

By a special act of the Legislature prairie chicken shooting season each year for ten days, beginning Sept. Mrs. G. L. Booker left for her 1st, in Wheeler, Hemphill, Lipscomb and Gray counties, due to an abundance of the birds in these counties. There is no provision for open season in other counties of the

> The bag limit during the first ten day, with a limit of a total of 15 birds for the ten days open season. A resident license costing \$2 is rebe obtained from the game wardens or county clerks. Non-residents are required to pay \$15 for the season to hunt game of any kind in Texas.

Many prosecutions have resulted from violation of game laws this summer through the efforts of Warden Garmon and his assistant, J. D. Breedlove at Canadian, as well as a number of deputies throughout the Panhandle. The quall season is open during December and January, with a bag limit of 15 birds per day. Dove season opens Sept. 1st, ducks and geese Oct. 1st. The penalty for hunting without license is a fine of \$10 to \$100 and cost.




