The stall charge in the firestock pavillion has been removed making no charge for placing exhibits of any kind. With the proper co-operation, this year's fair should be the beat ever shown here. Crops are fully matured and of better quality than ever before. which should give us as good an agricultural exhibit as is possible There is plenty of poultry and livestock in the community if it is placed on exhibition, and as substantial prizes are offered in these departments that should take care of any necessary expense, a good showing is expected. Rain insurance of \$1,000 has been taken for the fair and the program will be given rain or shine.



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



As might be expected in an old state like Masachusetts, a high percentage of the farms were acquired by inheritance. Among the 710 transfers examined in that state, 22.8 per cent represented inheritances, Western Nebraska still has many farms occupied by the original homesteaders. Approximately 19 per cent of the farm owners in one section of western Nebraska where the figures were gathered, stated that they were the original

On the 845 farms examined in Kentucky and Tennessee involving a total of 71,495 acres, 81.2 per cent of the farmers had purchased outright, 12.3 per cent had acquired possession by inheritance, less than one per cent by gift, and none by homesteading

In the five North Central States, called the "Farm by Marriage" group, only 64.4 per cent owned a farm by purchase. Almost 25 per cent had inherited their land, while 2.1 per cent had homesteaded.


