### CITY COUNCIL VISITS TEXLINE

The members of the McLean City Council were invited to attend the formal opening of the Texline waterworks and electric light and power plant last Thursday. This plant was installed under the auspices of Gantt-Baker Company, consulting engineers, tht same firm that McLean has emplayed. It was through the courtesy of the engineers that the trip was possible, as they paid all expenses. Aldermen Bogan and Biggers were snable to go, but Mayor Landers and Aldermen Shell, Cash and Haynes made the trip. On account of poor train service and the short time we had allowed for the visit, several taings that were planned for our entertainment, including a trip to Cayton, N. M., where these engineers have improvemnts in charge, had to be foregone, but things were kept moving for the few hours we had to spare. Prof. H. H. Tate, who is mayor of Texline, as well as superintendent of the city schools, met us at the train, together with Messrs. Gantt and Baker, the City Council and other notables of the city. We were escorted to Texline's new \$75,000 hotel, where we enjoyed a meal that for food and service, cannot be excelled in any town many times the size of Texline. After the meal, which was both breakfast and dinner to our party, we had several cars placed at our disposal and were taken to the plant to see the engines started and the water and power turned on. We found one of the most up-to-

date and most complete municipal plants we have seen. The two 75 horse engines were of the full Diesel type, the type used by the U. S. Government during the war, and represent the last word in engine construction. The pumps were working on a depth of 300 feet, and pumping water at the rate of 80 gallons per minute each, or a total of 160 gallons per minute.
