Fort Worth, Feb. 4.- Gray county will be called on to enlist her public school teachers as members of the Texas State Teachers Association. Plans for a campaign for 20,000 members of the Association have been completed. Miss Laura V. Hamner of Amarillo is heading the campaign in the 18th Congressional District, of which Gray county is a part.

ent of the Gray county schools, and D. E. Dean, superintendent of the McLean city schools, will head up the campaign in the county. Each of the 18 districts is expected to enroll a minimum of 1000 members.






