Heads Major Disasters of 1926. Red Cross Active In 62 Emergencies in Year.

ALSO SERVES FOREIGN LANDS

Preparedness to Cope with Great Disturbances Gives Good Results in Action.

Pacing one of the largest rehabilitatos efforts of its whole history, as a salt of the Florida hurricane, the arican Red Cross already had beand it a record of service in 62 disters at home, up to the close of e fscal year, June 30, 1926.

Then the hurricane struck Plorida th such devastation and loss of life, the Red Cross National Headquarters was just congratulating itself that a car had passed without a major dis-The destruction in Florida has tentatively estimated by Director of Disaster Relief Henry L. Baker, of the American Red Cross, in terms f relief work ahead of the organizaon. This takes into account all sufferers who must be cared for.

Careful surveys by experienced auhorities place the injured at 4,000. exclusive of the stricken Gulf Coast ities of Moorehaven and Clewiston. Of the 1,200 injured sent to Miami hospitals, 500 were suffering with maearly 1,000. The homeless were conervatively estimated at 50,000. Such gures sketch only vaguely the human and material problem which the American Red Cross is still doing its utmost to solve.

Por comparison the other outstandg recent disaster, the Midwest torof March 18, 1925, can be detrophe the final check showed 800 dead, 3,000 injured and 6,847 families of approximately 30,000 men, women and children rendered homeless. The Cross were brought to a close March 18, 1926, exactly a year from the day the tornado struck five states.

So terrible did the death and destrutcion impress itself on the experienced Red Cross forces rushed into trated every resource in trained personnel on the stricken region.

The year has seen a new measure of disaster relief preparedness inaugurated by the Red Cross, under which a trained reserve of medical and other relief experts is constantly on call for any service. It is neither fair it necessary that careless should drive others off he highway, to which an on which veryone has an equal right. intomobiles are safe, highways are safe, and driving practices must

An oil company, operating several hundred trucks, has not had a allision or accident on the highsays or at railroad grade crossings or a number of years, although during that time its trucks crossed ailroad tracks more than 31,000,000

It selects its drivers with proper care, instructs them in safe practices and gives them to understand that failure to stop, look and listen before crossing a railroad track, or failure to properly observe traffic rules and safe practices on the ighways will result in dismissal from the service.

It logically follows that public regulation of the same character would accomplish a like result, and with automobiles increasing in number, with proportional increase in congestion and hazard of accident, the point has been reached and the time has arrived for affirmative legislative action in this regard.

But compulsory automobile in surance is not the solution; it will not reduce accidents; it will tend to increase them by removing the last vestige of personal responsibility from persons already careless.

CLEANLINESS vs. VACCINATION




