

First of all, give the editor the news; he wants it. Give it to him, even though it doesn't get in the paper. He hasn't time always to tell you whp some piece of news is not used; but ten to one he had a perfectly good and impersonal reason. Give him the news, even though you may not be especially interested in it. Some folks never think to give the editor news exept when they are concerned in it one way or another.

Second, don't give him a piece of news and tell him you want it printed just as it is written. There s a right and a wrong way to do even a simple litte thing like writing an article for a country paper. One editor had to to town because he printed every piece of news just as it was handed inspelling, punctuation and all-and printed it with the name of the person who gave it to him.

Third, don't try to play a joke through the paper unless you explain it to the editor. A thing in old type looks a lot different from a thing repeated by word of mouth. when the voice, the facial expression and a gesture perhaps help to show its meaning.

Fourth, don't worry for fear the ditor is making too much money; ou should want him to be prosperous. He can and will give you a better paper. He will be less ikely to have to compromise with his conscience over certain kinds of advertising. And, anyway, he an't make a big fortune out of the paper; he will be lucky if he can keep it going.

Fifth, be ready to tell your edtor when something in the paper ful life. Consider what you will leases you. 




