DON'T HIDE YOUR LIGHTS

UNDER A BUSHEL OF DUST

Light cannot come through a dirty window. Neither can light come through an electric lamp or shade that is covered with dest and grime. Yet the regular and thorough cleaning of lights and fixtures is rare and the loss of light resulting from this lack of care is very great, says the Illuminating Engineer, official organ of the Illuminating Engineering Society.

"Careful attention is often given to the design of lighting installations, and very good results are obtained. But it is not alawys realed that the provision of a satisactory installation is not enough. It is also necessary to keep it in good condition.

"In general, people realize the las Fair. necessity for regular eleaning of windows to admit natural light. It is reasonable to suggest that amps and fixtures furnishing ar.ficial light should receive similar attention," says the Illuminating


