### SOME NEW LAWS.

Folling are a few of the new laws which went into effect last fane or indecent language over July. People, as a rule are not or through a telephone a fine of acquainted with the provisions, not less than \$5 nor more than hence their publication here:

Any raffle for property, real or personal, value at \$500 or more is punishable by fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$1,000; if the property is of less value than \$500 the fine is \$5 to \$200. To offer or keep for sale any chance, ticket or part ticket in a raffle is punishable fine from \$10 to \$50.

### Alfalfa

Prof. Coburn of the Kansas experiment station, in his book on alfalfa says: "There appears no record of a time when alfalfa was not in some portions of the world esteemed one of nature's most generous benefactions to husbandry and an important feature of a profitable Its beginning agriculture. seems to have been contemporary with that of man, and as with man, its habitat was Central Asia, were the progenitors of our race knew its capabilities in sustaining all herbivorous animal life, and where, possibly, it too, afforded the herbage which sustained Nebuchadnezzer in his humilitating exile, and eventually restored him to sanity and manhood." It was carried by the Persians into Greece with the invasion by Xerxes in 490.B. C. utilized by the Romans in their conquest of Greece, and carried to Rome in 146 B. C. Pliny and other writers praise it as a forage plant and it has been in cultivation in parts of Italy continuously from its introduction. Some writers are disposed to aver that it was brought to Spain and France by the Roman soldiery under Caesar and early thereafter, but Prof. Coburn thinks that it more probably was not introduced into these countries until several centuries later. It is known to have been cultivated in Northern Africa about the time it was first brought to Italy, and the name "alfalfa" being Arabic, the inference might be reasonable that it was introduced into Spain by the Moors from Northern Africa at the time of their conquest of Spain about 711 A. D., but this is of small consequence to the farmer of today. From Spain it crossed to France, and later to Belgium and England. All over the west are thousands of fields of alfalfa that were sowed thirtyfive years ago that are still yielding large crops. In Wisconsin alfalfa yields three crops of hay a year, and in Texas, four and five large crops. In Southern California, below sea! level where they never have any frost, they cut alfalfa eleven times a year. Alfalfa does not exhaust the soil. Nitrogen is the soil's most important element, and the one most liable to give out; the one the farmer is

In fact, in many ways the enterprising host has an eye for business. He has learned how to mix a cocktail and travelers can procure baths. These Chinese inns are found beyond the wall on the road to Kalgan, where the railway will run in the near future.


