Roasting and baking destroy the vitamines in those food particles that are reduced to charcoal but not of the interior of the food which is not crisp.

Vegetables and fruits should be cooked only long enough to soften hem, in order to regin the vitamines.

Boiling destroys vitamines in meats, eggs and milk more thoroughly than fruit and vegetables. The home demonstration agent demonstrated broiling steak, scadling milk, cooked salad dressing for fruit salad, and fruit salad.
