all of which belong to the Bovidae family. The bullock was the young male ox; bulls were male cattle; heifers were young female cows; the ox was a castrated male bovine. The ox, whose name is synonymous with physical strength, probably originated in Asia and appears to have been the first domesticated animal owned by families in the Holy Land. He was used for heavy farm work. Even the poorest family owned at least one ox. The word "cattle" originally meant "possessions" in Hebrew and included flocks of sheep, goats and other herded animals.

The Donkey, A Family Favorite

The donkey, or ass, was the most valuable animal to the biblical family, and also the most economical, since he ate only a quarter as much barley as a horse. The most menial of animals, he was famous for his stamina and sure-footedness. Humble as his status was, he would bear the cameler on his back, and lead the long, stately strings of camels across the desert. Even poor families, like Joseph's of Nazareth, could afford one donkey.

which they trimmed with blue beads and red wool to show their pride of ownership. This simple beast was their mode of transport into Bethlehem and later for the Flight into Egypt.

The Bible Gives Sheep Deep Significance

Authorities disagree as to what kind of sheep existed at the time of Christ. Three varieties exist in Syria and Palestine today, sprung from the three wild sheep groups still found in Asia. (1) The Asiatic mouflon, depicted on Sumerian vases from early Babylonia, supposed to have been domesticated around 3,000 B.C. (2) The Egyptian, long-tailed sheep are related to an ancient breed grown in the Ural mountains, long considered the boundary line which separates Asia from Europe. (3) The large, broad-tailed, curly-horned, creamy, deep-wooled sheep, that appear in so many biblical illustrations, came from Kurdistan at the head of the Tigris-Euphrates valley, which was the cradle of biblical civilization.

Wild grapes, wild wheat, wild asses and wild sheep grow in these Mesopotamian highlands today. People can still live here, near Mt. Ararat with almost no effort and some theologians feel that the site of The Garden of Eden may well have been located in this area. In Bible times, every Palestinian family bought two lambs at Passover time. They killed one to eat at the feast celebrating their safe exodus from Egyptian bondage. The other, they kept as a pet for their children and as a future source of wool for their looms and food for their table. The lamb slept with the children, ate juicy grasses from their hands and drank from their cup. When the animal became full grown, they killed it and put down its meat for the winter, storing it in the sweet fat from its tail. The tail, which sometimes weighed as much as thirty pounds, was a real burden to the animal. The purity, meekness and loyalty of the sheep for its shepherd inspired writers to refer to Jesus as "The Lamb of God."

The shepherds found compensation for their loneliness in this loyal love from their sheep and in the peace and beauty of the pastoral surroundings, whose revivifying seasons they knew intimately, and in the music of their homemade pipes, to which they sometimes trained their irksome goats to dance.

Goats Also on the Domestic Scene

Practically every family in Bible times owned at least one goat. A family could get almost their whole livelihood from the products of a goat. From goat hair, tent and garment cloth, curtains and pillows were made (1 Samuel 19:13). Water bags, a vital necessity in these desert areas, were made of goatskin. Food products included milk, cheese and meat. Even the horns of the bearded goats were used. The nimble, little goats of Bible times belonged to the Caprinae section of the

large Bovidae family, which included oxen, antelopes, sheep and goats. Goats and sheep are closely related but the male goat is bearded, while the ram is not. A goat's horns differ from a ram's, and his odor is stronger.

Frisky goats were compared to wicked people, and obedient sheep to gentle folk. From this we get Christ's parable of the final distinction between good and evil: "He shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats." (Matthew 25:32)

People would choose a goat from the flock by drawing lots, then turn it loose in the wilderness to die, because they believed they could impose their sins and misdeeds on the goat and its death would redeem them. This goat was called a "scapegoat."

Camels Are Most Picturesque of Bible Animals

Camels and Christmas seem to go together. The Three Wise Men used camels in their stately journey to Bethlehem to the scene of the Nativity. They have a rather regal bearing that has become an integral part of the Christmas picture. The camel sees objects at great distances and scents water long before the driver spots an oasis. A great asset in desert travel is its "extra stomach" and a storage bin in the hump which enable it to travel long distances without food or water. The camel is also known for its snarly temper and foul breath.

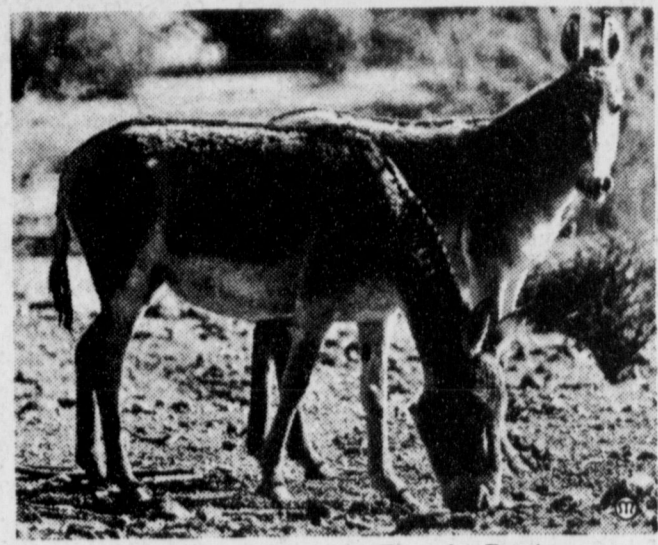
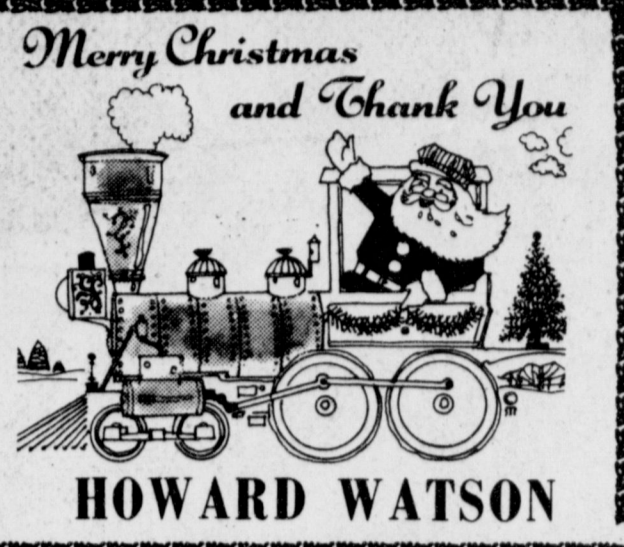
The camel's gestation period lasts a year, and produces only one offspring at a time. The baby camel stands 3 feet high at 8 days. It suckles its mother's milk for a year.

Many valuable products come from the camel. Its hair is clipped in the summer and woven into the finest warm garments. Its hide is used for bags and shoes. Its manure is used for fuel cakes. For food, it supplies milk.

Israeli Project Creates Biblical Zoo
A grassy 10,000 acres in the Negev, 25 miles from Eilat, has been transformed into a veritable "Noah's Park" called the Hal Bar which, in Hebrew, means wild life preserve. Breeding herds of most of the 120 animals mentioned in the Bible have been collected and pastured here.
