STATE AID FOR SCHOOLS IS LOWERED ONE-THIRD

The following letter, published at the request of County Judge Ayres, is self explanatory:

Judge Jno. B. Ayres, Pampa, Texas. Dear Sir: The amount of rural aid allotted to your county is \$1,400. The rural aid fund for this year is, as you know, one million dollars, which is two-thirds only of the amount appropriated last year. Because of lessened state per capita and delinquency in payment of taxes, more schools this year have applied for aid and asked for \$2,200,000.

Under these conditions, the average per school will have to be less than \$200, and no county ought to expect more than two-thirds of what it received from this fund last year. Another factor in the distribution of this fund is that provision in the law which requires that preference shall be given to those districts which have not funds sufficient to maintain their schools six months. Therefore, counties having a considcrable number of such short term schools should receive more aid in proportion than counties having very few such schools, it being the evident purpose of the law to equalize the opportunities for education offered every child.
