

We find that some of the Jusof the Peace of this county failed to file their reports the Commissioners' Court as required by law. This should be ione, and we call attention to hose officers who have failed to le their reports that in the future hey should make their reports according to law.

We also notice that the batchers if this county are not complying with the law in filing their reports to the Commissioners' Court, and we all the officend attention to this natter and urge upon them to see that these reports are filed or else le complaints against all butchers who have failed to file reports in cordance with law.

We have carefully investigated e practice of cotton buyers and ablic weighers in this county of er sampling bales of cotton, to he detriment and loss of the sell-, and find that this practice is med on to some extent in parts this county, and we therefore mmend and call at ention to officens of this county that ey look into and investigate this actice among cotton buyers and thic weighers, and if upon investigation, find said practices are wing resorted to, then to file complaints against all parties.
