#### Watch Your Spuds for Potato Wart

Kerp a sharp lookout for potato wart this season and report all suspicious cases and send specimens immediately to your county agents, your State experiment station, or the United States Department of Agriculture, and thus aid in controlling this menace. If this dangerous new disease gets e tablished it will put a stop to area and lead to a quarantine of the locality. At present potato wart has appeared only in a few gardens in mining sections of Pennslvania, which are now under strict quarantine. It reached there in a shipment of European potatoes in 1911 or Thirteen bushels came in that year and some of them may have been infected; consequently every potato grower is urged to watch



The plan, therefore, for a Boy Scout week during which a universal appeal will be made to all Americans to supply the means to put the Boy Scouts of America in a position to carry forward effectively and continuously the splendid work they are doing for the youth of America, should have the unreserved support of the Nation.

Therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do hereby recommend that the period beginning Sunday, June 8th, to Fiag Day, June 14th, be observed as Boy Scout Week through the United States for the purpose of strengthening the work of the Bry Scouts of America.

I earnestly recommend that, in every community, a Citizens' Committee under the leadership of a National Cit zens' Committee, be organized to coope ate in carrying out a program for a definite recognition of the effective services rendered by the Boy Scouts of America; for a survey of the facts relating to the boyhood of each community in order that with the cooperation of churches, schools and other organizations definitely engaged in work for boys, adequate provision may be made for extending the Boy Scout program to a larger proportion of the American boyhood

The Boy Scout movement offers unusual opportunity for receive the indorsement of the volunteer service. It needs men to act as committeemen and as editor of the official organ of the General Federation of or such personal service, enroll as associate members and give all possible financial assistance to this worthy organization of American boyhood. Anything that is done to increase the ffectiveness of the Boy Scouts of America will be a genuine con

tribution ta the welfare of the Nation. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

But in its progress the nsect army will be subject to army-farmers through the threatened regions who have been warned by the United States Department of Agriculture to be on their guard and to be ready to burn over infested areas or spray them with a solution of arsenate of lead powder), 2 pounds to 50 gallons water. Furrows plowed around infested fields or in the path of the advancing worms also are effective in reducing! damage. The worms fall into the furrows and are killed by logs dragged through.



#### Swat Roosters and Save Millions

Roosters not needed as breed ers should be put in the same class as flies when it comes to swatting. It is estimated by the United States Department of Agriculture that \$15,000,000 worth of eggs spoil yearly simply because they are fertile. Fertile eggs, when subjected to high summer temperature, begin to hatch just as when placed in an incubator or under a hen, and even though the process continues but a short time the egg becomes untit for food. This spoilage of eggs can be entirely prevented by swatting or disposing of the rooster after the breeding season is over. The campaign for the production of infertile eggs has been waged several years by United States Department of Agriculture poultry specialists, and is being taken up with renewed vigor in States where summer temperatu:es are highest and losses are greatest. Weeks have been designated "Swat the Rooster" for the sale of surplus male birds. Enormous quantities of roosters, not needed and being fed needlessly, have been marketed during such weeks. It is much more generally understood that hens will lay just as well without a male in the flock.

#### EFFECT OF COLOR UPON THE . DURABILITY OF PAINT.

Property owners who may have under consideration the painting of dwellings and other structures should remember that more durable results are obtained when tinted paints are used. Permanent coloring materials which have been ground by machine into a high grade white paint base have the effect of preventing "chalking" and "checking," two defects which are often observed when white paints are used.


