## SOME NEW LAWS.

Foiling are a few of the new laws which went into effect last July. People, as a rule are not acquainted with the provisions, hence their publication here:

Any cafe for property, real or is punishable by fine of not less than $\$ 100$ or more than $\$ 1,000$; if the property is of less value than $\$ 500$ the fine is $\$ 5$ to $\$ 200$. To offer or keep for sale any chance, ticket or part ticket in a raffle is punishable fine from $\$ 10$ to $\$ 50$.
The selling of any intoxicating liquors in any district where prohibited by law, or the giving away of such liquors to evade the law, is now punishable by confinement in the penitentiary for not less than one nor more than three years.
To wear or use without due authority the badge, label or button or other emblem of any labor organization, or any order society or other organization, or to use or to wear same to obtain aid or assistance unless entitied, is punished by fine of not more than $\$ 50$ or sixty days in ail or both.
The sender of an anonymous letter, reflecting upon the integ ity, chastity, virtue, good char after or reputation of the party to whom it is sent, will hereafter be subject to a fine of not less than $\$ 250$ nor more than $\$ 500$, and go to the county road gang for one year.
Anyone giving or delivering to any minor intoxicating liquors may be fined not less than $\$ 25$ nor more than 8100 . This ap plies to express companies and plies to express companies and inference whether the liquors re signed to the
other person.
For the using of vulgar, pro ane or indecent language over or through a telephone a fine of not less than $\$ 5$ nor more than $\$ 100$ is imposed.
