**RED CROSS RESCUED  
600,000 FROM DEATH**

Spent \$1,200,000 for Relief of Famine Sufferers in China Last Year.

To help overcome conditions of acute distress in five famine stricken provinces of Northern China, where millions of persons were affected by an unprecedented shortage of food, the American Red Cross during the last fiscal year spent more than \$1,200,000, \$1,000,000 of which was contributed directly by National Headquarters and the remainder by various groups interested in the welfare of China.

Through the wide relief operations thus made possible it is estimated that more than 600,000 famine sufferers were saved from starvation.

To the end that similar prompt relief measures by the organization may always be possible the Red Cross is asking continued support by the American people by universal renewal of membership at the Annual Red Cross Roll Call, November 11 to 24.

The method of relief employed by the American Red Cross in its operations in China was particularly effective, for in addition to saving hundreds of thousands of lives it provided China with more than 900 miles of permanent roads that are sorely needed to prevent a recurrence of famine. At one time the Red Cross employed 74,000 Chinese workmen, paying them in food for themselves and dependents, this food being brought in from Manchuria and elsewhere.

A number of members of the Senior B. Y. P. U. met in the D. L. Abbott home on Saturday evening for the purpose of discussing plans for the ensuing quarter.

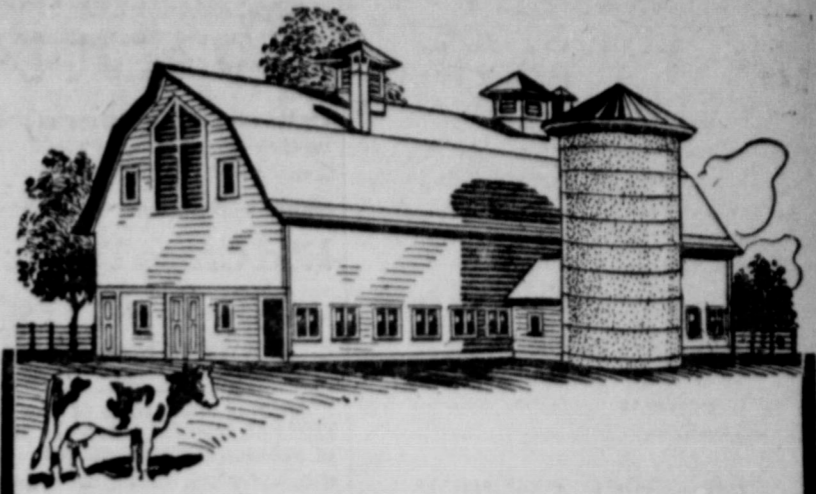

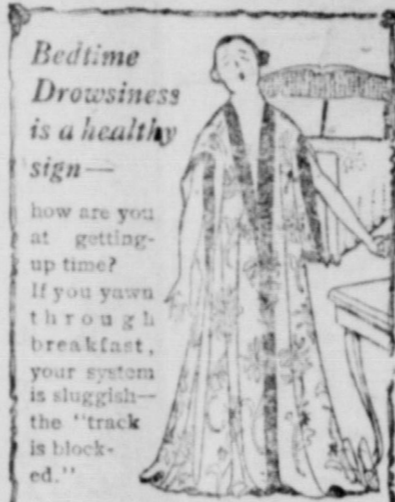

I will pay a twenty-five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of any party guilty of tying down any telephone wire or in any other manner tampering with the lines. The state law on the subject is as follows:

Penal code, Art. 784: If any person shall intentionally break, cut, pull, tear down, misplace, or in any other manner injure any telegraph or telephone wire, post, machinery or other necessary appurtenance to any telegraph or telephone line, or in any way willfully obstruct or interfere with the transmission of any messages along such telegraph or telephone line, he shall be punished by confinement in the penitentiary not less than two or more than five years, or by fine not less than one hundred nor more than two thousand dollars.

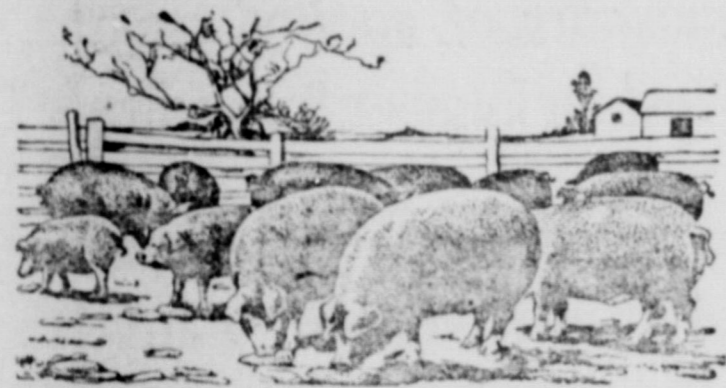

#### AGRICULTURAL CENSUS REPORT BY COUNTIES

This week the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, sends out reports of the agricultural census of six counties, Gray, Wheeler, Carson, Roberts, Hemphill and Hutchinson.

This report shows Gray county to be among the most favorable for agricultural purposes. As compared with Wheeler, Gray county has 580 farms, with 168,645 improved acres, while Wheeler has 997 farms, with 186,329 acres improved. The value of Gray county lands and farm buildings is \$14,071,215, compared with Wheeler's \$15,799,938. The total yield of the principal crops of Gray county is estimated at 2,739,397 bushels, Wheeler, 1,818,581. This shows Gray county has a larger yield than has Wheeler, who has nearly double the amount of farms and a larger number of improved acres. As compared with the other counties reported, the average is about the same.

### Red Cross Trains 147 Blind Vets In Useful Work

Training designed to fit them for the battle of life was taken by 147 blind ex-service men at the Red Cross Institute for the Blind, near Baltimore, Md., during the fiscal year 1920-1921, according to the report of the Institute for that period.

Of this number, 19 have gone on to other institutions, in almost every case to institutions where those having sight are receiving advanced education. The blind ex-service men who have entered such institutions are provided with special text-books in Braille, reading which they were taught at the Red Cross Institute.

Twelve men have passed from the Institute to successfully carry on some occupation or business for which they were fitted by special training. A few have withdrawn from the Institute because of poor physical condition, 14 are receiving further "training on the job" and 87 are still in training.

### Red Cross Plans \$6,000,000 Effort To Save Children

Medical care and clothing for thousands of children in Central and Eastern Europe are outlined as the activities of the American Red Cross in Europe for the current year, says a statement on the eve of the Annual Roll Call of the organization. These activities, supplemental to the feeding operations of the European Relief Council of which Herbert Hoover is chairman, are designed to provide the most adequate and balanced relief within the resources of private philanthropy.

Through the establishment of child welfare stations in the centers of population of those countries where adequate medical care is not now obtainable, the American Red Cross plans to provide the medical assistance needed to restore these children to a normally healthy life. The sum of \$6,000,000 has been made available for this work.

#### DEPARTMENT MAKES POSSIBLE TABLE GRAPES YEAR 'ROUND

Table grapes for the year around the ambition of American horticulturists for years—is an accomplished fact with the United States Department of Agriculture this season. The first carloads of Panariti, the so-called Greek currant grape, recently developed in this country by the department, reached New York from California the latter part of July. Last autumn department viticulturists at Washington opened packages of Ohannez grapes fully three weeks after their arrival from California and found them in perfect condition.


The Panariti grape until recently was known in this country only as a dried currant, of which 30,000,000 pounds were imported annually from Greece. It is brought into perfect fruitage through a secret carefully guarded by the Greeks and discovered by department workers very recently. The secret method is to girdle the vines while they are in bloom so as to keep the sap in the tops of the vines. The Panariti has unusual merit as a table grape, but

due to unfamiliarity on the part of the native American public, shipments to New York were largely purchased by the Greek population, who bought them eagerly.
